From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

Although the new year is already one month old, I'd like to take one more look back to reflect on what we accomplished last year.

Despite the financial conditions out there, we had some very positive economic development take place in Bloomingdale in 2002. Marriott's Courtyard and Residence Inn both opened during the summer/fall of the year. Located just to the south of Stratford Square Mall, they are doing well.

Springbrook Shopping Center completed its redevelopment and the center is nearly filled. Sears, a major anchor at Stratford Square, held its grand re-opening following a renovation. Kohl's, another Stratford anchor, recently completed its interior renovation. A Lazy Boy retail store also opened on the mall ring road just in time for the holiday season.

We have actively pursued and are having great success in cleaning up the Lake Street corridor. Rosedale Estates has been approved for the Crane & Steel property at Rosedale and Lake, the empty Warnimont Hardware building, just to the south, has been demolished, as was the barn at Lake and Euclid, which housed retail for the last 15 years or so.

The year 2002 also saw our partnership with the Village of Roselle, Bloomingdale Township and


the State of Illinois to build the Community Trail Bridge over Lake Street, adding another piece to the regional pathway.

At our own Bloomingdale Golf Club, 2002 marked the opening of our practice facility/junior course, as well as the completion of our golf course improvement program, wherein we redesigned and improved several holes.

Indian Lakes Resort also saw all of their rooms and the 50,000 square feet of meeting space remodeled, as part of a \$20-million renovation project. The plan includes the redesign of the resort's entire-36 holes. This past summer, the first nine holes of a new west course were opened.

In other areas, we undertook a sanitary relief sewer improvement project along Euclid from Schick to Lake Street in the South Suncrest subdivision. We also put a new stormwater pump station in the Indian Lakes subdivision.



Looking ahead, this year will bring about the completion of single-family residential developments at two ends of town. Eastgate, Chateaus of Medinah, Vittoria Brooke and Medinah Groves II will all be completed this year along our eastern boundary. Seven Oaks and Rosedale Estates will bring a whole new look to the northwest corner of town.

Albertsons, owner of Jewel-Osco will be constructing a 219,096 square-foot office center, relocating its corporate headquarters from Melrose Park. In response to many questions we have received, the Meijers project on Gary and Schick is still a go, with construction slated for 2004.

DuPage County has told us the Meacham Grove Bridge will be constructed and finished in 2003. This will be an important link to the east and west sides of our town through the forest preserve trail. Several towns on the north end of the county have been working together to complete the recreational pathway.

We also have good news from AT&T/Comcast, our cable provider, regarding internet access via cable. They are projecting we will have high-speed data service available by June 2003. We have been receiving many inquiries about that capability and are happy to finally have a positive answer. See details on p.11.

We are also looking forward to the placement of our third bronze statue, which will be placed at the south side of Old Town Park. Entitled *Everyday Heroes*, this original sculpture will be a tribute to our police and fire personnel. The Bloomingdale Police Department and Bloomingdale Fire Protection District are both honored by, and supportive of the Business Promotion and Cultural Development Committee's choice for this latest statue. The Committee is planning a series of fundraisers to complete this undertaking, See page 8 to learn about the first, a dinner at Jamada Restaurant.

VOLUNTEERS WANTED

The Village Forestry Division is looking for volunteers to plant 200 seedlings, including Eastern Redbud (*Cercis canadensis*) and Japanese Tree Lilac (*Syringa reticulata*) — provided by the Village of Bloomingdale on Saturday, April 26th, from 10 a.m. – noon at the Public Works Facility, 305 S. Glen Ellyn Road.

The Village will be receiving 200 seedlings, soil and pots for the purpose of growing the seedlings into saplings for transplanting into the local community. Community Tree Planting involves a commitment from all participants to plant trees on public property, such as right-of-ways, school grounds, community parks, etc.

Participants are asked to bring gloves and enthusiasm. After this growing season, the trees will be planted in the Village's nursery for further growth.

GARDEN CALENDAR: FEBRUARY AND MARCH


Don't be fooled by warm, sunny days. It is still too early to remove mulches, screening, and other winter plant protections. Make sure they are still in place.

