

Spring Curbside Branch Collection Set for Week of April 16

Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will once again perform branch collection under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. Branch collection will begin on Monday, April 16th. The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

BRANCH COLLECTION GUIDELINES:

- Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, April 16.
- Woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).
- Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

The following items are unacceptable:

- Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- Woody branches under 1/2 inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under 1/2 inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- Large stumps, roots and root balls.*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.*

The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Allied Waste (our tefuse hauler) pick-up. Yard waste pickups commence April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning Allied Waste pick-ups should be directed to 847-429-7370.


*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds. Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but require a special pick-up. Contact Allied Waste for more information

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection

Election Information At a Glance

The Consolidated Election for the election of Township, Municipal, Park District, Library District, School District and Fire District officials will be held on April 17, 2007.

Following are pertinent dates for registration, absentee voting and early voting. (Absentee voting is no longer available at the Bloomingdale Village Hall.)

Important Dates for the April 17, 2007 Primary Election

<u>March 8</u>

Absentee voting begins by mail or at the County.

<u>March 20</u>

Last day to register or change name/address with any registrar in Illinois before the election.

March 21-April 3

Grace period for registration and name/address change, but only at County office.

March 26 - April 12

Early voting available at *selected locations throughout the County. Do not need to provide reason, but must provide ID.

<u> April 13 – April 16</u>

Absentee voting in person available at selected locations in County. Must provide reason for absentee voting.

*Stratford Square will be one of the Early Voting sites for the April 17, 2007 election. Check local papers for other locations within DuPage County as we get closer to March.

Parkway Damaged By Snow Plows?

The Public Works Division understands that there could be some damage to parkways due to snowplowing operations. It is Village policy to repair parkways in April, May, and early June, weather permitting, as this is the best time for the germination of grass seed.

Please call the Public Works Division at 630-671-5800 to inform us about damage to your parkway so we can put your location on the list.



Thinking About Trimming or Removing a Parkway Tree? You'll Need to Obtain a Permit

For any and all work by a resident or resident's contractor on a parkway tree, a permit is required by Ordinance No. 95-61, An Ordinance Regulating the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees on Public Areas.

Please Note: Installing planter walls around parkway trees is work which requires a permit. The Village discourages the installation of planter walls around parkway trees because the parkway is Village property and the typical installation of a small diameter ring filled with soil is injurious to the tree. For those residents who have installed planter walls without permits, approval can be obtained by contacting James M. Johnson, Urban Forester, at 630-671-5804. The Village will be notifying residents of a violation when unacceptable planters are encountered.

The Village has a comprehensive, systematic pruning schedule which ensures each tree is trimmed every five years. Contract tree pruning occurs during February through April. See this year's scheduled areas in box below. In-house trimming can occur any time during the year. If a resident believes a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800.

Contract Tree Pruning To Begin in February

Ciosek Tree Service of Lombard, Illinois will begin parkway tree pruning for the Village in February. All trees with a diameter at breast height of eight or more inches will be pruned to improve tree health and structure in a careful and systematic manner. Areas included in this year's cycle are:

- Bloomfield Hills
- Heritage Subdivision
- Old Town Estates
- West Point Estates

The Village Forestry Division is looking for volunteers to plant 200 seedlings, including Redbud, Sycamore, and English Oak, on Saturday, April 28th, from 10 a.m. to noon at the Public Works Facility, 305 S. Glen Ellyn Road. This is the 13th consecutive year for this popular event.

The Village will supply seedlings, soil and pots for the purpose of growing the seedlings into saplings for transplanting into the local community. Community Tree Planting involves a commitment from all participants to plant trees on public property, such as right-of-ways, school grounds, community parks, etc.

Participants are asked to bring gloves and enthusiasm. After this growing season, the trees will be planted in the Village's nursery for further growth.

Numerous Scholarships Available to Graduating High School Seniors

The Bloomingdale Women's Club announces the availability of applications for one \$1,000 scholarship for 2007. 
College-bound high school seniors who have attended District 13 schools are invited to apply for scholarships available through the district.

