# From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

In light of events these past few weeks, our thoughts go out to those who have relatives overseas in harm's way. Whether you agree or disagree with the decisions of President Bush, most of us want the men and women serving our country to know we are concerned about them and wish them the best. Bloomingdale VFW Post 7539 has gone a step further and is sending goodies and messages to service people in Kuwait. See the back page of this Almanac to learn how you can help out this effort in a very simple way.

Here at home, the Bloomingdale Historical Society is making plans for its annual Memorial Day observance – "A Day of Remembrance," at St. Paul Cemetery on Lake Street. The ceremony begins at 9:30 a.m. and will include a flag ceremony, message from the Bloomingdale Police Department chaplain, musical selections, gun salute and area scouts placing flowers on the graves of veterans. New this year will be a veteran from each war, beginning with WWII, speaking for a few minutes about his memories from his time of service.

The entire ceremony lasts less than one hour. There is limited seating provided, so feel free to bring lawn chairs. Parking is available in business lots both east and west of the cemetery as the businesses will not be open yet.

Every year this moving observance draws more people. It is truly a fitting tribute to those who gave their lives for our freedom. I hope many of you will come by to be a part of it. Residents are also invited to come by the short ceremony provided at noon by the Bloomingdale VFW at the Veterans' Memorial, located at the gazebo just west of the library.

A couple of other special items I want to acknowledge - Congratulations are due to Chief Gary

Schira and the Bloomingdale Police Department for making the year 2002 a record year for DUI arrests. The record number of 288 DUI arrests is up five percent over the 2001 total. I'm very proud to say our police department is very aggressive about taking drunk drivers off the street via arrest.

Special recognition also goes to the Finance Department, who for the 13th year in a row, has been awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada for its comprehensive annual report. Attaining this honor is a significant accomplishment by a government and its management.

I especially want to congratulate Finance Director Gary L. Szott and his talented staff for consistently earning this highest form of recognition in governmental accounting and financial reporting.

We have a fine staff working at the Village, and I welcome the opportunity to share these kinds of accomplishments with our residents.





## Village to Begin Enforcement of Off-Street Parking/ Recreational Vehicle Ordinance

On November 25th 2002, the Village of Bloomingdale adopted Ordinance No. 2002-49 establishing new off-street parking and loading regulations. Placement of recreational vehicles and/or trailers (ie. boats, snowmobiles etc) on residentially zoned properties, along with site specific requirements, are now subject to the new ordinance regulations.

A key change in the regulations is the prohibition of parking a recreational vehicle and/or trailer in a front yard, including a front yard driveway. Corner property side-yards are regulated the same as front yards. Also regulated are allowable driveway pavement types, width, location and street access-curb cut allowances. Recreational vehicles and/or trailers are now required to be screened from view by means of land-scaping or fencing, depending on site specific conditions, as outlined in the ordinance.

Building and Zoning Division inspectors will be performing property inspections and taking photographs for recreational vehicle ordinance compliance beginning in April 2003. If a violation of the ordinance is observed, an initial notice letter will be sent with copy of the applicable ordinance section in violation attached, along with a photograph of the observed violation.

The initial notice letter is expected to generate a telephone call from the resident to discuss and remedy the violation. Village Building Commissioner Mike Gricus will be responding to all questions related to this new ordinance at 630-671-5661.

## Bloomingdale Church Celebrates 25th Anniversary April 11-13

The congregation of Bloomingdale Church, 260 Glen Ellyn Road, invites residents to join them the weekend of April 11 - 13 to celebrate 25 years of worship.

The Bloomingdale Church began on April 2, 1978 with 21 people meeting in the Marquardt School. Pastor David Riemenschneider and his wife Marina were two of those charter members. He spent much time visiting the neighborhoods to invite people to the fledgling church.

The congregation grew slowly at first, but completed its initial building in 1979. As the congregation and commitment grew, Bloomingdale Church went through three more construction projects, adding on to the facility to meet a variety of needs. Over the years, the congregation has had an enlarging ministry in Bloomingdale and surrounding communities. The church's numerous programs are focused on children and teens, adult Sunday school, home groups and men's and women's ministries.

