



Meacham Grove is part of the DuPage County Forest Preserve. Meacham Grove West, (Bloomingdale Road, north of Lake Street) is well known for its outstanding collection of spring wildflowers. From late April to early June the trillium provide a carpet of color in many areas. Construction Now Underway on Army Trail Road

The DuPage County Highway Department is widening Army Trail Road between Regency Drive and Schmale Road. The project consists of: extending the existing six-lane divided highway cross section from Regency Drive to Bloomingdale Road; construction of a center bi-directional turn lane between Bloomingdale Road and Schmale Road; building additional intersection capacity; and installation of a traffic signal at Bloomingdale Road and Greenway Drive.



The project is being constructed by the DuPage County Highway Department. Construction is expected to continue through November 2007.

There are no road closures planned as part of this project. However, there will be traffic delays during the work, and temporary lane closures at various times throughout the project.

2007-2008 General Assembly Scholarship Applications Now Available

State Representative Franco Coladipietro is now accepting applications for students wishing to be considered for a 2007-2008 General Assembly Scholarship.



The scholarship through his office is available to residents of the 45th representative district, which includes parts of Bloomingdale, Carol Stream, Glen Ellyn, Glendale Heights, Itasca, Medinah, Roselle, Wheaton and Winfield. It covers tuition for the fall, spring, and summer terms at any four-year Illinois public university.

Applications can be requested by calling the district office. Applications are also available at the district high schools and the College of DuPage. All applications and supporting materials must reach the district office no later than 4:30 p.m. on Friday, April 20, 2007.

The recipients will be chosen by Representative Coladipietro's Scholarship Advisory Committee and will be notified by mail during the summer. For more information, please call Joyce at (630) 582-0045.

State Senator Carole Pankau is also offering applications to all college students and high school seniors who reside in the 23rd Senate District for her General Assembly Scholarship. To be eligible, students must reside in her district, be attending an Illinois public university in Fall 2007, and have their application notarized before submitting it.

Applications can be obtained by contacting her office at 630-582-0390, or by e-mailing her at <u>carole@pankau.org</u>. Senator Pankau appoints a screening committee of community leaders to review all applications and make recommendations to her. The eight selected students will receive one year's paid tuition, including summer of 2008. The deadline is April 15 and winners will be announced in July.

General Assembly Scholarships are presented by all Illinois lawmakers to college students across the state. Selection is based upon merit of the applicants.

Requirements for Restraining Children in Vehicles

State law requires all children under the age of 16 be restrained when riding in a vehicle. The law also requires that children four years of age through and including children 15 years of age be secured in the vehicle by either a child restraint or seat belt, no matter where they are sitting. Drivers are still required to transport children under the age of four in a child seat.

The Bloomingdale Police Department has Certified Child Safety Seat Technicians and offers free child seat safety checks at the police station by appointment only for Bloomingdale residents. Please contact Sergeant Jackie Slater at 529-9868 for more information.

In Memorium: Frank Szatkowski, D.D.S., Bloomingdale's First Dentist

Another piece of Bloomingdale history quietly slipped away in early March when Frank Szatkowski D.D.S. succumbed to ALS, commonly known as Lou Gehrig's disease, at the age of 60. Szatkowski was the first dentist to open an office in town, locating on north Bloomingdale Road in what was the first structure to be built as an office building.

He opened his practice in 1972, taking on a partner some months later. As his practice grew and other dentists also located here, Szatkowski and others came together to create a dental/medical center at 183 S. Bloomingdale Road. The concept of having a variety of dental specialties in one Bloomingdale location became a reality.

Resident Diane McLaughlin, who worked with Szatkowski for 27 years, remembers the young man as "...charismatic, generous and very intelligent. He was an excellent dentist and ahead of his time in various procedures."

A Chicago native, Loyola graduate and Vietnam vet,

Szatkowski and his wife Judy, raised three sons in Itasca. All three are in the medical field: Frank is an emergency room physician in Wisconsin, Adam took over his father's dental practice here in Bloomingdale and Dane is an area paramedic.

An avid handball player, he and two friends built Killshot

on Edgewater Drive in 1979, a racketball/handball facility, which is now the Bloomingdale Athletic Club. Friends and family remember Szatkowski as a man who had room in his heart for everyone, a man of great spirit and strength who made a difference in the lives of all those he touched.

Our condolences go out to all of his family members and countless friends.



Bloomingdale Residents to Elect 3 Trustees in April 17 Election

Three trustee positions are open for this April 17 election. The following four candidates are on the ballot. They are listed in alphabetical order.

Bob Czernek

Bob Czernek, his wife Barb, and two daughters have resided in Bloomingdale since 1986 and are members of St. Isidore Church. Bob has operated a small distribution company for 25 years.

Prior to becottring a trustee in 1997, Bob was a member of the Bloomingdale Plan Commission & Zoning Board of Appeals for two years. As a trustee, he has worked hard to continue to reduce the



to continue to reduce the Bob Czernek property tax levy, supported economic growth and has maintained the highest quality of life by supporting the golf course and other open space initiatives.

