From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

There is no doubt that those of us who live in DuPage County pay some hefty property tax bills. In Bloomingdale, however, the amount our residents actually pay to the Village is a very small portion of that total tax bill, partly due to our terrific sales tax base. The other reason is due to the fact that each year the Bloomingdale Village Board abates or deducts 100 percent of its annual debt service from the total amount of property taxes levied. We do this each year by "setting aside" a portion of our revenues to cover this expense.



At the January 9, 2006 Village Board meeting, the Village Board voted to abate the total 2005 debt service property tax levy, which this year was \$2,579,266.26. This amount comes from the 2001 General Obligation Bonds which relate to the police and public works facilities and the golf course open space land acqui-

sition financing, as well as from the 2002 General Obligation Refunding Bonds which relate to the refunding of the Water & Sewer Fund's 1992 Revenue Bonds.

Funds to cover the abatement of the 2001 G.O. Bonds came from General Corporate Fund, Water & Sewer Fund and Home Rule Sales Tax Fund. As more than two-thirds of those dollars (\$1,237,596.26) came from our home rule sales tax, that means the majority of those dollars came from shoppers coming into Bloomingdale from other towns. Funds to cover the 2002 G.O. Bonds came from the Water & Sewer Fund.

The property tax savings to a Bloomingdale taxpayer owning a home with a market value of approximately \$293,000 is about \$275. The abatements reduce the Village's tax rate by 40ϕ ; it is estimated the Village's tax rate will be about 11 ϕ per \$100 of assessed value. This is one of the lowest tax rates in DuPage County. The aforementioned home with a market value of \$293,000 would expect to pay just over \$100 in property taxes to the Village for services such as police protection, snow plowing, brush pick-up, road improvements and many other services.

The Village Board is proud to be able to continue these abatements, keeping our Village tax rate very low, while continuing to provide excellent services to our residents.

Illinois House Bill 1968 has initiated some important changes in Election Law beginning with the March 21 General Primary Election. The reason for many of these changes is to enable a greater percentage of individuals to vote. The change which will probably cause the biggest adjustment in Bloomingdale is that Absentee Voting will no longer be conducted at the Bloomingdale Village Hall. On the upside, though, "early voting," will now be possible at several sites in DuPage County, and one of these is the Bloomingdale Golf Course. 

Spring Curbside Branch Collection Set for Week of April 17

Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will once again perform branch collection under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. Branch collection will begin on Monday, April 17th. The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

BRANCH COLLECTION GUIDELINES:

- · Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, April 17.
- Woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).
- Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

The following items are unacceptable:

- Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- Woody branches under 1/2 inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under 1/2 inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- Large stumps, roots and root balls.*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.*

The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Allied Waste (our refuse hauler) pick-up. Yard waste pick-ups commence April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning Allied Waste pick-ups should be directed to 847-429-7370.


*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds. Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but require a special pick-up. Contact Allied Waste for more information.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.

Changes in Registration, New Early Voting Options Available For First Time in Spring Elections

March 21, 2006 marks the Spring General Primary Election in Illinois in which voters can select their choice for federal, state and county candidates for the November 7, 2006 General Election. Remember, in a primary, you must declare a party, unless you request a ballot for referendums only. Illinois House Bill 1968 has initiated some important changes in Election law beginning with this election. The anticipated result of these changes will be to enable a greater percentage of individuals to vote.

Here are changes that are important for our residents and business people to know:

Registration: When registering to vote for the first time, or changing your name or address, you no longer have to go to the Village or County you live in. Registrars (like those at the Village Hall and the Library) can now register anyone who lives anywhere in Illinois up until 28days before an election. Under this new law, registration will continue up to 14 days before the election, but only at the County office where the individual resides. If an individual registers or makes changes to their registration at the County within that timeframe, he/she will be required to vote at the same time.

Early voting in person will now be allowed at selected sites, beginning 22 days before the election, up until 5 days before the election. Individuals must show identification and fill out an application, but do not need to provide a reason to vote early. You must vote in the County of your residency, although not necessarily in the town of your residency.


An early voting center to be located in Bloomingdale is the Pro Shop at the Bloomingdale Golf Club, 181 Glen Ellyn Road. The site will be open beginning Tuesday, February 28 with the following hours: Tuesday 11:00 am - 7:00 pm; Wednesday, Thursday & Friday 9:00 am - 5:00 pm; Saturday & Sunday 10:00 am -3:00 pm; Closed on Monday.

