From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

As this issue goes to press, we're still awaiting August's "dog days" of summer and already we're thinking about our annual end-of-the-summer celebration, "Septemberfest." See pages 6 and 7 to learn more about the attractions and entertainment the Septemberfest Commission has lined up for this year.

A special event taking place at this year's celebration is the dedication of the "Everyday Heroes" statue. This occasion marks the culmination of two years work by the Village's Business Promotion and Cultural Development Committee. They began raising funds in the beginning of 2002 for this third statue. The committee decided to make the statue a tribute to the police and fire departments here in Bloomingdale – thus, the "Everyday Heroes" title.

As the location is Old Town Park, the plan was always to unveil the statue at a Septemberfest celebration. Coincidently, Septemberfest falls on September 11 this year, which will bring special meaning to the day and add to the sentiment behind the statue.

The "Everyday Heroes" statue is an original work by artist Art Myers of Colorado, who also created the "Mayor's Bench" located at the Bloomingdale Golf Course. This sculpture, featuring a fireman and a policeman interacting, is one of very few across the country to combine both figures.


I, along with fellow resident and good friend, Chuck Franzen, made the trip to Loveland, Colorado over the July 4th holiday weekend to bring the statue home to Bloomingdale. We admit we turned a few heads on the interstate with the kneeling figure of the fireman peering over the bed of Chuck's pickup. At every stop on the way home, people asked to take pictures of the figures. We invited them all to the unveiling!

Once again, the statue has been paid for strictly through donations. No tax money has been spent on the project. Engraved bricks will continue to be available at this location for \$100 each. These monies will help complete the landscaping of the statue location.

The unveiling of the statue will take place in a short ceremony at approximately noon following the Septemberfest parade. At this time we are hoping the artist himself might be in attendance to take part as we dedicate the statue to Bloomingdale's everyday heroes.

On Sunday, September 12, the Bloomingdale Historical Society invites all to help them honor some more Bloomingdale heroes.



Recently Bloomingdale Fire Department Assistant Chief Bill Wolff, and fellow fire-fighters and Bloomingdale VFW Post 7539 members showed up at Tom Hong's Glendale Heights Jewel/Osco wiith two empty trucks. They were met by Jewel staff members and together they loaded up the beds of both trucks to capacity with 80 cases of Pepsi, 40 cases of assorted Frito-Lay chips, 72 cases of Jewel water, 30 cases of fresh peaches and apples, plus 15 cases of assorted Entenmanns products. The donated goods were delivered to the O'Hare airport USO for some 3000 members of the armed services passing through on their way home from Korea for a two-week leave before shipping out to Iraq.

DuPage County Begins Army Trail Road Reconstruction; Completion Anticipated in October 2005

The Du Page County Highway Department began Army Trail Road Widening Improvements, from Swift Road to Regency Drive, during the month of July. The expected construction completion date is October 28, 2005.

The project will include:

- ☐ Curb and gutter and enclosed storm drainage system throughout the project.
- ☐ Additional lane in each direction of travel.
- ☐ Widening of the intersection at Glen Ellyn Road
- ☐ Relocation of existing overhead cables.
- ☐ A median separating east and west traffic.
- ☐ Relocation or adjustment of existing Village water and sanitary sewer lines.
- ☐ Concrete sidewalk or gravel trail on both sides of the road.

The existing pavement will remain and be used as a base for the new road wherever possible. The pavement widening will occur at selected locations where needed for additional lanes. The project will also include new traffic signal equipment locations where signals are presently located.

Construction Project to be Completed in Four Phases

Phase One will consist of the following:

- Utility relocations (telephone, electric, CATV, natural gas)
- Squeeze traffic onto south side of Army Trail Road.
- Squeeze traffic onto west side of Glen Ellyn Road.
- Create a work zone on the north side of Army Trail Road and the east side of Glen Ellyn Road.
- Maintain two lanes of traffic in each direction on Army Trail Road.
- Maintain left turn lanes.
- Alternate closure of Creekside Drive and Brookdale Drive while reconstruction takes place at one of these locations.

Phase Two will consist of the following:

- Squeeze traffic onto the north side of Army Trail Road.
- Squeeze traffic onto east side of Glen Ellyn Road.
- Create a work zone on the south side of Army Trail Road and the west side of Glen Ellyn Road.
- Maintain two lanes of traffic in each direction.
- Maintain left turn lanes.