A \$750 scholarship is being offered from the DuJardin Parent-Teacher-Organization (PTO); a \$750 scholarship is being offered from the Erickson PTO. Westfield Middle School is offering two \$750 scholarships: the annual scholarship from the Student-Teacher-Parent organization, and one from former Westfield Social Studies teacher Jay Perkins in memory of his late wife Patti.



Buy Firewood Locally

The firewood season is here. Firewood can be purchased from individuals, dealers or retail stores, or many people cut their own firewood. However, a new pest to the northern Illinois area should encourage persons using ash wood as firewood to use local sources as much as possible. The Emerald Ash Borer has been found in several communities in northeastern Illinois this summer and fall. The Emerald Ash Borer only affects ash trees, unlike the Asian Longhorned Beetle which infested more than 10 types of common shade trees.

Don't bring in firewood or other ash wood products from infested areas or from a long distance. If camping in infested areas, leave unused firewood at that site. If buying ash firewood for the winter, be sure of its source. Since the borers do not typically travel far on their own, reducing human transport can help reduce the potential spread of the problem. Areas identified with the Emerald Ash Borer are

officially quarantined to restrict the movement of wood, wood products and the borer. However, individuals can follow similar guidelines voluntarily to help prevent the spread.



5 Things to Know About . . . Snow Removal (should we have any REAL SNOWFALL this winter)

(reprinted from Chicago Tribune, Dec. 10, 2006)

1 Where will your snow go? Plan to stash shoveled snow where it won't cause problems. Make sure there will be space for it to soak into a lawn or soil as it melts; water running off onto walks can freeze and create an ice hazard. Big piles can block traffic. And don't dump snow containing salt or ice melters on lawns or garden beds; the chemicals can harm plants.



2 Shrubs need protection. Heavy snowfall can bend or snap the branches of tall, upright evergreens with multiple vertical branches, such as arborvitaes and some junipers. Protect them by tying soft twine or rope around the tree at the top, in the middle and at the bottom. Don't pull the twine too tight or use wire, which can cut the bark or foliage.

3 Take it easy. Shoveling snow is good exercise – if you're in shape. If you're not, it can cause muscle injuries and even heart problems. So don't overdo it, the National Safety Council says (www.nsc.org/library/facts/snowshov.htm). Push snow rather than lifting it if possible. Pick up only as much as you easily can; when snow is wet and heavy, pick up less. Bend your knees when lifting and keep your back straight. Warm up before shoveling and take lots of breaks. Consider ergonomic snow shovels that may give you more leverage and save your back. Spray WD-40 or cooking spray on the shovel so snow slides off more easily.

4 Keep it up. During a big storm, shovel frequently rather than waiting until snow is deep, according to the Canadian Safety Council. It's safer because you won't be tempted to lift too much snow at a time. And shovel promptly. Accumulated snow

can quickly compact into ice.

5 Shovel without fear. Some folks still think shoveling your walk makes you more vulnerable to a lawsuit than if you let the snow lie. According to the Illinois' Snow and Ice Removal Act, there is no cause to worry. It specifically sets an extremely high standard to protect homeowners shoveling sidewalks

Historically Speaking . . .

by Annamarie Erickson for the Bloomingdale Historical Society

In 1865 Tom Sauerman, came from Germany. The 1874 DuPage census shows Thomas Sauerman having a shop on Main Street in the Village of Bloomingdale.

The following two paragraphs were taken from Thomas Sauerman's obituary in the DuPage County Register, undated.

"Thos. Sauerman the veteran harness-maker of Bloomingdale has been here ever since the close of the war, locating here in the summer of 1865. Mr. Sauerman is one of those quiet unostentatious people who tends to his own business, and as a result, he has a reputation for honest dealing that extends far beyond the

limits of the township. The farmers always say, 'If that harness was made by Tom Sauerman, it is all right.' Mr. Sauerman has a fine residence near the center of the village which is well kept and is a very pleasant home.