To prevent individuals from voting early and often, the machines will be tied to a central voting database. A complete list of DuPage County locations and their hours will be published in the local papers prior to the sites opening.

<u>Absentee Voting will no longer be possible at the Bloomingdale Village Hall.</u> Absentee voting by mail begins 40 days before the election. Voting absentee requires a reason why the voter cannot vote on Election Day. Some of the Early Voting Centers will become Absentee Voting Centers once early voting stops five days before the election.

Although at first glance, this sounds more complicated, the end result should be better opportunity for voters to exercise their right to vote. For a simple list highlighting the changes, check out the box on the right..

<u>February 9</u> Absentee voting by mail begins

<u>February 21</u> Last day to register or change name/address with any registrar in Illinois before primary

<u>February 22 – March 7</u> Grace period for registration & name/address change, but only at County office & must vote at the same time as registration

<u>February 27 – March 16</u> Early Voting available at selected locations throughout the County. Do not need to provide reason, but must provide ID.

<u>March 17 – March 20</u> Absentee voting in person available at selected locations in County Must provide reason for absentee voting.

Parkway Damaged By Snow Plows?

The Public Works Division understands that there could be some damage to parkways due to snowplowing operations. It is Village policy to repair parkways in April, May, and early June, weather permitting, as this is the best time for the germination of grass seed.

Please call the Public Works Division at 630-671-5800 to inform us about damage to your parkway so we can put your location on the list.



Thinking About Trimming or Removing a Parkway Tree? You'll Need to Obtain a Permit

For any and all work by a resident or resident's contractor on a parkway tree, a permit is required by Ordinance No. 95-61, An Ordinance Regulating the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees on Public Areas.

Please Note: Installing planter walls around parkway trees is work which requires a permit. The Village discourages the installation of planter walls around parkway trees because the parkway is Village property and the typical installation of a small diameter ring filled with soil is injurious to the tree. For those residents who have installed planter walls without permits, approval can be obtained by contacting James M. Johnson, Urban Forester, at 630-671-5804. The Village will be notifying residents of a violation when unacceptable planters are encountered.

The Village has a comprehensive, systematic pruning schedule which ensures each tree is trimmed every five years. Contract tree pruning occurs during February through April. In-house trimming can occur any time during the year. If a resident believes a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800.

Contract Tree Pruning To Begin in February

Nels J. Johnson Tree Experts of Evanston, Illinois will begin parkway tree pruning for the Village in February. All trees with a diameter at breast height of eight or more inches will be pruned to improve tree health and structure in a careful and systematic manner. Areas included in this year's cycle are:

- Old Town
- Edgewater (excluding Edgewater Drive)
- Greenway
- Byron

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR COMMUNITY TREE PLANTING

The Village Forestry Division is looking for volunteers to plant 200 seedlings, including River Birch, Flowering Dogwood, Japanese Zelkova and Black Cherry, on Saturday, April 29th, from 10 a.m. to noon at the Public Works Facility, 305 S. Glen Ellyn Road. This is the 12th consecutive year for this popular event.

The Village will supply seedlings, soil and pots for the purpose of growing the seedlings into saplings for transplanting into the local community. Community Tree Planting involves a commitment from all participants to plant trees on public property, such as right-of-ways, school grounds, community parks, etc.

Participants are asked to bring gloves and enthusiasm. After this growing season, the trees will be planted in the Village's nursery for further growth.



District 13 Schedules Kindergarten Round-Up

Children who will be five years old on or before September 1, 2006, are eligible for kindergarten for the 2006-07 school year. Parents wishing to register their child for Kindergarten in District 13 schools should attend Kindergarten Registration Round-Up February 21 through 24 at the elementary school they plan to attend.

DuJardin School, 166 S. Euclid covers the east side of the district; students on the west side of the district attend Erickson School, 277 Springfield Drive. If you do not know which school you should attend, contact the district office at 893-9590.