The anniversary celebration begins on Friday evening, April 11 at 7:30 p.m. with a praise, worship and prayer service. Saturday, April 12 features a prayer vigil from 8 a.m. – 6 p.m. Individuals may sign up for a prayer time at the church. Sunday's festivities begin with two expanded worship services with lots of music and personal testimonies. The first runs 8:30 – 10:00 a.m.; the second is 10:30 a.m. – noon. Beginning at noon, a brunch will be held in the gym, along with an open house involving tours of the church areas, including the parsonage and district office. There will also be representatives from the various ministry groups to talk with attendees about ministry opportunities.

# Summer 2003 Road Construction: Where It Is, How It Will Affect You

### Reconstruction

Road reconstruction includes removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement including curbs and gutters, and road base. This year's reconstruction project will be:

Manor Lane Edgebrook Drive Downing Drive

All work is funded 100% by the Village.

## **Pavement Overlay**

Overlay maintenance consists of pavement patching, curb and gutter repairs to correct drainage deficiencies, storm sewer repairs and a new asphalt road surface. The following streets will receive pavement overlay:

Spring Valley Prairie Avenue Broker to Park Pleasant Avenue East Park Avenue Nordic West of Euclid Tee Lane Crest Court Day Street South of Washington Street Greenway Drive Knollwood Drive **Butterfield Drive** Schick Road Bloomingdale Road to Ridge Avenue Ridge Avenue Colony Green Signature Drive

## Westlake Townhomes

This work includes pavement patching, removal of the existing curb and gutter and replacement with depressed curb and gutter – eliminat-



ing the bump at the end of the driveway, storm sewer repairs and an overlay of the existing pavement. Also, the Westlake Townhome Owners Association will be removing and replacing the concrete driveways as part of this project to minimize the impact to the residents. This work will occur on Colony Green Drive

This work will begin in early May and will take approximately 3 months to complete. During construction, these streets will be closed to through traffic. If you live in the construction zone, or on one of the adjacent streets you will be permitted to proceed past the barricades to reach your residence.

Motorists are advised to use alternate routes around the construction zone to avoid delays. Local detour signage consisting of "Road Construction Ahead" signs will be posted prior to construction.

## News on Saturday Hours At Village Hall

The Village will be expanding its weekend hours beginning in April. Transactions that residents were able to have processed at Village Hall on Saturdays will now be able to be processed at the Police Department. With these expanded hours on Saturdays at the Police Department, the Village Hall will be not be open.

Voter registration is possible on Saturdays at the Bloomingdale Public Library. During periods of Absentee Voting, the Village Hall will be open on Saturdays for residents to vote. Residents will be notified of those dates prior to an election.

The Village Board is pleased with this unique opportunity to provide more service to residents, while at the same time, saving taxpayers money.

# Attention Dog Owners: Your Pet Must be Licensed By April 30, But the License is Free

- ☐ All dogs over 4 months of age must be licensed with the Village by midnight; April 30, 2003: Dog owners who are currently registered should have received a letter in the mail regarding this year's license and other changes.
- ☐ The new license will be valid until April 30, 2004. A current rabies inoculation certificate number is required with each dog license application.
- ☐ NOTE: There is <u>no longer</u> a fee for a dog license.
- ☐ If your dog is not licensed, you may be subject to a citation of \$25.00 or more.
- If your dog is found to be running and is impounded at the Village's kennel, you will be subject to the kennel fee.
  - ☐ The kennel fee for the first 24 hours is \$32.00 for a dog with a license and \$35.00 for a dog without a license.
  - ☐ Kennel fee is \$15.00 for <u>each</u> additional twenty four hour period, or portion thereof.
- ☐ You may obtain your dog license either in person at the Village Hall Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. or by mail by calling 529-7000 ext. 5637 to have an application mailed out to you.


# Comcast Announces System Upgrades In NORDCAT Communities

Comcast has begun a major cable system enhancement project to bring better service reliability and high speed internet service in its NORDCAT (Bloomingdale, Carol Stream, Wood Dale, Itasca and Roselle) communities.