Phase Three - Army Trail Road Median Construction:

- Construction of barrier medians to divide road and permanent left turn lanes.
- Left turn lanes will be maintained at selected locations.
- Left turns will be permanently prohibited at Harvard Lane and Brookdale Drive.

Phase Four - Landscaping

• Restoration of disturbed areas adjacent to the roadway.

Parents: Here's How to be Web Savvy to Help Keep Kids Safe as They Surf the Internet

The Internet has opened up the world to anyone with access to a computer and an online connection. Children and teenagers can greatly benefit from the Internet, but they also run the risk of becoming a target for crime and exploitation. Trusting, curious and anxious to explore the world

via the Internet, children and teenagers need parental supervision and "Rules of the Road" to safely travel the information superhighway.

The use of the Internet by children and young adults may increase during the summer months since they have more available free time and they may be particularly at risk because they often use the computer unsupervised. Children may encounter areas exposing them to material of a sexual or violent nature, or areas visited by child sex offenders looking for their next target. Teenagers are more likely to participate in online discussions

regarding companionship, relationships or sexual activity. Both children and teenagers run the risk of being tricked or harassed once they come into contact with the wrong person on the Internet. ☐ Learn all you can about Internet security software that blocks and filters undesirable information.

□ Check out the World Wide Web for organizations that represent children's rights. Do a search using keywords such as "Internet safety for kids," and your browser will take you there. Many have newsletters you can download to keep you updated on the latest Internet information.

For Kids/Young Adults:

☐ It's cool to talk with other kids and visit interesting sites on the Internet, but here are some things you should know to keep you safe while you're having fun.

☐ Remember never to give out personal information on the Internet. Don't share your real name, phone number, address, password, where you live, where you go to school, or anything about your family.

☐ It's best not to talk to strangers – just like when you're at the park or in a store. Someone may pretend to be someone he or she is not.

Don't agree to meet anyone you've talked to online. Tell your parents if an online friend wants to get together, so your parents know all about it.

If you fill out a personal profile that other kids can read online, don't write anything

that says too much about you. You may think only your friends can see it, but strangers can find out about you, too.

Don't write back to flames (people who use bad language or want to get into an argument online).

Log off immediately if you see or read something that upsets you. Tell your parents or a teacher if something like that happens.

Protect your password. No one should ever ask you for it for any reason. (continued on next page)

For Adults:

The following is information that parents need to know to be Web Savvy:

☐ Keep the computer in a family room, kitchen, or another area where you can monitor its use.

☐ Limit your child's time online, just like you do their television viewing. They need a balance of activities in their lives.

☐ Take time to teach your children how to use the computer responsibly.

☐ After setting up rules for using the Internet, discuss them with your children. Post them near the computer as a reminder.

☐ Ask about your child's online friends, so you know with whom they are communicating.

☐ Discuss the difference between advertising and educational information. Explain by showing examples of each.

☐ Many Internet providers offer parental controls with their service. Use them to keep children away from undesirable sites.

☐ Report anything that gets by parental controls and let your Internet service provider know what you expect to keep kids safe.

Don't buy anything over the Internet without your parent's approval. Don't give out a credit card member without your parent's knowledge.

Never send pictures over the Internet unless your parents know about it.

Ask your parent's permission to visit a chat room.

Parents, teach your children not to respond to messages or bulletin board items that are suggestive, threatening or that make them feel uncomfortable. Urge them to inform you of any inappropriate material they may discover on the Internet. If your

child encounters such material, forward a copy of the Web site address to your Internet service provider and request their assistance in the matter. If you or your children find a site for child pornography online, report it to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children at 800-843-5678.

The Internet can be a great source of information and worldwide resources, but there are dangers for children and teenagers who use the Internet. Parental supervision and online rules can greatly reduce the risks associated with children's use of the Internet.


Neighborhood Watch: Street Smart Seniors & Citizens Police Academy

For several years the Bloomingdale Police Department has offered opportunities for residents to become better acquainted with the various areas of law enforcement and to gain insight into the elements of police work. The Citizen Police Academy does just that, as well as to promote safety practices, create an awareness in which to reduce victimization and enhance the police department's understanding of the citizen's daily concerns.

