



Mark your Calendar for Curbside Branch Collections In July and October

Following the success of our spring program, Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will work under the direction of the Village Forestry Division to complete the 2004 branch collection. The remainder of the 2004 schedule is:

Summer – July 19 Fall – October 18

Note: The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

Summer Branch Collection Guidelines

D Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, July 19.

 \Box Woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).

Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.

All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.

□ Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

The following items are unacceptable:

- Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- □ Woody branches under 1/2 inch in diameter.
- □ Leaves, vines, small (under 1/2 inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- □ Large stumps, roots and root balls.*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.*

The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Browning Ferris Industries pick-up (our refuse hauler). BFI yard waste pick-ups continue through November 30th. Questions concerning BFI pick-ups should be directed to (847) 429-7370.

*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds. Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but require a special pick-up. Contact BFI for more information.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage pick-up of woody branches over 1/2 inch in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at (630) 671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for storm damage disposal.

Your cooperation is greatly appreciated and will ensure a successful program.



Wood Mulch --Free for the Taking!

The Village has woodchip mulch available at Public Works, 305 Glen Ellyn Road, for residents who wish to come and pick it up. Pick-up hours are from 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Early summer is an advantageous time to mulch as the mulch will moderate the effects of the summer's sun and heat on the soil and plant roots.



The Septemberfest/Joe Draghi Memorial Scholarship Deadline is August 15

The Septemberfest/Joe Draghi Memorial Scholarship (formerly the Mr. & Ms. Bloomingdale Scholarship) is named for Joseph Draghi, a Bloomingdale resident and longtime Bloomingdale volunteer. Joe served on numerous Village committees and commissions including the Septemberfest Commission.

Over the past 31 years, this scholarship fund has given hundreds of thousands of dollars to young adults in our community. Community service has played a large part in the lives of past scholarship winners.

The applicant must comply with the following criteria:

- 1. Is a resident of incorporated Village of Bloomingdale, Illinois
- 2. Is between the ages of 16 and 20 years of age
- 3. Exhibits school and community involvement
- **4.** Plans to attend a college, university, or trade school after graduation from high school or is currently enrolled in a college, university, or trade school
- 5. Complete the following application packet:
 - a. Application Form (typewritten preferable)
 - b. Two letters of recommendation one letter must be from a high school teacher, college professor, volunteer coordinator or civic leader. The other letter must be from another professional adult source (not a family member or family friend).
 - c. Compose an essay of a minimum of 500 words describing your life, contributions to the community, your activities, career plans, schools applied to, if applicable, and your opinions/ideas about living in the Village of Bloomingdale and attach it to application form. Essays will be judged on content, grammar, and thoroughness.
- 6. The application packet must be complete (including letters of recommendation) when submitted and all requirements must be met. The application packet should be mailed or delivered to:

The Results are In: Global Survey Responses Paint a Picture of Community Strengths, Weaknesses

In 2002, the Healthy DuPage Character Development Coalition engaged in a pilot project to develop a means of measuring a key element of overall health- social and moral health - in schools and communities.

A total of 845 people, made up of School District 13 staff members, fifth graders, eighth graders, their respective parents and community members "at large" were asked to complete the survey. Approximately 38% of the parents and community members participated in the survey, which addressed three major scales: values, caring community climate, and character education experience and practices.

The following are items for CELEBRATION:

- Youth and adults alike rated physical/verbal and drug/alcohol abuse the lowest possible on the scale provided by the survey.
- Both youth and adults reported that adults are available to talk with children.
- Both youth and adults reported that parents are involved with their children's activities and friends.
- Adults reported that in troubled times, people in this community can rely upon others for help.
- Adults rated character development as highly as academic achievement.

The following are areas of CONCERN:

- Adults reported that social acceptance and diversity were areas of concern.
- Adults reported inconsistencies in the implementation of rules.
 - Adults reported having issues with forgiveness.
 - Adults believe that they are too busy to address concerns related to character.
 - Youth rated self-discipline and respect as weak areas.

In February, a committee was put together to analyze the results of the Global Survey, and results were recently reported to Bloomingdale's Character Counts Committee, as well as School District 13's Administrative Council. The next step in the process is to celebrate our successes, and then to formulate ways to make measurable improvements in the areas of concern that have been brought to attention through this survey.


Volunteers Plant 200 Seedlings at Public Works Facility



Bloomingdale Historical Society Seeking Donations To Replace Civil War Gravestones

The Bloomingdale Historical Society began a project to identify and replace the gravestones of Civil War veterans buried in St. Paul/Evergreen Cemetery three years ago. There are about 24 Civil War veteran graves identified in the cemetery, although not all of the headstones need to be replaced. The organization has been assisted by P.H. Sheridan Camp 2, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War on the project.

The Bloomingdale Historical Society "Gravestone Restoration Project" recently received 4 brand new government headstones that were obtained from the Veterans Administration. Three of these four Civil War Veterans were buried in unmarked graves in St. Paul Evergreen Cemetery.

Samuel Downing, 55th Illinois Infantry. Private Downing was captured after the battle of Shiloh in 1862 and died a prisoner of war.

Luther W Godfrey, 105th Illinois Infantry. Private Godfrey died of typhoid fever in 1863 while in service to his country.

John H Ehle, 8th Illinois Cavalry. Private Ehle is buried in Alexandria, Virginia, but will be honored with a memorial stone.


William W Goodwin, 8th Illinois Cavalry. Private Goodwin survived the war, but his grave had not been marked.

The headstones are now in place. A formal dedication has been set for Sunday, September 12th at 2:00 PM. The Historical Society continues their work to have more headstones replaced. Three years ago, a number of individuals and groups graciously provided sponsorships to help defray costs of the project. The Historical Society offers that opportunity again through a \$10 or \$15 sponsorship.







