





Gazebo Parking Lot to be Closed During Reconstruction of Parking Lot Between the Village Hall and Founders Park

Beginning in July and continuing through mid-October, the Village of Bloomingdale will be reconstructing the parking lot between the Founders Park Gazebo and the Village Hall and west of the access drive from Fairfield Way. The project consists of the complete removal and replacement of the pavement and underlying unstable soils, with a stabilized stone sub-grade and asphalt pavement. Unique to this project is the innovative use of an 'environmentally' friendly pavement system to be constructed in the driveway area which allows rain runoff to percolate down to an under drain system; filtrating pollutants from the storm water before discharging to the storm system and ultimately the East Branch of the DuPage River.

Another 'green' feature proposed in the parking lot will be a 'bio-swale' planted with native perennial plants and shrubs. The bio-swale accepts rain run-off; absorbing and filtering sediments and pollutants before discharging the storm water to a under drain system. In addition to being environmentally friendly, the proposed design will mitigate ground water flows which currently move toward the recently reconstructed Library parking lot. Intercepting this water will extend the Library parking lot useful life.

During construction, the Gazebo parking lot will be closed. Access to the Library building will be maintained at all times via the main Library Entrance. Parking will be available at all times in the parking lot immediately adjacent to the west Library Entrance, in the Village Hall parking lot to the north of the Library, or on Fairfield Way to the south of the Library. Access to/from the Library parking lot will vary depending on the stage of construction. Please watch for the directional signage to facilitate access and locate parking during the construction. Parking will be permitted on Fairfield Way and Milford, and in the Village Hall parking lot north of the Library.

One other feature of the parking lot re-construction will be the installation of a new tent anchor system to continue the ever popular Village/Library events such as the Summer Reading Celebration/Ice Cream Social, Roy's Fish Fry and the Halloween Party. While some of these events may be held at alternative locations this year due

to the construction, the Village is certain that the parking lot re-construction will completed in time to celebrate Halloween under the tent at the end of October.



- **4.** Plan to attend a college, university, or trade school after graduation from high school or is currently enrolled in a college, university, or trade school

Need to Get Rid of Latex Paint? DuPage County Has a Program for You!

The DuPage County Public Works has a program to recycle unwanted latex paint, as well as a program to get free latex paint.

Drop Off Unwanted Paint

Residents can drop off their unwanted latex paint to the Latex Paint
Recycling Facility during the designated 2005 summer collections at the following times. The
usable latex paint will be filtered and re-blended into a variety of colors, types, and finishes.

Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. (June 1st – August 13th, excluding holidays)

Selected Saturdays from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. (June 11th, June 25th, July 9th, July 23rd and August 13th)

Pick Up Free Latex Paint

Usable latex paint that is dropped off by residents during designated collections is inspected, sorted, filtered and then re-blended into five gallon buckets of recycled paint. The end product is a quality-recycled paint available in a variety of colors, types, and finishes. Residents, businesses, schools, churches, and community groups can obtain five gallon buckets of the quality-recycled paint for free during the week.

Paint can be picked up while supply lasts:



Volunteers Plant 200 Seedlings at Public Works Facility

Volunteers Chris, Gail, Matt and Steven Brewer, Karen Del Campo, Bob & JoEllen Iden, Jimmy and Alexxis Johnson, Julie Newberg-LaBant, Helen Price, Juana Stoiser, Dennis Szafran and Georgette West joined Jim Johnson, urban forester and Andy DiBasilio, street maintenance worker on Saturday, May 7 in planting 200 seedling trees – Japanese tree lilacs, sargent crabapples and swamp white oaks.

These tree seedlings will be nurtured for two to three years at the Grow Center located at the Public Works Facility. The young trees will then be planted out at the Village Nursery, located on Cardinal Drive at Wellhouse #3, where they will remain for an additional two to three years, or until they reach maturity. Once mature, the trees will be utilized throughout Village parks, parkways, and landscape projects.

