## From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

People are always asking me "What's new in Bloomingdale?" So this column is dedicated to filling you in on what's in process and what's down the road in our fair town.

Many of you probably read about the sale of Stratford Square which took place at the end of last year. Feldman Mall Properties has acquired the mall and is committed to putting approximately \$10-20 million into Stratford. Anticipated improvements include a strong focus on restaurants and streetscape dining, refurbishing and expanding the theaters to include stadium seating, re-doing the entrances and the washrooms, and creating additional casual seating areas in the mall, as well as enhancements to both the natural and artificial lighting and improvements to the overall sign package at the mall.

Feldman Mall Properties goes back two generations in the real estate businesses and they have a good track record in revitalizing malls. I believe they are going to be a successful force in Bloomingdale.

Other "coming attractions" in the retail field include Meijer's, whose grand opening is currently set for May 17, 2005. Meijer's is located at the northwest corner of Gary Avenue and Schick Road. We are also looking forward to Staples Office Supply, a 20,000 square foot building being built at Army Trail Road & Madsen, near Costco and a 14,000 sq. ft. Ace Hardware currently under construction at the corner of Springfield Drive & Lake Streets. We anticipate openings later this year on both of these. Joining other recent additions in Bloomingdale Court on Army Trail Road will be Potbelly Sandwich Works (with outdoor seating just in time for the summer weather) and Dick's Sporting Goods. We are also hoping to see a Cost Plus World Market there.

And on the residential horizon, we have some exciting newcomers. Currently under construction is the Villa Veneto project on Lake Street. Seventy-four townhome units are slated for the 20-plus acre parcel. Constructed by Orleans Builders (formerly Realen Homes), sales (continued on page 3)



have been reported in the lower \$400's.

Recently approved was Fountains of Bloomingdale. This complex of 132 town-homes and 80 condominiums in two four-story buildings is being developed by Gettysburg. The townhomes will be located on the northeast edge of the Stratford Square Mall property at the corner of Springfield Drive and Schick Road. The condos will be located on the southern portion of the mall property just behind the Courtyard and Residence Inn and next to the wetlands. Also under construction is Casa Bella, a townhouse development on east side of Medinah Road, south of Lake Street. Nitti Custom Builders is building 24 units there, with sale prices estimated at \$450,000 and over.

Additionally, two senior housing developments by Alden Realty Services were recently approved. Alden Horizon, to be constructed at Lake Street & South Maple, will feature independent living in 91 rental units in three-story buildings for seniors aged 62 and over. The Alden Gardens development is slated for Army Trail Road, between Glen Ellyn Road and Brookdale. It will consist of one five-story building with 78 assisted living studio-type apartments, accommodating up to 88 occupants.

We have some more "maybes" out there, which I'll be happy to share with you once we have firm commitments from businesses and developers. Enjoy Spring – that is, if it ever gets here!

## Remember to Practice Dog-gone Good Manners With Fido!

Remember to keep your dog(s) on a leash. It is illegal in Bloomingdale to allow dogs to run uncontrolled or to chase people or vehicles. It is also against our ordinance to allow your dog to damage property, or to bark, whine or howl excessively. Remember also –please clean up after your dog. This too, is required by law.



#### Don't be a Garbage Grinch!

Garbage containers and refuse shall not be set out earlier than 6:00 p.m. on the night before collection. All containers and refuse shall be removed from the specified location no later than the sundown on the day it was collected.

Garbage cannot be burned, buried, or illegally dumped on another person's property or public property. We also suggest you mark your garbage containers and recycle bins with your address. Sometimes high winds can result in containers drifting into the roadways or other yards. Without identification, the containers may not be returned.

If you have a dog which is not currently licensed, please do so. Proof of a current rabies inoculation is required. There is no charge for the dog license.

## Spring Curbside Branch Collection Set for Week of April 18

Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will once again perform branch collection under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. Branch collection will begin on Monday, April 18th. The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

#### **BRANCH COLLECTION GUIDELINES:**

- Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, April 18.
- Woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).
- Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

#### The following items are unacceptable:


- Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- Woody branches under 1/2 inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under 1/2 inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- Large stumps, roots and root balls.\*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.\*


The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Browning Ferris Industries pick-up (our refuse hauler). BFI yard waste pick-ups commence April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning BFI pick-ups should be directed to 847-429-7370.