Comcast is currently working in Bloomingdale. As sections of the community are completed, new services will be offered almost immediately. Comcast will be offering Comcast High-Speed Internet, which is substantially faster than a dial-up modem, and doesn't tie up a phone line.

Residents can expect to see Comcast crews working throughout the village to prepare the cable system for these new services. Comcast crews will notify residents with a door tag at least 48 hours in advance of any work in their yard. Construction crews will be identified with photo IDs and uniforms.



Comcast will try to minimize service disruptions to their customers, but customers may experience temporary disruptions of their service when crews are in their neighborhood.

During the winter months, Comcast has replaced sections of buried cable, but due to frost, those cables were temporarily laid on the ground. Please call Comcast at the number listed below to ensure that the cable is buried.

## **District 13 Names New Superintendent**

Kim M. Perkins, Ed.D., of Lombard, has been named as the new superintendent for Bloomingdale Elementary School District 13. Current superintendent Jerome Gordon will retire in June after 25 years with the district, 18 as superintendent.

Dr. Perkins currently serves as assistant superintendent for human resources for St. Charles Community Unit School District 303 in St. Charles where he is responsible for recruitment, employment, evaluation and retention of staff.

Previously he was a principal for 18 years, serving at Haines Middle School in St.

Charles, DuPage Elementary School District 44 in Lombard, and Johnsburg Community
Unit School District 12 in McHenry. Perkins began his career as a junior high mathematics teacher.

He is also an adjunct faculty member at Aurora University, teaching school supervision, educational leadership, contemporary issues, and school community relations. He serves as a graduate student advisor and thesis advisor as well.

Dr. Perkins co-authored the book, "Not Just Another Science Fair," and a paper on "Middle School Teams: A Logical Context for Professional Development Schools," and has presented on Increasing Parent Satisfaction, Enhancing Parent Communication, and Teachers Encouraging Kids. He is active in many professional organizations and is also a member of the Teacher Certification Advisory Board for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at Northern Illinois University.

Dr. Perkins earned his doctorate in Education from Loyola University with a concentration on school improvement, and his master's and bachelor's degrees from Northern Illinois University. He earned a specialist degree in educational administration from Northern as well. Dr. Perkins will begin his new role July 1.


A bike rodeo with a child safety seat inspection and child booster seat giveaway will be held on May 10 at the Bloomingdale Park District. Watch local papers for more details.



The Bloomingdale Police Department is asking for assistance to help curb one of the newest crimes in our community. This crime is Identity Theft. We are asking our residents to keep a sharp lookout when mailing bills out. It appears that several local communities have had incidences where residents left mail overnight in their own mailboxes, only to have the contents removed prior to the Post Office picking up their mail the next day. This is one way an individual gathers information on a potential victim. You can


limit your risk by depositing bills and personal mail in a secure mailbox, or by depositing the mail in your box just prior to the mailman's delivery time. Also, keep your mailbox empty by checking the contents everyday. If you are going to be on vacation, please notify the Post Office so that your mail can be held at the main facility.







## **GOLF PRACTICE FACILITY**

This year will mark the 1<sup>st</sup> full season for our new dual practice range/six-hole junior course. The practice range has the flexibility to be used from grass or mats. Well-bunkered greens are located at various yardages to allow golfers to practice their distance and accuracy. The practice range can accommodate 12 golfers comfortably at any one-time.

The fee for a basket of range balls is \$4.00. A token for the golf ball dispenser can be purchased in the pro shop. Each bucket holds approximately 35 golf balls. If you are a die-hard when it comes to practicing your game, consider purchasing a debit key. This key works like a debit card. Once purchased, there is no need to go to the golf shop. One can go directly to the golf ball dispenser located at the range and insert the debit key in the designated area. The purchase of the range balls will be deducted from your debit key. When the debit key has been depleted, one can re-purchase more range balls on that same key or return it into the golf shop for a \$2.00 refund.




Adult reference librarian Julie Deeke added, "In the almost 15 years I worked with Mary, not only has the library grown into a vital

# Some Suggestions from the NFPA on Dryer Use

Do not operate the dryer without a lint filter. Clean lint filters before or after each use and remove accumulated lint from around the drum.