Mosquitoes and West Nile Virus – 2005 Update

West Nile Virus, a disease transmitted by mosquitoes, was first discovered in the Chicago area in 2001 after making its first U.S. appearance in New York City in 1999. The 2002 outbreak resulted in over 800 confirmed cases in Illinois. According to the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), the 2002 outbreak in Illinois occurred during a summer with above normal temperatures. Although Illinois experienced far fewer cases in the summers of 2003 and 2004, the IDPH believes if a hot summer occurs, there is significant risk of another outbreak in Illinois.

The virus, which can cause encephalitis, is transferred when mosquitoes that have bitten a bird carrying the virus then bite a human. The virus is not spread by person-to-person or bird-to-person contact. Symptoms of the disease are initially similar to the flu, with muscle weakness and disorientation. Though the majority of those infected will have mild symptoms or no symptoms at all, in some individuals, West Nile Virus can cause inflammation of the brain (encephalitis) and in severe cases, paralysis, coma or death. The disease is most serious – even fatal – in those with compromised immune systems and the elderly.

Adequate mosquito control is important. Bloomingdale Township, by contract with Clarke Mosquito, is the agency responsible for mosquito abatement services throughout the Township, which includes the Village of Bloomingdale. Clarke's mosquito abatement services include chemical larviciding and spraying.

Larviciding is performed at locations where mosquito larvae are present. Larviciding eliminates mosquito larvae, reducing the number of future adult biting mosquitoes.

Spraying for adult mosquitoes reduces the local adult biting mosquito population. The product used by Clarke is environmentally safe for use in residential areas. This product is used in very low doses and therefore is considered not harmful to most adults, children and household pets. If there is any concern of allergy or of chemical sensitivity, residents can request to be placed on a call list for advance notice of pesticide use. Residents may report these and any other concerns directly to Clarke Mosquito Control at its "Mosquito Hotline," 1-800-942-2555.

Nonchemical mosquito control. Mosquito larvae must live in still water for five or more days to complete their growth before changing into adult biting mosquitoes capable of transmitting disease. Often, the number of mosquitoes in an area can be reduced by removing sources of standing water around residences. For example, hundreds of mosquitoes can come from a single discarded tire.

TO PREVENT MOSQUITO PRODUCTION AND PREVENT MOSQUITO BITES:

- Remove and properly dispose of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles or any water-holding containers.
- Fill in or drain any low places (puddles, ruts, etc.) in your yard.
- Keep drains, ditches and culverts free of weeds and trash so water will drain properly.
- Keep roof gutters free of leaves and other debris.
- · Cover trash containers to keep out rainwater.
- Repair leaky pipes and outside faucets.
- Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week and store indoors when not in use.
 - Unused swimming pools should be drained and kept dry during the mosquito season.
 - Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water.
 - Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least once each week.
 - Keep grass cut and shrubbery well trimmed around the house.
 - Make sure ornamental ponds have fish that will eat mosquito larvae.
 - Repair window screens.
- When outdoors in the evening or when mosquitoes are biting, use personal protection measures to prevent mosquito bites (proper use of insect repellent and appropriate clothing).

Blue jays and crows appear to be highly sensitive to West Nile Virus. Residents who find a blue jay or crow that appears to have died as a result of natural causes should contact Public Works Maintenance at 671-5800. We will assist residents in retrieval of dead blue jays and crows and provide notification to the DuPage County Health Department. We regret that we are unable to assist in the disposal of any other dead birds.

Blue jay: 12", bright blue above with much white and black in the wings and tail; dingy white below; black facial markings; prominent crest.

Crow: 17" to 21", stocky, all black, including feathers, beak, legs and feet

(Grackles are smaller than crows, 11 to 13 inches in length. The head has a purple or green iridescent sheen; the rest of the body is black or brown-black. The eyes are yellow. The tail feathers are nearly as long as its body. Starlings are robin-sized birds with black spotted feathers, yellow beaks and yellow feet.)

Living With Wildlife

The presence of wild animals in our village reflects their ability to adapt to the urbanization of their native habitat. Although it may seem that these wild animals use this urban environment at the expense of their human neighbors (creating a disturbance or causing property damage, earning the "nuisance" wildlife reputation), these animals are behaving naturally.