Prune trees* and shrubs. The ideal time to prune is in the dormant season, after the coldest weather and prior to new growth. For this reason, our Spring Branch Collection Program begins in early spring. Please consult the branch collection information and schedule in this Almanac issue to determine the collection date for your neighborhood.

Prune spring flowering plants (i.e., lilacs, forsythias) after they bloom to avoid removing this spring's flowers.

*Note to residents - please do not prune parkway trees. These trees are pruned regularly through contract and inhouse programs. If you believe a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800.

SPRING BRANCH COLLECTION BEGINS MARCH 24



Parkway Tree Maintenance

For any and all work by a resident or resident's contractor on a parkway tree, a permit is required by Ordinance No. 95-61, An Ordinance Regulating the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees on Public Areas.

PLEASE NOTE -

Installing planter walls around parkway trees is work which requires a permit. The Village discourages the installation of planter walls around parkway trees because the parkway is Village property and the typical installation of a small diameter ring filled with soil is injurious to the tree. For those residents who have installed planter walls without permits, approval can be obtained by contacting James M. Johnson, Forestry Crew Leader, at 630-671-5804. The Village will be notifying residents of a violation when unacceptable planters are encountered.

The Village has a comprehensive, systematic pruning schedule which ensures each tree is trimmed every five years. Contract tree pruning occurs during February through April. In-house trimming can occur any time during the year. If a resident believes a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800.

PICKUP SCHEDULE

SECTION ONE:

Pick-up begins March 24, 2003

Area bounded by Army Trail Road on the south, Bloomingdale Road on the west, Edgewater Drive on the north, and Glen Ellyn Road on the east.

SECTION TWO:

Pick-up begins March 31, 2003

Area bounded by Edgewater Drive on the south, Bloomingdale Road on the west, Lake Street on the north, and Glen Ellyn Road on the east.

SECTION THREE:

Pick-up begins April 7, 2003

Area bounded by Schick Road on the south, Gary Avenue/Cloverdale Road on the west, Lake Street on the north, and Bloomingdale Road on the east.

SECTION FOUR:


Pick-up begins April 14, 2003

Area bounded by Army Trail Road on the south, Old Gary Avenue on the west, Schick Road on the north, and Bloomingdale Road on the east.

SECTION FIVE:

Pick-up begins April 21, 2003

Two areas with the first bounded by Army Trail Road on the south, Glen Ellyn Road on the west, Lake Street on the north and Medinah Road/Walter Road on the east. The second area is bounded by Lake Street on the south, Rosedale Avenue on the west, Picton Road/Foster Avenue on the north, and Medinah Road on the east.



The Branch Collection Program: What You'll Need to Know

The Bloomingdale Public Works' Forestry Division will be conducting its Spring Branch Collection Program beginning on March 24, 2003. PLEASE NOTE – To better serve our residents a summer pick-up is again being included in the program. Residents' branches will again be collected three times during the year, once during spring, summer and fall. The summer pick-up will take place during June/July. Large branches downed by storms will also be picked up. Small branches and twigs downed during storms should be bagged for BFI pick-up. For storm damage pick-up, please contact Helen Price at 630-671-5800 (or e-mail to priceh@vil.bloomingdale.il.us) within 72 hours of storm for within 72 hours

The branch collection program is available to single family detached residences within the Village of Bloomingdale only. Residents of townhomes should contact their association regarding branch collection.

The following information shall assist residents regarding branch collection procedures:

- □ Branches must be out <u>by 7 a.m. on the first day the pick-up is to begin</u> for the section. Please note: Our crew will be making only one pass down each block and will not return. Branches should not be placed on the parkway more than 10 days before the scheduled beginning pick-up date for the section.
- □ Woody branches up to six inches in diameter and up to twenty feet in length are the only items that will be picked up. Long lengths are favored. Do not reduce the length for our benefit. Any branches exceeding six inches in trunk diameter will not be picked up. Our chipper is designed to chip woody limbs and branches. The equipment will not grind small, twigs, vines or other non-woody yard waste. Leaves, vines, small (under 1/2 inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds will not be picked up because the soft material clogs and damages our equipment. If it is baggable, it is yard waste.
- □ All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and should be stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement. Small branches may be bundled with string. PLEASE NOTE branches left out in a tangled mess will not be picked up due to time required for our crew to sort for loading.
- ☐ Branches with spikes, hooks or other metal objects will not be picked up.