He is chairman and Bloomingdale liaison to Northern DuPage Cable Television Consortium working to provide quality cable programming and reasonable rates. As chairman of traffic and street infrastructure, Bob is working to provide and maintain the streets in Bloomingdale for our residents' safety. Other activities as trustee include serving on the Old Town Review Committee and the Bloomingdale Golf Course Advisory Committee.

In the community, Bob is chairman of DuPage Area County Project (DuCAP), which works with underprivileged children in DuPage County. He is also a member of CIACO (Chicagoland Italian American Charitable Organization).

"I am seeking re-election as trustee to continue my work on providing open space, prudent redeployment to protect the sales tax base and to continue to be fiscally responsible. The current board is working well together and is approachable to all Village residents with any of their concerns.





NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH IN ACTION

Planning to Get Out on Your Bike? Great! But Remember To Put on Your Helmet and Follow the Rules of the Road







With warmer temperatures, many will venture outdoors to walk or bicycle around the neighborhoods. Exercise is encouraged for people of all ages, but emphasis should be placed on good safety habits as well. Pedestrians, cyclists, and drivers have a responsibility to one another and need to understand sharing the roadways, pathways, and sidewalks is necessary to ensure the safety of all.

Bicycling has no age limit and is one of the most popular leisure activities, for both youngsters and health conscious adults. The importance of bike safety should be taught at an early age because this is a child's first vehicle. Young children should always ride on the sidewalk and be supervised.

A bicycle helmet should always go on before the wheels go in motion. Begin the helmet habit right away, and insist that your children wear it. Regardless of the rider's age, bicycling without a helmet can lead to severe head injuries, or even death. In order to protect yourself and your family, buy a certified helmet for every rider. Make sure the helmet fits correctly, resting it low on your forehead just above your eyebrows. The chinstrap should be comfortable, yet tight. Be sure that the helmet does not move when pressure is applied to the front, back, or sides of the helmet. Set a good example; wear your helmet every time you ride your bicycle, even on short trips. Remember to replace

your adult helmet every five years, or without delay if it has been involved in an accident. Children's helmets may need to be replaced more frequently due to growth spurts or unusual wear-and tear to their helmet.

The Rules of the Road apply to bicycles, as well as to vehicles for both safety and orderly movement of traffic flow. For this reason, bicycles are to be on the right side of the road, the same as cars. Motorists expect to see you on the right and can be aware of your actions. Wearing bright, lightcolored clothing will help visibility to motorists. If you must bicycle at night, then wear white or reflective clothing. Also, the law states that your bicycle must have a front light visible from at least 500 feet and a rear red reflector that can be seen for up to 600 feet-

While bicycling, be aware of road conditions and hazards. Also, check

all traffic when entering an intersection; don't assume that others will give you the right-of-way. The rightof-way is something that is given, not taken. If others do not follow the rules, let them have the right-of-way, for safety's sake.

Bicycles should be thoroughly inspected at the beginning of the year and periodically throughout the year. When your bicycle is not in use, please store it in the garage or house; do not leave it on the sidewalk or driveway. If you are leaving your bike at any other location, then use a good sturdy lock to help protect your property. Please take the time to record the serial number of the bicycles in your household. If your bicycle is ever stolen, the-information will aid the police department in identifying the owner upon recovery.

It is hoped that all bicyclists have fun while observing this information for their safety and the safety of others.



Bagworms

Twenty species of bagworms exist, affecting a wide range of host plants. Bagworms feed on the foliage of many evergreens, deciduous trees and shrubs, including arborvitae, juniper, false cypress, spruce, fir and pine in our area. Bagworms are more easily identified in the winter and spring (from a distance they can be mistaken for cones), and when practical, can be removed and destroyed. Simply pick the bagworms off the plant and squash them. Be sure to cut the attachment silk band so that the branch will not be girdled in the future.

Severe infestations may require treatment. Spray applications of a bacterial insecticide such as Bt (Bacillus thuringiensis) are effective in controlling bagworms. Applications need to be administered in June, when the spray-timing indicator plants

Northern Catalpa (Catalpa speciosa) and Japanese Tree Lilac (Syringa reticulata) are in full bloom. Applications are repeated at three to ten day intervals, dependent on weather. At least two applications are recommended.

Emerald Ash Borer Update

The Morton Arborctum is urging everyone with firewood remaining from the winter to use all of it up before the warm

weather arrives, just in case the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) is lurking inside.

There are two EAB quarantine areas in Illinois, including 64 square miles of northern Cook County, and the entire county of Kane. These quarantines prohibit anyone from moving ash trees, limbs, branches, logs and other ash products out of the

area without a permit. In general, it's best not to move firewood, but instead, buy and use it locally.

Identifying EAB


If you have ash trees on your property or nearby parkways, watch for signs that could mean they are in trouble. It will take an expert to figure out if your tree has emerald ash borers, because most of the symptoms can be caused by other diseases or insects or by lingering effects of last year's vicious drought.