Mr. Thomas Sauerman, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of the village of Bloomingdale died in his 90th year, Sunday evening, after a lingering illness. Funeral was held Wednesday, (he)was laid to rest in Bloomingdale Evergreen Cemetery. Rev. Plassman officiated."

After Sauerman, the harness shop was run by T. H. Reuss, who even rented sleeping rooms to Lake Street travelers. Later the harness shop was turned into

a barber shop. The barbershop was still in business in 1957, as reported by a Bloomingdale resident who was getting his hair cut there when Sputnik was launched. During the 1980's, the vacant barbershop was moved across Lake Street into Old Town's parking lot, where it sat idle and fell into disrepair until the building was demolished in 2003.

Our apologies to the Kobusch family. We misspelled the family name in reference to the Kobusch Grocery store in our story about the Bloomingdale Post Office in the December Almanac.





Prepare Your Home for Winter

The Bloomingdale Fire Protection District would like to pass along the following cold weather tips from the Center for Disease Control:

• Although periods of extreme cold cannot always be predicted far in advance, weather forecasts can sometimes provide you with several days' notice. Listen to weather forecasts regularly, and check your emergency supplies whenever a period of extreme cold is predicted.

• If you plan to use a fireplace or wood stove for emergency heating, have your chimney or flue inspected each year. Ask your local fire department to recommend an inspector, or find one in the yellow pages of your telephone directory under "chimney cleaning."

• Also, if you'll be using a fireplace, wood stove, or kerosene heater, install a smoke detector and a battery-operated carbon monoxide detector near the area to be heated. Test them monthly, and replace batteries twice yearly.

• Your ability to feel a change in temperature decreases with



age, and older people are more susceptible to health problems caused by cold. If you are over 65 years old, place an easy-to-read thermometer in an indoor location where you will see it frequently, and check the temform of your home often during the winter months.

• Insulate any water lines that run along exterior walls so your water supply will be less likely to freeze. To the extent possible, weatherproof your home by adding weather-stripping, insulation, insulated doors and storm windows, or thermal-pane windows.

• If you have pets, bring them indoors. If you cannot bring them inside, provide adequate shelter to keep them warm and make sure that they have access to unfrozen water.



Prepare Your Car for Winter

You can avoid many dangerous winter travel problems by planning ahead. Have maintenance service on your vehicle as often as the manufacturer recommends. In addition, every fall:

Have the radiator system serviced, or check the antifreeze level yourself with an antifreeze tester. Add antifreeze, as needed.

Replace windshield-wiper fluid with a wintertime mixture.

Replace any worn tires, and check the air pressure in the tires. During winter, keep the gas tank near full to help avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines.

INTERIOR RENOVATION UPDATE

The Library Board and the Building and Grounds Committee set out over a year ago to begin the long overdue process of modernizing our interior space. Through the use of exciting design, modern materials and coordinated colors, we hope to create a truly unique library space. The goal of the project is an interior space that is both functional and inviting to visitors. Once this project is completed we will have a building interior that matches the excellence of our customer service and library materials.

Phase One Detail

The dust is beginning to settle, and hopefully by the time you read this, much of the phase one renovation work will have been completed and the main floor will be open. Visitors will notice new carpet tile, new vinyl tile, new light fixtures, new paint and new public desks. All materials were chosen with the future in mind; for example, through the use of carpet tile we may now replace a small section of carpet rather than replacing an entire roll. Our new Circulation and Reference desks have tops made of slate and glass. These materials will last much longer than standard laminate tops. We also strived to keep this renovation as environmentally friendly as possible; we are installing a recycled carpet product and using water based low pollution adhesive.

Future renovations

The second phase of the project will focus on the lower level of the Library, including the public spaces in the Youth Services Department and the Meeting Rooms. This phase of the renovation will likely take place in August/September 2007. The funding for all phases of this project will come from our capital reserve and will not make an impact on either your taxes or any of our regular services. 

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
