

Emerald Ash Borer Found in Kane County

(Excerpted from June 14, 2006 Chicago Tribune articles)

The discovery of a tiny, 1/2 inch long, 1/8 inch wide metallic green beetle in Kane County, announced on June 13, 2006 by state and federal officials, is the first evidence of a long-dreaded infestation that could threaten more than 130 million trees in Illinois and a fifth of Chicago's leafy cover. Bloomingdale's 2,400 ash trees represent nearly 22% of its tree inventory.

Since they were found in suburban Detroit four years ago, the fast-spreading beetles have killed more than 15 million ash trees in Michigan, a staggering number compared with the 1,500 trees destroyed in Chicago by another imported pest, the Asian longhorned beetle.

State inspectors came out to a subdivision west of St. Charles, and found hundreds of exit holes left by adult ash borers in a half-dozen ash trees, indicating the borers have been around for at least three years. The inspectors plan to fan out across the area searching for more infested trees. As of mid-July, the ash borer was also discovered in Wilmette, Illinois.

"Early detection of the emerald ash borer is critical, and we need everybody's help to find it," said Mark Cinnamon, manager of nursery and northeastern field operations for the Illinois Department of Agriculture. People likely helped spread the ash borer to the Chicago area by unwittingly carrying infested firewood from Michigan, Ohio and Indiana, Cinnamon said.

Tracking the ash borer is difficult because it can take several years before the damage becomes evident. The borers typically attack the top of a tree first. By the time it becomes obvious that a tree is infested, it is usually too late to save it. There are some treatments available for healthy trees, but the pesticides are of no use if ash borers already are burrowing their way beneath the bark of a tree.

For homeowners worried about the emerald ash borer, now is a time to be vigilant – but not to panic. Though tree experts say it's a good idea to get suspect ash trees checked out, action should wait until the extent of the infestation and authorities' plans for dealing with it becomes more clear.

General characteristics of ash trees:

Leaves:

Compound with 5-9 leaflets per stalk.

Bark:

Trunk bark is tight with diamond shaped

ridges, bark on upper 1/3 of tree is

generally smooth.

Fruit:

winged.

Branches:

The most distinguishing characteristic of ash trees is they have opposite

branching (twigs grow directly opposite each other off branch). If your tree does not have opposite

branches it is not an ash.

Here's How to Spot Emerald Ash Borers, and Where to Find Helpful Information

If you have ash trees on your property or nearby parkways, watch for signs that could mean they are in trouble. It will take an expert to figure out if your tree has emerald ash borers, because many of the symptoms can be caused by other diseases or insects or by lingering effects of last year's vicious drought.

Here are some signs that might indicate the presence of emerald ash borer:

- ☐ Flagging, wilting or dying of the leafy canopy of the tree.
- ☐ New green sprouts growing at the base or from the trunk.
- ☐ Small D-shaped exit holes about one-eighth inch across.
- Metallic green beetles about a half inch long.
- ☐ Splits or cracks in the bark.
- ☐ Serpentine channels under bark that easily pulls off.

Please . . . Don't Let Your Vehicle Block the Sidewalk

Village Ordinance 9-3-1.11 prohibits parking any vehicle "on any sidewalk or parkway." The "sidewalk" includes that portion of the sidewalk which extends across your driveway. Therefore, it is illegal to park a car on your driveway so that the car extends across the sidewalk area. This makes it impossible for pedestrians, such as children or people pushing strollers, and bicyclists to use the sidewalk, thereby creating a safety hazard.

The Bloomingdale Police Department encourages residents to clean out their garages and to relocate stored vehicles that are used infrequently so that their other vehicles will fit legally on the driveway and in the garage. The police enforce this ordinance, attempting to warn first-time offenders, either verbally or in writing. The Village and Police Department ask for the cooperation of all Village residents to comply with this ordinance.

Another hazard for pedestrians in many places of town is overgrown vegetation. Whether it's a gangly bush, a spreading shrub or untrimmed tree branches hanging low across the sidewalk, taking a simple walk can resemble traversing an obstacle course. For a wheelchair, it can become impossible. For the safety of all, as well as the appearance of your property, please trim back your vegetation to keep the sidewalks in front of your home clear.