Make sure that the dryer is plugged into an outlet suitable for its electrical needs as overloaded electrical outlets can result in blown fuses or tripped circuit breakers.

Turn the dryer off when leaving the home.

Keep the dryer area clear of combustibles (i.e., boxes or clothing).

Dryers should be installed and serviced by a professional.

Have gas-powered dryers inspected by a professional regularly to ensure that the gas line and connection are intact.

## SPRING CLEANING

Spring is the time to clean our homes and also a great time to check for fire hazards. Use this simple list to see how your home checks out.

o Is your street number printed in block numbers, in a contrasting color, no less than 4" tall, and visible from all directions? Are the numbers visible at night?

- o Is there at least one OPERATING smoke detector on each level of your house?
- o Do you and your family know what the smoke detector alarm sounds like?
- o Are your smoke detectors checked regularly, preferably monthly?
- o Are the batteries in your smoke detectors replaced yearly? Select a special day, like a birthday or anniversary.
- o Is there a fire extinguisher in your home and does your family know how to use it?
- o Has your family practiced its own fire drill to be sure that you would know how to escape?
- o Does everyone know two ways out of every room in your house?
- o Does everyone know how to get out quickly and stay out of the burning building?
- o Does everyone know to crawl low under smoke?
- o Does everyone know the meeting place outside in case of a fire?
- o Do you and your family know how to call the fire department using 9-1-1 in case of an emergency?
- o Have all of the windows in your house been checked to make sure that they open easily?
- o Do all of the smokers in your house know not to smoke in bed or when they are tired?
- o Are all of the ashtrays sturdy and non-tip with holders for cigarettes in the center?
- o Are all electrical cords in good condition not frayed or worn?
- o Are extension cords kept out from under rugs, carpets, furniture, off nails and pipes, or through doorways?
- o Are the electrical outlets or UL-approved power strips overloaded?
- o Is there a tight fitting screen in front of the fireplace?
- o Is your chimney and fireplace cleaned each year?
- o Are ashes removed from the fireplace or wood heater and placed in metal containers?
- o Is there proper spacing around wood heaters and their vents and combustible walls?
- o Is there enough room around water heaters, furnaces, etc.? (Recommended clearance distance should be listed on the appliance.)
- o Is the space around the water heaters, furnaces, etc., free from materials or liquids (i.e. gasoline, certain paints, thinners, etc.) that burn?
- o Are curtains, furniture, and clothing kept away from stoves and heaters?
- o Are your closets, attic, basement, garage, and utility room clear of newspapers, old rags, and trash that could easily burn?
- o Is the outside of your house clear of trash, high weeds, rubbish, etc.?
- o Are gasoline and other liquids that burn kept in labeled metal containers and not in glass or improper plastic containers? (They should be stored away from sources of ignition.) Never use or store gasoline inside the house.
- o Are the fuses or circuit breakers satisfactory for your home? Are they the correct amperage?
- o Are matches and lighters stored high, out of the reach of children?
- o Is only one heat-producing appliance (toaster, coffee maker, etc.) plugged into an electrical outlet?

## Federal and State **Tax Forms Available**

The library still has federal and Illinois income tax forms available to the public. The most common forms are free. Discussion will continue over first two classes with recommended practice exercises given after both session 1 and 2.

#### Sessions 3 and 4:

These two classes will introduce participants to using the Internet. Basic understanding of connecting and using the World Wide Web will be covered as well as more detailed E-Mail questions and introducing more complicated Internet topics such as downloading, searching, and using multimedia products online (music, movies, games, etc.).

The third class will cover most of the topics covered in "Introduction to the Internet and E-Mail" with a few changes to better suit the class. In the fourth session we will fill in E-Mail and Browser details missing from the third session and begin with the complicated topics discussed above.

#### Sessions 5 and 6:

The final two sessions of this course will introduce the Microsoft Office Suite, paying particular attention to MS Word but also introducing products such as Excel, Power Point, and Publisher, while discussing the Office environment. These classes should provide enough comfort to get started in any MS Office program.

## Collecting for Our Guys and Gals Overseas