Fireworks Safety

Fireworks are spectacular to watch, but can be extremely dangerous in the hands of amateurs. When celebrating

the Fourth of July or other outdoor events, the Bloomingdale Fire Protection District #1, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) urge residents to attend firework displays put on by trained professionals who follow state-of-the-art fire codes. Statistics from the NFPA and the AAP show that fireworks annually cause millions of dollars of property damage and thousands of injuries, as well as some deaths.

In an article by John R. Hall, Jr., Fireworks-Related Injuries, Deaths, and Fires, dated May 2003, he provides the following statistics:

□ In 2001, 9,500 people injured by fireworks were treated in a hospital emergency room.

□ In 1999, there were 24,200 reported fires started by fireworks. These fires resulted in \$17.2 million direst property damage. □ In 1995-1999, 9 people per year were killed by fires started by fireworks, while 7 people per year were killed directly by fireworks.

□ Approximately 50 percent of fireworks-related injuries have been tied to common, and in many cases, legal fireworks. The hands, head, legs and eyes are the most often injured body parts. About one-third of the eye injuries result in permanent blindness, and finger injuries require an estimated 120 amputations annually.

The majority of 2001 fireworks injuries were burns (58.9%). Sparklers can burn as hot as 1200 degrees Fahrenheit.
 Highest risks of fireworks injuries are to teenagers. Nearly half of all consumer fireworks-related injuries occur among children under the age of 15, according to a 2001 AAP policy statement.

□ Males accounted for three-fourths of fireworks injuries. The female injury rate was higher than the male rate for adults aged 45 to 64.

In 2001, eight out of nine (88.5%) emergency room fireworks injuries involved fireworks that Federal regulations permit users to use.

□ "Safe and sane" fireworks caused more injuries than illegal fireworks, especially to preschool children.

Protect your family from fireworks-related injuries by leaving fireworks to the trained professionals. Attend your local community fireworks celebration, rather than hosting your own at home. If despite the well-documented risks, you still want to have sparklers or other fireworks at home, you must be absolutely sure that an adult is always supervising the children. And avoid alcohol use because it contributes to a higher incidence of fireworks-related injuries.

Non-Emergent Transports

You may have seen the Bloomingdale Fire Protection District Ambulance leave a minor accident scene, turn off their

emergency lighting and drive to the hospital following normal traffic laws and obeying all traffic signals. You may wonder why this is happening?

The Bloomingdale Fire Protection District has made in change in how it will transport "Basic Life Support" (BLS) or nonemergent patients to the hospital for further evaluation and treatment. This change in policy brings the District into compliance with the policies of the Northwest Community Hospital EMS System under which the Districts Paramedics work.

This change is to reduce the incident of vehicle crashes that further injure a patient and to lessen the potential for injuries to the public. This should create only minimal time delays in transport times. This non-emergency transport is only done after a full assessment of the patient medical condition and injuries. If the patient condition or injuries were of a nature that would require more advanced treatment and procedures then an emergency response (lights and siren) to the hospital would be indicated.

This is a change that many states are considering. The State of Pennsylvania is the latest state to adopt this type of procedure. The intent of this procedure is to ensure that patients with minor, non-life threatening injuries or conditions arrive at the hospital safely.



This class will teach the basic skills required to use the Bloomingdale Library's scanner and two sample digital cameras. Techniques taught will include taking pictures, viewing them on the camera, transferring them to a computer, and acquiring text and/or images from the scanner. While all digital cameras are different, the same basic principles will apply to the students' cameras as those used in class. It is recommended that students have basic experience using Windows so that you are comfortable pointing and clicking and following instructions.

USING THE INTERNET

Tuesday July 20, 2:00 - 4:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This course will cover all from the most basic internet questions and topics to more intermediate material such as search engines and downloading. This class is intended for those with little or no computer experience.

USING PUBLISHER

Wednesday July 21, 6:30 - 8:30 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This desktop publishing program can be used to create newsletters, brochures, cards, banners, etc. The class will cover basic techniques needed to create professional publications. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Word" is recommended.)

<u>USING EMAIL</u> Tuesday July 27, 2:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This class will introduce the students to creating an Email address, performing basic functions, and more advanced procedures such as using attachments and managing folders. (Having taken "Using the Internet" is recommended.)

This six-session course will cover a wide range of computer topics. It is intended to give students a strong foundation in computing, teaching them general computer/Windows principles, using the Internet, and familiarity with Microsoft Office products. The skills learned here will help to prepare the student for whatever computing task interests them. Please see the following Course Outline for more information.

Adults Computer Course Outline

Sessions 1 and 2:

Very basic introduction to computers and how we use them. Topics such as learning how to use disks and CD-ROMs, becoming comfortable with the mouse, using windows, and running programs. Discussion will continue over first two classes with recommended practice exercises given after both session 1 and 2.

Sessions 3 and 4:

These two classes will introduce participants to using the Internet. Basic understanding of connecting and using the World Wide Web will be covered as well as more detailed E-Mail questions and introducing more complicated Internet topics such as downloading, searching, and using multimedia products online (music, movies, games, etc.).

The third class will cover most of the topics covered in "Introduction to the Internet and E-Mail" with a few changes to better suit the class. In the fourth session we will fill in E-Mail and Browser details missing from the third session and begin with the complicated topics discussed above.

Sessions 5 and 6

The final two sessions of this course will introduce the Microsoft Office Suite, paying particular attention to MS Word but also introducing products such as Excel, Power Point, and Publisher, while discussing the Office environment. These classes should provide enough comfort to get started in any MS Office program.