Check Out These Upcoming Programs Sponsored by the Bloomingdale Police Department

The Bloomingdale Police Department maintains a Community-Oriented Policing philosophy and has initiated a number of programs to serve those who reside and work in Bloomingdale. The following programs are being offered in the upcoming months.

- The Citizen Police Academy provides an opportunity to enhance lines of positive communication with individuals who live and work in Bloomingdale. The six-week session consists of a series of instruction and discussion providing an overview of various areas of law enforcement. The classes are held in the evenings for a three hour duration, during which police officers instruct on the following topics: Constitutional Law, Juvenile Law, Radar Enforcement, Use of Force/Liability, Interviewing, Gang and Cult Awareness and Drug Identification.
- The Street Smart Seniors Program follows in the same footsteps as the Citizen
 Police Academy, but adjusts the topics and scheduled times to meet the needs of
 seniors. Participants meet in the mornings (9:00 a.m. 12:00 p.m.) for six consecutive weeks and the following topics are discussed: Police Department
 Policies/Procedures, Village Services, Cons/Scams, Domestic Violence/Elder
 Abuse, Gang Awareness, Drug Identification, Personal Safety and Fire
 Protection Information.
- Young adults have their own academy The T.A.L.K. (Teens And Law Enforcement "K"ommunicating) Program. This program promotes a positive police contact and gives young adults an open forum to ask pertinent questions and to clarify misinformation that their peers have passed onto them. The classes are held in the evenings (6:30 p.m. 8:30 p.m.) during the winter months and the following topics are discussed: D.U.I / Zero Tolerance Laws, Retail Theft, Team Building, Personal/Internet Safety, and a tour of the DuPage County Jail Facilities..

Gary Avenue Being Widened Between Lawrence and Lake Street



The DuPage County Highway Department has begun widening Gary Avenue between Lawrence Avenue and Lake Street. The purpose of the project is to add a bi-directional turn lane so that there will be two lanes of traffic in each direction as well as a center left turn lane. The project includes installation of a new traffic signal with push button activated pedestrian crossing signals at the intersection of Gary Avenue at Lawrence Avenue. The project is scheduled to be completed be the end of November 2006.

The project is being constructed by the R.W. Dunteman Company for the DuPage County Highway Department. The project manager is Mr. Kent Kuper, DuPage Department of Transportation, 682-7318.

To accommodate the wider pavement, the curbs or edges of the road will be moved out about 6 feet on both sides of the pavement. In areas where the slope of the ground becomes steep due to the road widening, a retaining wall will be installed to stabilize the ground. During construction, day-time lane closures may occur which will restrict traffic on Gary Avenue to one lane in each direction. Please use alternate routes whenever possible to minimize delays in traffic on Gary Avenue.

Thinking of Abusing a Handicapped Parking Space? It Could Cost You Plenty

Are you tired of seeing someone park in a handicapped parking space, then jump out of their car and run into a store? People do it every day, and they usually don't get caught. Handicapped parking abuse is everywhere, especially at the grocery store, shopping mall and even, at the post office. Sometimes all of the handicapped spots are filled with people not needing them. This prevents those who truly require the close proximity spaces from using them.

To help combat this problem, an important piece of legislation, initiated by Secretary of State Jesse White, took effect January 1, 2006. This legislation deals with the fraud and abuse of disability placards and license plates, as well as increases the fine for illegally parking in spaces reserved for persons with disabilities from \$100 to \$250. The fines are even higher for anyone who illegally manufactures or alters plates or placards. These people are subject to a fine not less than \$500 for the first offense up to a maximum of \$1,000. A second or subsequent offense would be a Class 4 felony with a minimum fine of \$2,000 and a maximum fine of \$10,000.

All current handicapped parking signs need to be changed to reflect the increase in fine from \$100 to \$250. Wherever these signs exist, it is the property owner's responsibility to make the changes for the handicapped parking signage.



