### From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

This unusually busy, as well as exceptionally destructive, hurricane season was a major news topic for much of the month of September. There is no doubt the New Orleans and the Gulfport areas will be working at rebuilding for a long time. The initial shock and empathy for those many people who lost everything was felt throughout the country and many grassroots projects sprung up to help out.

The Village of Bloomingdale was no exception. Recently retired Assistant Fire Chief Bill Wolff came to my office the week before Labor Day to suggest a Village-wide effort with the help of our many community organizations to collect and send items desperately needed to those towns in most need. Within a few days representatives of various organizations and interested residents came together and a plan began.

We made contact with officials from Wiggins, Mississippi, the County Seat of Stone County, just north of Gulfport. Beginning on Saturday, September 10 and continuing through September 24, we compiled over 100 skids of new and used clothing, shoes, toiletries, housewares, toys, food, cleaning products and school supplies. Our residents and those of neighboring towns were very generous. So too, were several businesses in Bloomingdale and the surrounding area.

Starting with Monte & Rick Strusiner of Craig Stevens Development who graciously allowed us the use of the empty Sears Hardware store, the following companies lent us or

donated items to the cause - everything from trucks and pallets to boxes and packing tape to snacks for volunteers:





# Having ICE Programmed Into Your Cell Phone Could Make a Life or Death Difference in an Emergency

A new statewide initiative is encouraging Illinoisans to save "In Case of Emergency" entries in their personal cell phones under the acronym "ICE". That information could then be accessed by emergency personnel at an accident scene or in the hospital emergency room to contact a family member or friend, who could provide potentially life-saving medical details about the incapacitated victim.

Cell phones have become extremely common – everyone from school-aged children to senior citizens carry phones most of the time. That makes cell phones an ideal place to store critical contact information that could help save a life in an emergency situation. Statistics indicate that in 2003, over 900,000 emergency room patients could not provide contact information because they were incapacitated.

When seconds matter, having ICE contacts in your wireless phone may mean the difference between life and death. Paramedics, police and firefighters often lose valuable time trying to figure out which name in a cell phone to call when disaster strikes. ICE contacts will enable emergency personnel to quickly obtain vital information from a loved one about such things as medications and allergies.

Cell phone users can easily create entries such as "ICE – Mom" or "ICE – Katie" to let emergency workers know quickly who to contact if they are unable to communicate. Additional emergency contacts can be listed by simply noting ICE1, ICE 2, etc.

Although word about ICE is spreading quickly over the Internet on a grassroots basis and in news reports, Illinois is the first state to officially launch a program to promote it. Governor Rod Blagojevich has directed all state emergency personnel to look for ICE numbers when helping individuals who are unconscious or otherwise unable to provide personal information. Roadside signs maintained by the Illinois State Tollway Authority and the Illinois Department of Transportation now flash reminders to motorists to add ICE information to their cell phones.



The response to our Hurricane Katrina Collection was overwhelming!

Thanks to the generosity of so many people we were able

to help even more people than anticipated!



- ▲ On Wednesday, September 21, we sent a 28-foot truck with 10 pallets of clothing, food, personal hygiene products, baby supplies and household goods to Aurora where families are being relocated from Mississippi, Louisiana and Alabama. There are currently 20 families there, with 130 more on their way. The Marywood Apartments have set aside a total of 150 apartments for evacuees. They have been arriving with no more than a duffle bag, and the clothes on their back. Three of the ladies are expecting any day.
- ▲ On Thursday, September 22, we added three pallets of clothes and two pallets of toys to a truck bound for Clarksdale, Mississippi being sent by School District 15. The teachers and school children of the district adopted the school district in Clarksdale and had been collecting school supplies, clothing and money to send to these youngsters and their families.
- ▲ On Sunday, September 25, we sent a 53-foot truck to Stone County Fairgrounds in Mississippi filled with clothing & shoes, bedding, non-perishable food, baby supplies, cleaning supplies, toys, school supplies, personal hygiene products, tools, pet food and supplies, over-the-counter medicines and medical supplies.
- ▲ The last 53-foot truck left later during the week of September 25 to take the last truckful (and we do mean full) of the rest of the donations as listed above to the Gulfport, Mississippi area, just south of Wiggins. There are several small towns in that area which are in great need.