 Stumps, roots, root balls, wooden fence and construction lumber also will not be picked up.
- ☐ <u>Please do not conceal thorny tree branches inside piles</u>. These require special care as to not cause injuries to our workers.
- ☐ Small twigs, leaves and other yard waste may be placed in bags with tags for Browning Ferris Industries pick-up (our refuse hauler). B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups should be directed to 847-429-7370.

Beware: Con and Scam Artists at Work

Some unscrupulous people spend most of their time inventing ways to trick people out of their money, particularly preying on senior citizens. Instead of using their energy toward positive ventures, they try to think of ways to catch people off guard and make some quick money for themselves. By reading the daily newspaper or watching the evening news, you can see/hear the stories about con artists working different scams. Usually, the stories that raise our awareness come from someone else's misfortune.

Recently, DuPage County Sheriff, John Zaruba, announced that his department has been investigating a number of Ruse Entry "Gypsy" Scams in unincorporated Glendale Heights, West Chicago, Warrenville, and Lemont. The suspects involved in these cases entered the residences of elderly victims by claiming to be from Commonwealth Edison or other utility services that provide yard clean-up or tree trimming. During the incidents, an individual would keep the victim preoccupied in conversation inside the home or


lure the victim outside, while other individuals would enter the residence and look for valuables. The reports have indicated that two to five male suspects may have been involved in these cases. The reports also describe the suspect vehicles to have been white mini-vans or cargo vans. Some of the victims reported that nothing was missing from their homes, others discovered personal checks and hundreds of dollars were taken from the bedroom areas.

The Bloomingdale Police Department wants all citizens to be aware of home repair fraud, phone scams, mail fraud, and to practice the following safety tips.

- O Keep doors and windows locked at all times.
- O Never open the doors to strangers. Ask service people for identification and call the company for further verification.
- O ANY suspicious people or activity contact the local police department immediately.
- Check with family, friends, the Village Building Department/Police Department for validity of a business.
- O Don't give personal or financial information over the phone.
- O Hang up on nuisance callers and report them.
- O Consult with trusted individuals regarding any business / financial affairs.

Senior citizens are not always the victims in these cases, but they are generally targeted. In order to reduce victimization, please be alert and aware of your surroundings, utilize good safety practices, and keep in contact with your neighbors and your local police department. Being "the eyes and ears of the community" will help reduce victimization for you and others.

The following are scholarships available to Bloomingdale residents through local organizations.


The Bloomingdale Women's Club will award two \$500 scholarships to high school seniors residing in Bloomingdale. Community service will be a major component for awarding the scholarship.

Planning on Sending your Child to Kindergarten?

Illinois law says a child entering kindergarten must be five years old, on or before September 1st. Parents residing is School District 13 wishing to have their child considered for early entry, must contact the district's gifted coordinator, Signe Noth at 529-6211 before February 21, 2003. Once contact has been made, all necessary documentation must be completed and submitted for review. Following the timeframe of the early entry process is vital in order to have your child considered. No child will be considered unless the gifted coordinator is notified of the request prior to February 21, 2003.

Internet Access to be Available in Bloomingdale Via Cable TV in June 2003

Many residents have inquired about getting internet access via cable, and we are pleased to report that AT&T/Comcast has just announced that service will be available by the end of June, 2003.

There are some minor upgrades needed to the system in order to provide the capability, which will be done over the next few months. Crews will be in the area working during that time. There will be some short-term interruptions of service as a result of these improvements, which will be minimized as much as possible.

High Speed Data service will be available to all locations where AT&T cable is now available, but you do not need to be a cable subscriber to get that service.

The recent rate increase has also generated some questions. Based on Federal Law, through the Cable Act of 1996, we cannot prevent rate increases. There is very limited authority granted to us as a franchiser, and we do exercise that authority.

Also, it should be mentioned that there is a minimum cable TV service package (Basic Service) available at a cost of \$11.52 per month. For more information on what that service includes, please contact AT&T/Comcast at 1-866-594-1234 (toll free).



