

I Want to be a Firefighter





Last month, the Bloomingdale Park District, in cooperation with the Bloomingdale Fire Protection District, offered children a chance to work with a real firefighter to see what it's like to be a firefighter. Youngsters got to spray the fire hose, go through the firefighter's course and dress up like a firefighter. As you can see, spraying the hose was a big hit!

Schick Road Reconstruction

Just a reminder – Road Reconstruction will take place on Schick Road (Ridge to Circle); this includes removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement including curbs, gutters and road base. Landscape medians will be added near the intersection of Schick Road and Fairfield Way.

This work will begin mid-June and will take approximately 2 1/2 months to complete. During construction, the road will be closed to through traffic. If you live in the construction zone you will be permitted to proceed past the barricades to reach your residence.



Motorists are advised to use alternate routes around the construction zone to avoid delays. Local detour signage consisting of "Road Construction Ahead" signs will be posted prior to construction.

Common Sense Safety for Your Car

The Bloomingdale Police Department cautions residents that we have experienced some car burglaries in town. Officers are conducting foot patrols in residential and apartment complex areas in an attempt to apprehend offenders.

While on patrol, officers have noticed several vehicles with valuables in plain view, which is very enticing to would-be thieves. To prevent or reduce your chances of becoming victim of burglary to your vehicle, please take the following precautions:

- ☐ Secure all locks and windows of the vehicle
- ☐ Never leave valuables in plain sight, including currency, GPS systems, laptop computers, etc.
- ☐ When possible, park in a well-lit area.


Don't Forget 'Stranger Danger' Warnings in the Summer

Cats a Nuisance?

"Feral" cats are unsocialized cats which may be one or more generations removed from a home environment and may live in a group or colony of similar cats.

These cats and their offspring are victims of abandonment, accidental loss, and failure by owners to sterilize their pets.

Unfortunately, the Village is not equipped to catch, shelter or have these animals sterilized. We would advise residents not to feed them which will encourage the cats to go elsewhere for a food source.

We realize it is difficult for animal lovers, especially cat lovers, to let an animal go hungry. However, short of "adopting" and attempting to tame a feral cat, (which we are not advocating) there is little more one can do to help decrease the numbers.

Volunteer Spirit Extraordinaire!

Volunteer spirit! We had about 30 people come out to help plant tree scedlings in April, including a number of Cub Scouts from DuJardin Elementary. Two hundred seedlings, this year Red Bud, Sycamore and English Oak trees, were transplanted into containers. Forester Jim Johnson and his assistant Tim Grant coordinated the annual event

These tree seedling will be nurtured for two to three years at the Grow Center located at the



Public Works facility. The young trees will then be transplanted to the Village Nursery, located on Cardinal Drive at Wellhouse #3, where they will remain for another two to three years, or until they reach maturity. Once they inature, the trees are utilized throughout Village parks, parkways and landscape projects. This year's Arbor Day planting at DuJardin School was a Tulip Tree which had been part of a seedling tree planting a number of years ago.



Curbside Branch Collection Begins July 16

Typically, the Village sponsors three branch pick-up collections per year – spring, summer and fall. Beginning Monday, July 16, the <u>one-week summer branch collection</u> will be conducted by Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. The last branch pick-up program for 2007 will be scheduled in October. (Watch for details in the October Almanac.)

The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

Branch Collection Guidelines:

- Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, July 16th.
- Woody branches _ inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).
- Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

The following items are unacceptable:

- Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- Woody branches under 1/2 inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under 1/2 inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- Large stumps, roots and root balls.*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.*

The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Allied Waste (our refuse hauler) pick-up. Yard waste pick-ups commence April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning Allied Waste pick-ups should be directed to 847-429-7370.

*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds. Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but require a special pick-up. Contact Allied Waste for more information.




The fotoMuses are a group of accom-



First Mosquitoes in 2007 Testing Positive for West Nile Virus Have Been Identified

Surveillance by the DuPage County Health Department has found the first three positive mosquito batches with West Nile virus in 2007. Environmental Health Services reports that the first positive mosquitoes were located in Naperville, Lisle and Woodridge on May 8, 2007. It is the first West Nile virus activity reported in Illinois this year.

As temperatures climb and the public spends more time outdoors, the health department reminds residents that mosquitoes will not only be an annoying part of the landscape, but possibly a disease-carrying one, as well. Spring is the time to start thinking about protection and prevention of mosquito-borne disease.

The health department began West Nilc virus surveillance of mosquitoes in 70 DuPage County locations last month. The health department reported 261 positive mosquito batches in 2006.

West Nile virus is transmitted through the bite of a mosquito that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird; human illness occurs when an infected mosquito bites a person. Most people infected with WNV have no symptoms of illness and never become ill. But some may become ill three days to 15 days following a bite. Symptoms can include fever, headache and body aches. People over the age of 50 and those with chronic diseases such as heart disease or cancer may be more at-risk for meningitis or encephalitis, two life-threatening diseases. But, people of any age can contract West Nile illness.