The Citizen Police Academy meets Thursday evenings 6:30 p.m. – 9:30 p.m. beginning September 9th through November 18th, 2004. The academy is divided into five and six-week sessions, with the various topics divided between the two. Among the subjects covered are Gang Awareness, Drug Identification, Crime Scene Processing, and a Tour of the DuPage County Crime Lab. Residents may sign up for one or both sessions. The academy is free and is taught by our own professional police officers who are specialists in the various areas.

Street Smart Seniors is a similar program, which focuses on the needs and concerns of today's senior citizens. The Street Smart Seniors Program meets Wednesday mornings from 9:00 a.m. to Noon beginning September 8 through October 20th, 2004. Among the topics addressed are Diversionary Thefts (Scams), Gang and Drug Awareness, Elder Abuse and Personal Safety.

Recreation Path Construction Underway

The Village has been working on final plans for a recreational trail to connect Meacham Grove Forest Preserve on Circle Avenue north of Lake Street to the Lake Street Reservoir Forest Preserve on the north side of Lake Street at Glen Ellyn Road. This trail was a part of the Village-wide Trail Plan adopted in 1997. A grant to help fund the construction costs for the project was secured from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.


The trail to link the forest preserves is approximately 3,600 feet in length:
Plans are available to review at the Village Services Department in the Village Hall. The trail will be 10 feet wide, paved in asphalt. The route will begin at the Meacham Grove Forest pre-

serve entrance on Circle Avenue, and will progress east on the existing pavement of Spring Valley Drive. A portion of the trail will be located on the Village lots (presently vacant) at the east end of Spring Valley Drive at Pleasant Avenue.

The remaining sections will progress south and east across vacant portions of property to the intersection of Glen Ellyn Road and Lake Street. Trail users can then enter the Forest Preserve or use the pedestrian activated push buttons to cross Lake Street and Glen Ellyn Roads to use the Bloomingdale Golf Club perimeter trail. This trail is scheduled to be completed in Late Spring or Early Summer 2005.

Final plans have also been prepared to complete the remaining section of the Bloomingdale Golf Club perimeter trail between Carriage Way and Ironwood Drive. This section will extend the existing 10-foot wide paved trail, completing the loop around the Golf Course, approximately 2.2 miles in length. This section should be completed in late Fall 2004.





Mosquitoes and the West Nile Virus

☐ Use insect repellents. Repellents deter mosquitoes from biting when applied properly to exposed skin and clothing. Apply mosquito repellent with DEET in accordance with label directions.

Trees & Pests

Emerald Ash Borer Alert

As the Emerald Ash Borer draws nearer – infestations have been found in Michigan and Indiana - homeowners are cautioned not to bring plants and firewood home after summer vacation. The Emerald Ash Borer can travel in nursery stock or in firewood.

The adult Emerald Ash Borer is slender, elongated and 7.5 to 13.5 mm long, brassy or golden green overall, with darker, metallic, emerald green wing covers. Photos and additional information can be found at the United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service web site






and genuinely cares about those we serve. We cherish his longevity, history of giving, both in-kind and monetary, as well as bringing new people into the fold."








Civil War Re-enactors to Highlight Rededication of Civil War Gravestones on September 12



FALL PROGRAMS

The following computer classes are recommended for ages 13 and older. There is a \$10.00 refundable deposit for each class, due at the time of registration. Non-Residents will be placed on a waiting list and will be contacted if space becomes available. Residents on the waiting list will be given priority over non-residents on the waiting list. Deposits will not be refunded unless cancellation is made at least 24 hours in advance of the class start time.

INTRODUCTION TO WORD

Tuesday August 10, 2:00 - 4:00 p.m.

Instructor: Sean

This class will be aimed at those with little or no experience using Microsoft Word. Topics such as creating and saving files, formatting, and editing documents will be covered. There will be time available for questions and specific problems related to Microsoft Word. (Having taken "Understanding Windows 1" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

INTRODUCTION TO EXCEL

Wednesday August 11, 6:30 - 8:30 p.m.