Winter Water Main Breaks

Winter is typically a busy time of year for our crews. Water main breaks occur year round, but are more frequent in the winter months. "Water main break" is a term frequently used to describe a variety of underground pipeline failures.

The Village water distribution infrastructure consists of approximately 122 miles of water mains, 1750 fire hydrants, 6,000 b-boxes, and 1500 valves to maintain and repair. These are generally located in the parkway in front of your home or in rear yard easements. Most water main breaks are easy to detect as the ground above the leak will swell and a constant flow of water will run out.

Repairs are typically scheduled by the severity of the leak with priority given to the safety of the water supply, potential for damage, and inconvenience to the affected customers. The time required to make repairs will vary due to conditions, such as weather, and conflicts with other utilities. To make a repair, the crew has to shut off the water main. Water is generally off 4 to 6 hours for the average repair. The crews typically knock on the doors of the homes of residents affected by the shut down, unless it's late at night. Once the water is turned back on, it may be discolored. This discoloration is generally due to mineral sediments in the water main which are disturbed by the repairs. This will settle in a short period time. Unless you are specifically notified, the water remains potable (safe to drink).

To report a water main break please call the Village Services – Utilities Division at 671-5830 during normal business hours, Monday through Friday 7:30 am to 4:00pm. After hours, the on-call person can be reached by calling the Police Department's non-emergency number at 529-9868.

Our first female officer on the Bloomingdale Police Department has now officially retired, for the second time, as a Bloomingdale employee.

Shilora, Larson came to Bloomingdale in 1971 from Glendale Heights, where she was a juvenile officer. Bloomingdale's police chief was looking for someone with experience to start up Bloomingdale's own dispatch center. At that point, Roselle dispatched all Bloomingdale's calls.

At this point Bloomingdale was a close-knit community of less than 3000. The Sunnyside area was just being built; Bloomingdale Road was only two lanes; Fairfield Way did not exist and Schick Road was just a dirt road west of Indian Lakes.

"We didn't deal with a lot of 'criminals'," she said. "In fact, Bloomingdale was well known as a speed trap. Lake Street was the only street with traffic, so you worked Lake Street."

She remembers sitting at Lake and Maple and forgetting

to turn out the overhead lights in her squad car. "I still caught speeders," she laughs.

She also laughs remembering that there were times when she was the only officer working in Bloomingdale and Joann

Bloomingdale and Joann Kunz (now Deputy Chief

Joann Drozd) was the only officer on in Roselle. If only the residents had known the only two police officers protecting them those nights were two women!

Larson retired from the police force December 6, 1991. The next day she began working full-time in a civilian position as the Records Division supervisor. Although Shilora loved being an officer, she found she really enjoyed the statistical work in records. And now, after 11 years as a civilian employee, Larson has once again retired – this time for good.

She and her husband, Bob, retired at the same time and have moved to Las Vegas. We wish them both all the best in their retirement.

Firefighter Fatalities in 2002

102 firefighters died while on duty in the United States Proper Maintenance in 2002. Career firefighters comprised 37 deaths (36%) Volunteer, seasonal, and part-time firefighters accounted for 65 deaths (64%) Ten of these were seasonal or part-time wildland firefighters. The vast majority of fatalities occurred in relation to a fire or medical emergency inciwho died while on-duty suffered fatal injuries or illnesses in emergency situations. Heart attacks continue to be a leading cause of firefighter deaths, killing 31 firefighters in 2002. This represents almost one third of the 2002 totals.



CHIMNEY FIRES

Chimney fires occur every winter when high heat or flames can ignite excessive creosote deposits within the chimney.

Sometimes these fires are noisy and dramatic enough to be detected by neighbors or passersby. Flames or dense smoke may shoot from the top of the chimney. Homeowners report being startled by a low rumbling sound that reminds them of a freight train or a low flying airplane. However, those are only the chimney fires you know about. Slow-burning chimney fires don't get enough air or have enough fuel to be as dramatic or visible. But, the temperatures they reach are very high and can cause as much damage to the chimney structure and nearby combustible parts of the house. A fire in the flue can raise the wood structures on the other side of the chimney to their ignition temperature so that they also start to burn.