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# 2006 Tree Planting Planting Program

The Village Board has again allocated funds for this very successful program which was started in 1982. For the sev-

enth year, additional funds have been included for business/commercial properties. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be planted next Spring and are available for street parkways, residential front yards and business/school/commercial properties. Business/school/commercial properties that wish to participate should contact Jim Johnson, Urban Forester, at 630-671-5804.

The following are the guidelines of the program:

- ☐ Since the budget is limited, the program will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be submitted by December 1, 2005. No payment is required at this time. Bills will be sent about February 1, 2006.
- ☐ Trees will be 2 1/2 inch caliper, unless stated otherwise. Trees will be quality nursery stock but not specimen plants.
- ☐ The Village reserves the right to disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing.
- □ Removal of dead trees, stumps and/or large roots is not included and must be performed by participants before March 15th.
- Each residential parcel will be limited to two trees per year.
   Each business/commercial property will be limited to four trees per year.
- Participants will be given the opportunity to mark the desired location for the tree; however, the Village retains the right to change the location, if necessary.
- ☐ We anticipate the cost of 2 1/2" Japanese Lila caliper trees to be between \$250 and \$350 each, with the Village paying half of the amount.

- ☐ Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Participants are responsible for all watering which will be described in instructions furnished by the Village.
- ☐ For trees to be planted in the public parkway, this application will serve as the permit requirements of the ordinance regulating trees on public areas.





The Bloomingdale Leos Club






# Keep Your Trick or Treaters Safe & Happy This Halloween



#### The Teeing Ground

In this issue we would like to provide you, the golfer, with a little bit of insight from our golf course grounds department. Now that the golf season is winding down and the fall season is upon us, we encounter two evil necessities; aerification of greens and tees and frost delays.

The first necessity many golfers ask is, "Why do you have to aerify the greens and fairways"? Here are two primary reasons:

- Compaction of the turf and soil as a result of equipment, cart and player traffic is alleviated, allowing for healthier turf.
- Over time, the accumulation of organic matter, such as thatch and fine particle (silt and/or clay), accumulates and produces a surface that is less porous. Aerification opens up the surfaces and allows for air, moisture, and fertilizer to reach below the surface.

The other common question or issue is, frost delay. Why are golfers delayed from playing golf on a bright, crisp sunny morning with frost all around? The answer to that question is simple. The golf course superintendent is protecting the health of the turf. What is occurring when you see frost is that ice crystals have formed on the surface of the grass blades making them brittle enough to break off at their base when stepped on. When this grass is walked on, unsightly damage is done to the turf, which can take a long period of time to recover. Have you ever walked on your lawn when it was covered with frost and a few days later you see your foot prints? There is your answer.

As for golfing, here is some upcoming information and activity.

to save and preserve historic artifacts in a safe, accessible location for all residents to enjoy.



#### **Street Sweeping**

The Village provides street sweeping services through a private contractor periodically throughout the year. Several sweeps are scheduled to take place in the fall. Street sweeping maintains the Village's attractive appearance, while reducing the potential for flooding caused by debris at curb lines.

#### Leaf Disposal

The Village does not provide leaf collection services, and residents are reminded that raking and/or blowing leaves into the street is a violation of Village Ordinance #2000-10, which prohibits the dumping or placing of any waste upon any Village street or other public property.

Residents are encouraged to participate in Allied Waste Industries' (formerly (BFI) yard waste/leaf collection program. Leaves and yard waste placed in yard waste bags or cans (with handles) will be picked up by Allied Waste on regular trash days through November 30th. Weight limit of each bag or can is 50 pounds. A yard waste sticker (\$1.58 each) must be affixed to each bag or can. Stickers can be purchased at the Village Hall, Bloomingdale Pharmacy, and local Butera, Dominicks and Jewel Food Stores. Questions concerning the yard waste/leaf collection program can be directed to Allied Waste at 847-429-7370.

#### **Avoid Flooding Problems**

If we get some typically heavy fall rainstorms, homeowners could experience flooding problems. Village Services provides some tips to help alleviate potential problems.

