# From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

We've seen another Septemberfest come and go, which means fall is now upon us. A big thanks to Chairman Bill Wolff and his Septemberfest Commission for a terrific job. Some seasonal reminders – the fall branch pick-up takes place the week of October 16 (pg. 6), the annual tree planting program is underway (pp. 6-7), and you can find safety tips for trick or treaters on p. 8.

In other news, DuPage County is asking municipalities to help publicize its new program – DuPage Rx, a prescription drug discount card. This program is successfully being offered in over 300 counties nationwide.

Some highlights:

- The drug discount card is not insurance.
- The discount card can be used at some 165 participating pharmacies throughout DuPage to purchase prescription drugs that are not otherwise covered by any type of insurance. The average savings is 20%. Some over-the-counter diabetic supplies will also qualify for a discount.
- All DuPage county residents, regardless of age, income or existing health care coverage may use the discount card and there is no charge for the card. There are no forms to fill out. The cards do not expire and there is no yearly renewal process. Each family needs only one (1) card.
- Medication for pets is eligible if the prescription is taken to a participating pharmacy.





# Air Rifles: What You Need to Know About State and Local Regulations

In response to questions and concerns of the residents, the Bloomingdale Police Department provides the following information relating to the Illinois State Rifle Act and the Bloomingdale local ordinance regulating and limiting the Use of Weapons.

Under the Illinois Criminal Code Air Rifle Act, an "air rifle" includes any air gun, air pistol, spring gun, B-B gun, paint ball gun, pellet gun, or any implement that is not a firearm, which impels a breakable paint ball containing washable marking colors or a pellet constructed of hard plastic, steel, lead, or other hard materials with a force that is reasonably expected to cause bodily harm.

- It is unlawful for any person under the age of 13 to carry an air rifle on public streets, roads, highways or public lands, unless the rifle is unloaded.
- It is also unlawful for anyone to discharge any air rifle anywhere except on a safely constructed target range that has been designed as such.
- An air rifle should be kept within the house of residence or other private enclosure and it should not allow any projectile to pass over any grounds or space outside the limits of such grounds or residence.
- Bloomingdale Local Ordinance 75-49 regulating and limiting the use of weapons relating to air guns states the following in summary.
  - No person shall have in his possession, except within his own domicile, or carry
    or use, a revolver or pistol of any description, shotgun or rifle, or any airgun,
    b-b gun, gas operated or spring gun, including paint ball guns, or any instrument, toy or weapon, slingshot or "beany", or bow made for the purpose of
    throwing or projecting missiles of any kind by any means whatsoever, whether
    such instrument is called by any name set forth above or by any other name.
- The only other place that above listed items may be possessed, carried or used would be in licensed shooting galleries or in private ground or premises under circumstances when such instrument can be fired, discharged or operated in such manner as not to endanger persons or property; and that the carrying and transportation of such items should be not concealed, unloaded and properly cased, to and from any range or gallery.

Every person convicted of a violation of this Ordinance shall forfeit to the Village such dangerous or deadly weapon so concealed or displayed. In addition, any person violating any provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense.

#### **Attention Parents**

Please be aware that paint ball guns, b-b guns, and other similar toys may resemble real weapons and it may be difficult for the public and law enforcement personnel to make this determination from a distance. The public and law enforcement personnel will appropriately respond to ensure the safety of the community. Also, please note that financial responsibility for such violations committed by juveniles are ultimately

the responsibilities of the parents of such children.



#### New DuPage County Website Includes Helpful Information for All Types of Local Emergencies

DuPage County has developed a website to provide DuPage County residents with emergency preparedness information and links to important local resources in all types of emergencies. The website is a response to the need for a central information source on avian (bird) flu and a possible influenza pandemic. However, it can be used for all types of local emergencies, including floods and severe storms. The website,

# 2007 Tree Planting Planting Program

The Village Board has again allocated funds for this very successful program which was started in 1982. For the eighth year, additional funds have been included for business/commercial properties. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be


planted next Spring and are available for street parkways, residential front yards and business/school/commercial properties. Business/school/commercial properties that wish to participate should contact Jim Johnson, Urban Forester, at 630-671-5804

The following are the guidelines of the program:

- Since the budget is limited, the program will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be submitted by December 1, 2006. No payment is required at this time. Bills will be sent about February 1, 2007.
- □ Trees will be 2 1/2 inch caliper, unless stated otherwise. Trees will be quality nursery stock but not specimen plants.
- The Village reserves the right to disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing.
- Removal of dead trees, stumps and/or large roots is not included and must be performed by participants before March 15th.
- Each residential parcel will be limited to two trees per year. Each business/commercial property will be limited to four trees per year.
- Participants will be given the opportunity to mark the desired location for the tree; however, the Village retains the right to change the location, if necessary.

□ We anticipate the cost of 2 1/2" caliper trees to be between \$250 and \$350 each, with the Village paying half of the amount.

□ Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Participants are responsible for all watering which will be described in instructions furnished by the Village.

□ For trees to be planted in the public parkway, this application will serve as the permit requirements of the ordinance regulating trees on public areas.

#### **Keep Your Trick or Treaters Safe & Happy** This Halloween

NO candy should be eaten until it has been inspected by an adult.

Discard any unwrapped items.

Check all food wrappers for signs of tampering.

□ Keep costumes simple. Costumes should be made of light, brightly colored or reflective material, so that your trick-or-treater can be easily seen at night. Costumes should not restrict either vision or movement.

□ At least one person in the group should carry a flashlight while trick or treating.

Trick or treat in groups whenever possible, accompanied by one or more adults.

□ Instruct your children not to enter any home, and don't invite anyone else's child into your home.

Gir For safety's sake, trick or treat only at homes in your own neighborhood.

Remind children to cross only at corners, and to look both ways before crossing the street. Children should use sidewalks whenever possible, obey traffic lights, and walk --never run -- across streets.

# **Bloomingdale Historical Society Notes**



Bloomingdale was originally a stage stop on the Frink, Walker & Company route between Chicago and Elgin . Owner Martin O. Walker was from Rutland County, Vermont, which is the same county our original settlers, the Meachams, hailed from. (Perhaps they knew each other!) Bloomingdale became a postal stop in 1837. It is believed that this northeast corner building on Lake St. & Bloomingdale Road, pictured below, was built near to 1840. We do know for a fact that Sherman P.

Sedgwick ran the Post Office and a drug store in the building in the 1840s.

On June 10, 1853, residents petitioned the Township for a plank road (which is now Lake Street) past the Francis X. Neltnor tailor and merchandise shop that was housed in this building. But the most important event that took place on this spot, is the voters of Bloomingdale decided to incorporate the Village on April 16, 1889.

In the 1940's and 50's it became Roy's Tavern, a well known eating place on the long ride between Chicago and Elgin. The Historical Society's annual Roy's Fish Fry event is based on the Friday Night special featured at this establishment. By the 1970's and 80's the building had fallen to use as the Bigger Jigger, a motorcycle enthusiast bar. It was demolished on September 17, 1984.



Have you checked out our electronic book and video Available collection? through our webpage (www.bloomingdale.lib.il.us) you can browse, check out, and download digital audio books, eBooks, and now videos any time of day from any home computer. The new videos are all nonfiction, both for adults and children.

Getting started is easy. Just visit our home page, click on the MyMedia Mall button, install the free software, then browse our collection and select the titles you want. When you're ready, check out your materials by entering your library card number and download the digital items to your home computer.