In an effort to limit human-wildlife conflicts, we encourage homeowners to take the following preventive action:

- Do not feed wild animals.
- Keep pet food/water dishes inside, especially at night.
- Clean up spillage from bird feeders.
- Keep grills/barbecues clean; even the smallest food scraps may attract wild animals.

 Keep trash cans inside if possible; if this is not possible, place ammonia-soaked rags on top of the lid and secure with

bungee cords.

• Trim tree limbs that provide easy access to your roof.

Repair broken, weak, or rotted areas on your roof, soffit and fascia.

 Install and maintain chimney caps.


Use welded wire to
 exclude animals from underneath decks, elevated sheds,
 openings under concrete slabs and porches.

- Secure outside access to crawl spaces.
- Cover window wells (if an animal falls in, carefully place a roughened board into the window well at a 45° angle; the animal should climb out at night).

Teacher of the Year Joan Nelson flanked by Erickson Principal John Markgraf and nominating student Nicole Moore.



Village code enforcement personnel perform exterior property maintenance inspections throughout the Village. If violations are found, the property owner will be sent a letter requesting compliance within a reasonable amount of time, based upon the severity of the violation. Please take a few minutes to examine your property for potential violations.

Common property maintenance violations include:

- ☐ Grass/Plant growth exceeding ten [10] inches in height.
- Accumulation of trash and debris on the premises.
- Vehicles parked in yards on unimproved surfaces [grass].
- ☐ Inoperable vehicles parked on the premises.
- ☐ Conditions of your home's exterior including, but not limited to, building paint or stain finishes, roofing and rain gutter systems, property drainage, etc..
- ☐ House address numbers that are not clearly visible from the street.

The Village looks forward to working with residents to continue to improve the appearance of our community. The Village continues to receive compliments on the overall appearance of the community. Both residential and commercial properties are inspected as part of this program. Got a Recreational Vehicle? Read On About Regulations Regarding Where They Can be Parked

Recreational vehicles and/or trailers on residentially zoned properties, along with site specific requirements, are subject to regulations as described in Ordinance No. 2003-41.

These prohibit parking a recreational vehicle and/or trailer in a front yard, including a front yard driveway. Corner property side-yards are regulated the same as front yards. Also regulated are allowable driveway pavement types, width, location and street access-curb cut allowances. Recreational vehicles and/or trailers are required to be screened from view by means of landscaping or fencing, depending on site specific conditions, as outlined in the ordinance.

Planning a Garage Sale?

Here are a couple of things to remember:

There is no cost or permit necessary to hold a garage or yard sale, however, the person conducting the sale must notify the police department of the sale prior to the start of the sale.

No more than three rummage or garage sales may be held on the same premises in any calendar year. Each may not be more than 3 consecutive days and can only take place between the hours of 9 a.m. and 6 p.m.

There are also requirements relative to garage sale signs, including size and placement restrictions.



Upon retirement, she says she will miss her fellow staff members most. "People lock arms and help each other here," she says. "No matter what you ask, someone will help."



Fireworks are best enjoyed by watching PROFESSIONAL demonstrations.

But, if you insist on purchasing and lighting fireworks, please follow these guidelines:

- ▲ Purchase fireworks from a reputable dealer
- ▲ Follow the laws: Use common sense
- ▲ Store fireworks in a cool, dry place
- ▲ Children should not handle fireworks
- ▲ Do not use alcohol with fireworks
- ▲ Only use fireworks outdoors
- ▲ Use fireworks on a hard surface and in a clear, open area.
- ▲ Keep clear of the fireworks
- ▲ Use care in lighting the fireworks
- ▲ Do not use malfunctioning or "Dud" items
- ▲ Do not smoke while handling
- ▲ Be cautious of lighting fireworks during windy conditions
- ▲ Have water close by

On that day, Life Line Screening will scan the carotid artery in the neck to check for plaque build up, which can lead to stroke (75% of all strokes are linked to carotid artery blockage). Tests are also available on the arteries in the legs to check for peripheral arterial disease, which is linked to heart disease. Life Line also offers a third test for aneurysm in the aortic vessel in the abdomen. A bone density test for osteoporosis will also be available. These tests, which are non-invasive and completely painless and take only about 10 minutes each, are offered for \$45 a piece. The three vascular screenings together are \$109.00, a savings of \$26.00.