Here are some signs that might indicate the presence of emerald ash borer:

- Flagging, wilting or dying of the leafy canopy of the tree
- New green sprouts growing at the base or from the trunk
- Small D-shaped exit holes about one-eighth inch across
- Metallic green beetles about a half inch long
- Splits or cracks in the bark
- · Serpentine channels under bark that easily pulls off

Woodpecker activity might also indicate the presence of emerald ash borer. Woodpeckers are a red flag for infested ash trees - they pound away at ash trees to get at the larvae of the little beetles.


STAGE 1

Periodical Cicadas in 2007

(thanks to Ron Wolford, University of Illinois Extension office, for this information)

Something not seen since 1990 is expected to reappear this year, the Northern Illinois Brood XIII of the 17-year periodical cicadas will make another appearance in northern Illinois, which includes the Chicago area."

"The timing of emergence is determined by soil temperature," says Ron Wolford "Abnormal springtime weather can delay or accelerate the timing of emergence. What causes them to emerge in a specific year is not well understood."

Full-grown brown, 3/4 inch-long periodical cicada nymphs will emerge this spring in late May. An indication of emergence is a series of soil chimneys that can be three inches high and 1/2 inch in diameter. They will also emerge through 1/2-inch diameter exit holes. "The nymphs will burst out of the chimneys and holes around sunset and crawl up trees and shrubs," he said. "Their skins will split down their backs, and the adults will emerge.

"The adults are short-lived. Their main purpose is reproduction. Adult periodical cicadas are 1-1/2 inch.long, black insects with protruding red eyes. Their clear wings have bright orange



veins." About a week after emergence, the males will congregate and start singing loudly during the sunny part of the day to attract females.. The mating period lasts for two weeks, the males die, and the singing ends. The females will lay eggs for three to four weeks.

"The eggs will usually hatch in mid-summer about six to 10 weeks after egg laying," said Wolford. "After hatch, the new nymphs will drop from trees and shrubs and dig underground to find roots for feeding for another 17 years."

Even though periodical cicadas look a little scary, Wolford said they are not dangerous to humans or pets. Heavy egg laying in newly planted trees can cause twigs to break with leaves dying. Mature trees, even when covered with cicadas, will show little damage. Wolford recommends sitting back and enjoying this wonder of nature. "It won't occur again until 2024," he said. For more information on periodical cicadas, he recommends U of I Extension's website "Cicadas in Illinois."

Beware of Clothes Dryer Fires

The Bloomingdale Fire Protection District would like to pass along the following information about safety in your home.

For many households, the clothes dryer is an indispensable convenience. However, if clothes dryers are not properly installed or maintained, critical fires can occur. Each year, there are an estimated 15,600 fires that require a fire department response. These clothes dryer fires cause an annual average of approximately 400 injuries and 15 fatalities. Failure to clean is the leading factor contributing to clothes dryer fires in residential buildings.


It should be noted that new home construction trends place clothes dryers and washing machines in more hazardous locations, such as bedrooms, second floor hallways, bathrooms and kitchens, away from outside walls.

A clothes dryer works by forcing hot air through a turning drum. Wet clothes placed in the drum are then dried by the moving hot air. Lint is created from the clothes as the water is removed and the clothes dry. While much of the lint is trapped by the dryer's filter, lint also is carried through the venting system, together with moist air. The accumulation of lint, both in the dryer and in the dryer vent, reduces the airflow and creates a highly flammable fuel source.

In addition to the accumulation of lint, blockage in dryer exhaust vents also can occur from the nests of small birds and animals or from bends in the venting system itself. A compromised vent will not exhaust properly to the outside vent. Overheating may result. If enough heat is produced to ignite the lint itself or nearby combustible items, including the clothes in the dryer, a fire ensues.

Proper maintenance for clothes dryers involves removing the lint from the traps, vents, and surrounding areas of the dryer. Again, "failure to clean" accounts for 70% of dryer fire operational deficiencies.

A clothes dryer that has to work harder to evacuate lint and moisture can trigger enough heat to cause some dryer components to malfunction and can sometimes produce sparks or



even flames. The overheating can sometimes produce enough heat to ignite lint or other nearby combustibles.

As a good fire safety practice, combustibles such as clothing, boxes, and other items should not be placed near or around the clothes dryer.

If you notice heavy clothes, such as blue jeans or towels taking a long time to dry, or clothes feel hotter than usual at the end of the cycle, then a clogged dryer vent exhaust is likely the problem. Disconnect, clean and inspect the dryer duct and venting every couple of years. Some may need more frequent inspection, such as in homes with complex construction where the dryer vents

exceed 6 feet from the outside.

If you do not feel comfortable cleaning or inspecting the dryer vent yourself, you can call a duct cleaning service. The Chimney Safety Institute of America (CSIA), a non-profit educational organization, also provides information on clothes dryer fires and can provide a list of CSIA-certified dryer exhaust duct technicians.

Tips to Avoid Dryer Fires:

• Never let your clothes dryer run while you are out of the house or asleep.

• Disconnect, clean and inspect the dryer duct and venting every couple of years.

• Have gas-powered dryers inspected by a professional annually to ensure that the gas line and connection are intact.


Old Town Pavilion