When fires are not kept hot enough, unburned fire gases exit the fireplace or wood stove, and flow up into the relatively cooler chimney and condense. The resulting residue that sticks to the inner walls of the chimney is called creosote. Creosote is black or brown in appearance. It can be crusty and flaky ... tarlike, drippy and sticky ... or shiny and hardened. Often, all forms will occur in one chimney system. Whatever form it takes, creosote is highly combustible. If it builds up in suffi-



cient quantities - and catches fire inside the chimney flue- the result will be a chimney fire. Certain conditions encourage the buildup of creosote, restricted air supply, unseasoned wood and cooler-than-normal chimney temperatures are all factors that can accelerate the buildup of creosote on chimney flue walls. Here are some ways to avoid chimney fires:

- Use seasoned woods only (dryness is more important than hard wood versus soft wood).
- Build smaller, hotter fires that bum more completely and produce less smoke.
- Never burn cardboard boxes, wrapping paper, trash or Christmas trees; these can spark a chimney fire.
- Install stovepipe thermometers to help monitor flue temperatures where wood stoves are in use, so you can adjust burning practices as needed.
- Have the chimney inspected and cleaned on a regular basis.

- Clean chimneys don't catch fire. Make sure a Certified Chimney Sweep inspects your solid fuel venting system annually, and cleans and repairs it whenever needed.
- Your sweep may have other maintenance recommendations depending on how you use your fireplace or stove.
- Use certified chimney sweeps, since they are regularly tested on their understanding of the complexities of chimney and venting systems.

What to Do if You Have a Chimney Fire

If you realize a chimney fire is occurring, follow these steps:

- dent. 70% of the firefighters Get everyone out of the house, including yourself
 - Call the fire department.

If you can do so without risk to yourself, these additional steps may help save your home. Remember that homes are replaceable, lives are not:

- Call the fire department to insure that the fire is extinguished and has not extended.
- Discharge a fire extinguisher or carefully splash water into the fireplace or wood stove
- Close the glass doors on the fireplace
- Close the air inlets on the wood stove

After any fire, or suspected fire, contact a certified chimney sweep to clean the chimney and assess for any damage. Don't rekindle another fire until you have it serviced. For additional information, contact a certified chimney sweep or chimney service professional.



Sessions 1 and 2:

Very basic introduction to computers and how we use them. Topics such as learning how to use disks and CD-ROMs, becoming comfortable with the mouse, using windows, and running programs.

USING SEARCH ENGINES

Monday March 10, 7:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m. Instructor: Karen

This class focuses on the use of search engines in retrieving information on the Internet. Participants will become familiar with the capabilities of search engines and will also be introduced to search strategies and evaluation techniques. Those taking this class should have basic mouse and keyboard abilities and a basic understanding of how to navigate the Internet. Having taken "Introduction to the Internet and E-mail" is highly recommended.

INTERMEDIATE ACCESS

This class will cover more advanced topics such as Edit Masking, creating Modules, and using Wizards. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Access" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

USING MICROSOFT OFFICE

Wednesday March 19, 7:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m.

Instructor: Sean

This class will cover advanced topics that involve one or more Office programs. Mail Merge and the use of Macros will be examined in detail. (Having taken "Intermediate Word" or "Understanding Your Computer 1" is recommended).

Discussion will continue over first two classes with recommended practice exercises given after both session 1 and 2.

Sessions 3 and 4:

These two classes will introduce participants to using the Internet. Basic understanding of connecting and using the World Wide Web will be covered as well as more detailed E-Mail questions and introducing more complicated Internet topics such as downloading, searching, and using multimedia products online (music, movies, games, etc.).

The third class will cover most of the topics covered in "Introduction to the Internet and E-Mail" with a few changes to better suit the class. In the fourth session we will fill in E-Mail and Browser details missing from the third session and begin with the complicated topics discussed above.

Sessions 5 and 6

The final two sessions of this course will introduce the Microsoft Office Suite, paying particular attention to MS Word but also introducing products such as Excel, Power Point, and Publisher, while discussing the Office environment. These classes should provide enough comfort to get started in any MS Office program.