Instructor: Sean

This class will cover the basic concepts creating and using spreadsheets. (Having taken "Introduction to using Microsoft Word" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

USING THE INTERNET 2

Tuesday August 17, 2:00 - 4:00 p.m.

Instructor: Sean

In Using Internet 2 we will add to and expand on the topics covered in Using the Internet. Subjects such as browser options, adding links, downloading, advanced searching, high speed Internet access, and more will be covered. (Having taken Using the Internet or similar experience is recommended.)

UNDERSTANDING YOUR COMPUTER 3

Wednesday August 18, 6:30 - 8:30 p.m.

Instructor: Sean

The final session of Understanding Your Computer will cover more advanced hardware topics. Learning to install, remove, and update components of the computer will be covered, as well as understanding the basics of how they work. Understanding device drivers and why they're important will also be discussed. (Having taken "Understanding Your Computer 1 & 2" is strongly recommended.)

GENEALOGY ONLINE

Thursday August 19, 7:00 - 8:45 p.m.

Our local history librarian will demonstrate various genealogy online sources, highlighting AncestryPlus, Heritage Quest and Illinois databases. In addition, she will describe other resources such as Roots.web, the American Family Immigration History Center, Family Search, National Obituary Archive, and the Master Cemetery Index.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Wednesday August 25, 6:30 - 8:30 p.m.

Instructor: Sean

This is intended as an opportunity for students to ask about questions or topics that they have trouble with or want to know more about. Internet/Email, Office programs, general computing, and more are all fair game. A numbered system will be used to try and regulate the questions so every participant gets approximately an equal number of turns. Please come to the class prepared with questions to ask. The instructor may not be able to answer questions relating specifically to your computer.

USING EMAIL 2

Tuesday August 31, 2:00 - 4:00 p.m.

Instructor: Sean

Using Email 2 takes users beyond the basics of sending and receiving Email and teaches them to take advantage of the many features their Email services provide. Topics such as attachments, folders, address books, mail options, spam protection, and more will be covered. (Having taken Using Email or similar experience is recommended.)

This six-session course will cover a wide range of computer topics. It is intended to give students a strong foundation in computing, teaching them general computer/Windows principles, using the Internet, and familiarity with Microsoft Office products. The skills learned here will help to prepare the student for whatever computing task interests them. Please see the following Course Outline for more information

Adults Computer Course Outline

Sessions 1 and 2:

Very basic introduction to computers and how we use them. Topics such as learning how to use disks and CD-ROMs, becoming comfortable with the mouse, using windows, and running programs.

Discussion will continue over first two classes with recommended practice exercises given after both session 1 and 2.

Sessions 3 and 4:

These two classes will introduce participants to using the Internet. Basic understanding of connecting and using the World Wide Web will be covered as well as more detailed E-Mail questions and introducing more complicated Internet topics such as downloading, searching, and using multimedia products online (music, movies, games, etc.).

The third class will cover most of the topics covered in "Introduction to the Internet and E-Mail" with a few changes to better suit the class. In the fourth session we will fill in E-Mail and Browser details missing from the third session and begin with the complicated topics discussed above.

Sessions 5 and 6:

The final two sessions of this course will introduce the Microsoft Office Suite, paying particular attention to MS Word but also introducing products such as Excel, Power Point, and Publisher, while discussing the Office environment. These classes should provide enough comfort to get started in any MS Office program.

Intermediate Excel

Wednesday September 15, 6:30 - 8:30 p.m.

Instructor: Sean

This class covers more advanced topics in Excel such as formulas, graphs and linking between multiple worksheets. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Excel" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

Advanced Excel

Wednesday September 22, 6:30 - 8:30 p.m.

Instructor: Sean

This class will provide a deeper investigation of Excel topics introduced in the Intermediate Excel course, as well as examining other functions provided by Excel. (Having taken "Intermediate Excel" is recommended.)

Résumé Writing/Online Job Hunting Wednesday September 29, 6:30 - 8:30 p.m.

Instructor: Sean

In this class students will learn how to use Microsoft Word to create sharp, easily read and understood résumés. They will also learn how to create accounts and perform searches with online job finding sites such as Hotjobs and Monster. This course is about the technical skills required to create the résumés, not about proper style, content, or design. The instructor cannot offer judgment on the content of your resume. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Word" is helpful but not necessary.)