Registration will be held at each school from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on February 21, 23, and 24. Evening registration will be available on Wednesday, February 22 from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

All parents will need to bring the child's original birth certificate. In addition, parents who do not already have a child attending District 13 schools also need to bring one of the following documents for proof of residency: a real estate tax bill, mortgage papers, signed lease, or agreement of sale, along with one other form of identification which includes a driver's license, auto registration, voter registration, a library card, or a public aid card.

Meacham Founders' Relatives -- Lost and Found!

As Founder's Day, March 11, approaches, we have a wonderful story to relate. A lady in Idaho looking for her family records contacted our Local History Room, located in the Bloomingdale Public Library. When she said the family name was "Meacham," we were all ears. By sharing our resources, we have learned where the Meachams went after they left our area - and we have family photos to share!

According to our Bloomingdale history, Lyman, Harvey, and Dr. Silas Meacham arrived here on March 11, 1833. From records, we know that Silas owned land on the north of Lake St. near Fairfield Way. He eventually moved to Des Plaines. Lyman and Harvey purchased most of the land where "Old Town" is today. Lyman moved to Will County. Harvey died in 1878 and is buried in Bloomingdale. Harvey's son George Standish traveled west and is a direct ancestor of our lady in Idaho.

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Carbon Monoxide

Each year, hundreds of people in the U.S. die from carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning in the home. Thousands more

become ill and require medical treatment. Some people, like children and unborn babies, older people, and people with heart and lung diseases are at a greater risk for CO poisoning.

CO is an odorless, colorless gas produced by burning fuel. In the home, dangerous levels of CO can occur if fuel-burning appliances are not working properly or are used incorrectly. Furnaces, water heaters, and other appliances can all be sources of CO if they are improperly installed or maintained, damaged, malfunctioning, improperly ventilated, or used other than for their intended purpose. Read the manufacturer's instructions carefully.

Any appliance or vehicle that runs on oil, natural gas, kerosene, propane, wood, or gasoline can produce CO. Common sources around the house include: furnaces and water heaters, fireplaces and wood stoves, gas stoves and ovens, gas dryers, space heaters, charcoal and gas grills, vehicles, and yard equipment like lawn mowers and snowblowers. Ventilation problems from chimneys, flues, and vents used with furnaces, fireplaces, water heaters, or wood stoves can also cause a build up of CO. When installed and/or maintained properly, fuel-burning appliances and vehicles produce very little CO. If, however, they are being utilized improperly or incorrectly, they can produces dangerous amounts.

The signs and symptoms of CO poisoning may be mistaken for flu or other illnesses. At low levels, the symptoms may include: headache, fatigue, sleepiness, weakness, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, confusion, tightness in the chest and trouble breathing. At high levels, loss of consciousness, coma, and death can occur in a short time. Exposure to lower levels of CO over several hours can be as dangerous as exposure to higher levels for a few minutes.

If the CO detector activates and anyone has symptoms, get everyone out of the building immediately and seek medical attention. If no one has symptoms: open your windows and doors to ventilate the house, turn off all fuel-burning appliances and vehicles, contact the fire department, and watch for any symptoms of CO poisoning. If anyone exhibits any signs or symptoms, even if the alarm did not go off, contact the fire department by dialing 911. Never ignore the alarm. Do not reenter your house until any problems have been corrected.

Use fuel-burning appliances and vehicles correctly to avoid trouble. Follow all manufacturers' instructions. Keep the owner's manual handy in case you have questions. Never ignore safety warnings. Never use a charcoal or gas range indoors (this includes in a garage). Vent a fuelburning heater to the outside. Vent your gas stove to the outside. Crack a window and run the exhaust fan whenever you cook. Never use a gas stove or oven for heating. Never leave a vehicle running


in a garage - even if a door or window is open. Start yard equipment outdoors, never in a garage, basement, or other enclosed area.

Install at least one CO detector in your home near your sleeping areas. There are two main types of CO detectors: plug-in models and battery-powered models. You need to consider the benefits of each type before purchase. Make certain that the detector you choose is listed by a qualified, independent testing laboratory. Check the manufacturer's instructions for proper installation and placement.

Prevention is the key to keeping your family safe from carbon monoxide. Have fuel-burning appliances inspected and installed by professionals. Follow all instructions when using any fuel-burning appliance or vehicle. Know the symptoms of CO poisoning and what to do if anyone exhibits them. Install CO detectors in your home and test them on a regular basis.