The Bloomingdale Police Department is initiating a new program, Operation Parking SPACE, to enforce this law and to reduce disability parking abuse. The acronym S.P.A.C.E. stands for Special Plate (placard) Abuse Compliance Enforcement. During the next several months the Bloomingdale Police Department will conduct random checks of handicap parking spaces, strictly enforcing any violations. The main purpose of this initiative is to educate the motoring public and to ensure that the dedicated parking spaces are being used appropriately. 
Chamber Awards \$1,000 Scholarships: The




Dr. Deborah Kling Named Westfield Middle School Principal



School Safety

Summer is coming to a close and school is right around the corner. The Bloomingdale Fire Protection District would like to offer the following safety tips when sending your children to school:

Riding the Bus

School bus transportation is safe. In fact, buses are safer than cars! Even so, last year, approximately 26 students were killed and another 9,000 were injured in incidents involving school buses. More often than not,



these deaths and injuries didn't occur in a crash, but as the pupils were entering and exiting the bus. Remember these safety tips:

Have a safe place to wait for your bus, away from traffic and the street.

Stay away from the bus until it comes to a complete stop and the driver signals you to enter.

When being dropped off, exit the bus and walk ten giant steps away from the bus.

Keep a safe distance between you and the bus. Also, remember that the bus driver can see you best when you are back away from the bus.

Use the handrail to enter and exit the bus.

Stay away from the bus until the driver gives his/her signal that it's okay to approach.

Be aware of the street traffic around you. Drivers are required to follow certain rules of the road concerning school buses, however, not all do.

Protect yourself and watch out!

Walking and Biking to School

Even if you don't ride in a motor vehicle, you still have to protect yourself. Because of minimal supervision, young pedestrians face a wide variety of decisions making situations and



dangers while walking to and from school. Here are a few basic safety tips to follow:

Mind all traffic signals and/or the crossing guard -never cross the street against a light, even if you don't
see any traffic coming.

Walk your bike through intersections.

Walk with a buddy.

Wear reflective material ... it makes you more visible to street traffic.

Riding in a Car

You might have heard before that most traffic crashes occur close to home ... they do.

Safety belts are the best form of protection passengers have in the event of a crash. They can lower your risk of injury by 45%. You are four times more likely to be seriously injured or killed if ejected from the vehicle in a crash. Everyone needs to be buckled up properly. That means older kids in seat belts, younger kids in booster seats and little kids in child safety seats.

'Children at Play' and 'Slow, Children' Signs Being Phased Out; 'Watch for Children' Signs May be Installed by Request

The Village has recently removed many "Children at Play" and "Slow Children" signs in town as these signs are being 'phased-out' of use by the Village. The wording on these signs erroneously imply that the Village condones children playing in the street. For uniformity, only the legend "Watch for Children" will be considered.

In general the use of the signs is not recommended by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration as there is no evidence relative to their success in reducing pedestrian accidents, operating speeds, or legal liability due to the signs. Rather, studies indicate such signage only encourages parents and children in residential neighborhoods to believe they have an added degree of protection, when in fact, motorists tend to disregard such signage as a normal condition.

"Watch for Children" signs still may be installed upon citizen request. Signs will be limited to local residential streets with generally 500 vehicles per day or less. Only one sign will be installed serving the inbound direction of streets i nto residential subdivisions.

The following steps are necessary to have a sign installed:

- ☐ A resident requesting "Watch for Children" signs should contact the Village Services Director in consultation and with the consent of the Police Chief.
- ☐ The Director will review the request and determine if the street is eligible and if so, suggest a location for the sign, which will generally be near the beginning of the block.
- ☐ The requesting party may be contacted to discuss options. The requester will then be required to get the written approval of the property owner(s) abutting the location of the sign.

'Deaf/Vision Impaired/Handicapped Child' Warning Signs May be Requested by the Property Owner

"Deaf/Vision Impaired/Handicapped Child" signs may also be installed, upon request from the property owner, on local residential streets with generally 500 vehicles per

day or less. These are warning signs which must be used prudently in order to make them noticeable and effective. It is important for parents to understand the many limitations and disadvantages of these signs, so as not to create a false sense of security for the child or his parents.

A sign cannot guarantee improvements in traffic safety or motorist behavior. It is hoped that the "Deaf/Vision Impaired/Handicapped Child" sign would remind neighborhood motorists that a child with special needs may be present. Again, in order to have a sign installed, the property owner shall request the sign from the Director of Village Services in



consultation and with the consent of the Police Chief.

For more information and to learn the necessary regulations for placing such a sign, please contact Village Services at 671-5690. Annual renewal for these signs is mandatory or the signage will be removed.