This is a preventative program, and with early detection, these problems can be treated. The test results are sent directly to you, and referred back to your own doctor.

Fire Safe Landscaping Can Save Your Home

Regardless of where you live, fire-safe landscaping is an effective tool that creates a defensible area between your home and flammable vegetation. The United States Fire Administration encourages you to keep fire safety in mind by learning how to landscape and maintain your property to minimize possible fire damage and to slow fires if they start. Remember – fire safety is your personal responsibility – Fire Stops With You!

In a fire situation, dead trees and shrubs surrounding your home act as fuel for fire. The choice of plants, spacing, and maintenance are crucial elements in any defensible space-landscaping plan.

- ☐ Remove all dead plants, trees and shrubs from the site.
- ☐ Reduce excess leaves, plant parts and low-hanging branches.
- ☐ Create a defensible space perimeter by thinning trees and brush within 30 feet around your home.
- ☐ Beyond 30 feet, remove dead wood, debris and low branches
- ☐ Eliminate small trees and plants growing under trees. They allow ground fires to jump into the tops of the trees. Try to space any new trees 30 feet apart and prune to a height of eight to ten feet.
- Plant the most drought-tolerant vegetation within three feet of your home and adjacent to structures to prevent ignition.
- ☐ Landscape your property with fire-resistant plants and vegetation to prevent fire from spreading quickly. There are no "fire-proof" plants. Select high moisture plants that grow close to the ground and have low sap or resin content. Fireresistant shrubs include hedging roses, bush honeysuckles, currant, cotoneaster, sumac, and shrub apples. Plant hardwood, maple, poplar and cherry trees that are less flammable than pine, fir and other conifers.

☐ Maintain a well-pruned and watered landscape to serve as a green belt and protection against fire.

- ☐ Trim grass on a regular basis up to 100 feet surrounding your home.
- ☐ Stack firewood at least 30 feet from your home.
- ☐ Store flammable materials, liquids and solvents in metal containers outside the home at least 30 feet away from structures and wooden fences.


No matter where you live, always install smoke detectors on every level of your home. Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year. Consider installing the new long-life smoke detectors.







ADULTS COMPUTER COURSE OUTLINE

This six-session course will cover a wide range of computer topics. It is intended to give students a strong foundation in computing, teaching them general computer/Windows principles, using the Internet, and familiarity with Microsoft Office products. The skills learned here will help to prepare the student for whatever computing task interests them. Please see the following Course Outline for more information.

Sessions 1 and 2:

Very basic introduction to computers and how we use them. Topics such as learning how to use disks and CD-ROMs, becoming comfortable with the mouse, using windows, and running programs.

Discussion will continue over first two classes with recommended practice exercises given after both session 1 and 2.

Sessions 3 and 4:

These two classes will introduce participants to using the Internet. Basic understanding of connecting and using the World Wide Web will be covered as well as more detailed email questions and introducing more complicated Internet topics such as downloading, searching, and using multimedia products online (music, movies, games, etc.).

Sessions 5 and 6:

The final two sessions of this course will introduce the Microsoft Office Suite, paying particular attention to MS Word but also introducing products such as Excel, Power Point, and Publisher, while discussing the Office environment. These classes should provide enough comfort to get started in any MS Office program.



INTERMEDIATE ACCESS

Wednesday, June 29 6:30 p.m. - 8:30 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This class will cover more advanced topics such as Edit Masking, advanced Queries, Relational Databases, and using Wizards. (Having taken Introduction to Microsoft Access or equivalent experience is recommended.)

USING THE INTERNET

This course will cover from the most basic Internet questions and topics to more intermediate material such as search engines and downloading. This class is intended for those with little or no computer experience.

This class will teach the basic skills required to use the Bloomingdale Library's scanner and two sample digital cameras. Techniques taught will include taking pictures, viewing them on the camera, transferring them to a computer, and acquiring text and/or images from the scanner. While all digital cameras are different, the same basic principles will apply to the student's cameras as those used in class. It is recommended that students have basic experience using Windows so that you are comfortable pointing and clicking and following instructions.