- Make sure the sump pump is working properly and is large enough. Many times smaller pumps or older pumps cannot handle large amounts of water which results in an overflow.
- Sump pumps should be connected to a backup source of power such as a battery or generator in case of an electricity failure. Make sure the pump and sump-pit are clear of debris.
- The sump pump or other foundation debris should not be connected to the sanitary sewer. If this connection is made it will cause the sanitary drains (toilets, sinks, basement floor drain, etc.) to backup during heavy rains. This may also cause an overload in the main lines and contribute to backups to your home and neighboring homes.
- To prevent leakage from basement window wells, installing new windows or glass block windows should help solve the problem. However, homeowners should check with Building and Zoning Division to make sure they are following proper building codes to maintain escape exits and ventilation requirements.
- While some landscaping may prevent flooding for homeowners, it might also cause their neighbor's property or home to flood. Landscaping, fences and other obstacles are usually to blame for blocking the designed overland flow routes. When performing such work on your property be aware of, be careful not to alter, the drainage patterns in your yard.

#### Before the Snow Flies . . . Please Winterize Your Mailbox

Residents are requested to inspect mailboxes and posts to ensure sturdiness and compliance with the postal service installation requirements, and correct any problem identified. If you have questions as to whether or not your mailbox is in compliance with Village requirements, you may contact the Village Services Department – Street Maintenance Division at 671-5800.

Also, if ornamental rocks or planters are used for landscape beautification, residents need to ensure that they are a minimum of three feet in back of the curb or pavement on noncurb streets. If deemed necessary for safe snow removal operations, these obstacles will be removed by the Village.

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### Carbon Monoxide 🛭

Each year, hundreds of people in the U.S. die from carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning in the home. Thousands more become ill and require medical treatment. Some people, like children and unborn babies, older people, and people with heart and lung diseases are at a greater risk for CO poisoning.

CO is an odorless, colorless gas produced by burning fuel. In the home, dangerous levels of CO can occur if fuel-burning appliances are not working properly or are used incorrectly. Furnaces, water heaters, and other appliances can all be sources of CO if they are improperly installed or maintained, damaged, malfunctioning, improperly ventilated, or used other than for their intended purpose. Read the manufacturer's instructions carefully.

Any appliance or vehicle that runs on oil, natural gas, kerosene, propane, wood, or gasoline can produce CO. Common sources around the house include: furnaces and water heaters, fireplaces and wood stoves, gas stoves and ovens, gas dryers, space heaters, charcoal and gas grills, vehicles, and yard equipment like lawn mowers and snowblowers. Ventilation problems from chimneys, flues, and vents used with furnaces, fireplaces, water heaters, or wood stoves can also cause a build up of CO. When installed and/or maintained properly, fuel-burning appliances and vehicles produce very little CO. If, however, they are being utilized improperly or incorrectly, they can produces dangerous amounts. The signs and symptoms of CO poisoning may be mistaken for flu or other illnesses. At low levels, the symptoms may include: headache, fatigue, sleepiness, weakness, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, confusion, tightness in the chest and trouble breathing. At high levels, loss of consciousness, coma, and death can occur in a short time. Exposure to lower levels of CO over several hours can be as dangerous as exposure to higher levels for a few minutes.

If the CO detector activates and anyone has symptoms, get everyone out of the building immediately and seek medical attention. If no one has symptoms: open your windows and doors to ventilate the house, turn off all fuel-burning appliances and vehicles, contact the fire department, and watch for any symptoms of CO poisoning. If anyone exhibits any signs or symptoms, even if the alarm did not go off, contact the fire department by dialing 911. Never ignore the alarm. Do not reenter your house until any problems have been corrected.

Use fuel-burning appliances and vehicles correctly to avoid trouble. Follow all manufacturers' instructions. Keep the owner's manual handy in case you have questions. Never ignore safety warnings. Never use a charcoal or gas range indoors (this includes in a garage). Vent a fuel-burning heater to the outside. Vent your gas stove to the outside. Crack a window and run the exhaust fan whenever you cook. Never use a gas stove or oven for heat-


ing. Never leave a vehicle running in a garage - even if a door or window is open. Start yard

equipment outdoors, never in a garage, basement, or other enclosed area.

Install at least one CO detector in your home near your sleeping areas. There are two main types of CO detectors: plug-in models and battery-powered models. You need to consider the benefits of each type before purchase. Make certain that the detector you choose is listed by a qualified, independent testing laboratory. Check the manufacturer's instructions for proper installation and placement.

Prevention is the key to keeping your family safe from carbon monoxide. Have fuel-burning appliances inspected and installed by professionals. Follow all instructions when using any fuel-burning appliance or vehicle. Know the symptoms of CO poisoning and what to do if anyone exhibits them. Install CO detectors in your home and test them on a regular basis.





Decorating may not begin until Wednesday, November 23 and must be completed by Monday, November 28, 2005.