\*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds. Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but require a special pickup. Contact BFI for more information.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.

#### Distinguished Alumni Inducted Into Wall of Hame



#### Hussle Up the Hancock






## Safety on Wheels |

Playing where you live is lots of fun, but you need to play safely. Obey the safety rules for everything that you do.

Skates and skateboards: Wear protective gear before you use any kind of roller skate or skateboard. When you skate you should wear a helmet, elbow pads, wrist guards, gloves, and kneepads. Remember not to wear anything that keeps you from seeing or hearing well. Don't hitch rides on the back of buses, cars, trucks, or vans, and don't skate at night. Skate in a safe place. Avoid places where there is water, oil, sand, gravel or dirt. Never skate where there are cars. In order to have the safest and most enjoyable time skating, take lessons or learn from someone who can teach you the basics of turning, braking, stopping and controlling your speed.

**Bicycles:** About 1,000 American bicyclists die in crashes every year. About three-fourths of them die from head injuries. Hundreds more suffer permanent brain damage. Most of these head injuries can be prevented with bike helmets.

When you ride a bike, be sure to wear a helmet that fits well and feels comfortable. It can protect you from serious injury in case of an accident. Fasten the strap securely. The helmet should sit evenly on top of your head, not slide around your head or pull off with the strap fastened.

Before you ride your bike, check that:

- ☐ the seat is secure
- ☐ the wheels have no loose or broken spokes
- ☐ the tires are inflated to the proper pressure (this is printed on the tire)
- ☐ the brakes work smoothly and quickly
- ☐ the handlebar is tight and in the correct position
- reflectors are clean and on tightly
- ☐ there are no cracked parts on the bike

If you find any problems, have your bike inspected by a bicycle mechanic.



Be aware of traffic. Stop, look left, look right, and then left again for cars and other moving objects before leaving a sidewalk, driveway or alley. Enter the roadway only when it is clear. When you ride in traffic, you can maneuver better than the cars around you. Most bicyclists get into accidents because they are tempted to ignore traffic rules. Being predictable is the key to safe bicycling in traffic. The basic rules for riding predictably are:

Get smart -- know the rules

Be confident -- learn riding skills and always be courteous

Communicate -- make eye contact, signal your moves, and wave when someone yields

By wearing the proper protective equipment at all times and being aware of what's happening around you, you can have a safe and enjoyable summer on wheels.







#### **30 YEARS OF SERVICE 1975-2005**

Often it takes the slow march of time to really mark the important changes in our lives. This summer we will mark the outstanding changes that have taken place at your local library. It was in 1975 when Director Sue Schlaf opened the doors to a 1,600 square foot library. The new Bloomingdale Public Library was officially dedicated on June 9, 1975.

Over the past 30 years, the Village of Bloomingdale has grown from a 1970 population of 2,974 to over 21,000 today. Along with the population, the library services available to residents have also grown. With humble beginnings in 1975, the library offered residents a collection of 4,500 adult and juvenile books, a staff of three and over 30 volunteers providing 28 hours of service each week.

The Bloomingdale Public Library has a rich history of progressive thinking and community involvement. Since 30 years ago when the library opened in mobile classrooms to today's impressive state-of-the-art facility, the residents of Bloomingdale have been instrumental in improving library services. With financial support, professional development, and time commitments. Bloomingdale's library has evolved to a staff of over 50 people providing 68 hours of service each week. The library offers remote access to research databases 24 hours a day. We also have 52 patron computers, wireless WI-FI Internet, and an Online Public Access Catalog which gives users direct access to our holdings, as well as the holdings of seven area libraries. We are committed to continuing the tradition of linking resources and residents to enhance lifelong learning.

This 30 year transformation is due in large part to the commitment of the residents of Bloomingdale, cooperation between the library and the Village, and the dedication of the library staff. It is my job to ensure that the future looks just as bright as our impressive past. Recently we undertook a community based Long Range Plan that will help chart the course of the library for years to come.

To mark and celebrate our 30th anniversary the Bloomingdale Public Library will hold a day of celebration on Saturday, June 11th. Details will be forthcoming, so mark your calendar for a day of family fun.

It is intended to give students a strong foundation in computing, general computer/Windows principles, using the Internet, and familiarity with Microsoft Office products.