The health department urges everyone to "Fight the Bite" and make sure they are properly protected:

- Apply mosquito repellent containing 20-35 percent DEET primarily to clothing. Concentrations of 10 percent or less are indicated for children. Use sparingly on exposed skin.
- Limit time outdoors when mosquito activity is heaviest (dusk through dawn)
- Keep skin covered if outdoors between dusk and dawn. Wear long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks.
- Be sure screens in homes are intact and tight fitting to prevent entry of insects.
- Keep gutters around home cleared of debris and in good repair.
- Eliminate any containers that may hold water from around the outside of the home. Water that is allowed to stagnate for three or four days becomes a breeding ground for mosquitoes.
- Report areas of standing water to Clarke Mosquito Control at its "Mosquito Hotline," 1-800-942-2555.

Adequate mosquito control is important. Bloomingdale Township, by contract with Clarke Mosquito, is the agency responsible for mosquito abatement services throughout the Township, which includes the Village of Bloomingdale. Clarke's mosquito abatement services include chemical larviciding and spraying.

Larviciding is performed at locations where mosquito larvae are present. Larviciding eliminates mosquito larvae, reducing the number of future adult biting mosquitoes.

Spraying for adult mosquitoes reduces the local adult biting mosquito population. The product used by Clarke is environmentally safe for use in residential areas. This product is used in very low doses and therefore is considered not harmful to most adults, children and household pets. If there is any concern of allergy or of chemical sensitivity, residents can request to be placed on a call list for advance notice of pesticide use. Residents may report these and any other concerns directly to Clarke Mosquito Control at its "Mosquito Hotline," 1-800-942-2555.

Dead birds will be tested for West Nile Virus. Residents may contact the DuPage County Health Department directly at 630-682-7979, Extension 7046, or contact Bloomingdale Public Works at 630-671-5800.

To Prevent Mosquito Production and Prevent Mosquito Bites:

- ☐ Remove and properly dispose of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles or any water-holding containers.
- ☐ Fill in or drain any low places (puddles, ruts, etc.) in your yard.
- ☐ Keep drains, ditches and culverts free of weeds and trash so water will drain properly.
- ☐ Keep roof gutters free of leaves and other debris.
- ☐ Cover trash containers to keep out rainwater.
- ☐ Repair leaky pipes and outside faucets.
- ☐ Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week and store indoors when not in use.
- ☐ Unused swimming pools should be drained and kept dry during the mosquito season.
- ☐ Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water.
- ☐ Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least once each week.
- ☐ Keep grass cut and shrubbery well trimmed around the house.
- ☐ Make sure ornamental ponds have fish that will eat mosquito larvae.
- ☐ Repair window screens.
- When outdoors in the evening or when mosquitoes are biting, use personal protection measures to prevent mosquito bites (proper use of insect repellent and appropriate clothing).

Police Department Seeking Donations for Special Olympics Torch Run on June 10





Where could this be?

Once upon a time, on 40 acres at the northwest corner of Lake and Medinah Roads, there was Adventureland. Opening in 1961, the park was set up to appeal to young adults. With roller coasters, including the 35-foot high Small Bobs and the 60-foot Big Bobs, teenagers could


scream themselves silly.

Other rides included Rocko Plane, Super Himalaya, Fighter Planes, Octopus, Rambler, Flying Bobs, Caterpillar, Whip and YoYo Swings. There was food and souvenirs for sale; Cinderella's Castle was the ice cream shop; Pudge's warehouse sold miscellaneous merchandise.

Adventureland was open every day from Memorial Day until September, then weekends only until the end of the season. Attendance was 650,000 per season. Lots of Bloomingdale teenagers worked at the park as summer help.

Dance bands, like the Crying Shames, promoted by WLS radio station, played rock and roll on weekends.

The roller coasters and Ferris wheel stopped in 1977. The Village of Bloomingdale annexed the site in 1984. Today the Bridgestone/Firestone building sits between the former sites of the Octopus ride and the go-cart track.




(top left photo) Braving the Big Bobs (photo above) An aerial shot of Adventureland. Lake Street runs along the bottom of photo (on south side of park).

Summer Safety Tips

The Bloomingdale Fire Protection District would like to pass along the following summer safety tips from the National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA).

Fireworks

In a typical year, more U.S. fires are reported on Independence Day than on any other day, and fireworks account for half of those fires, more than any other cause of fires.

- In 2004, fireworks caused an estimated 1,600 total structure fires and 600 vehicle fires reported to fire departments.
- These 2,200 fires resulted in an estimated 20 civilian injuries and \$21 million in direct property damage.
 There were no reported civilian deaths.
 - In 2005, U.S. hospital emergency rooms treated an estimated 10,800 people for fireworks-related injuries.
- 48% of 2005 emergency room fireworks-related injuries were to the extremities and 44% were to the head.
- Males accounted for 69% of fireworks injuries in 2005.
 Nearly half the people injured by fireworks were under the age of 15.
- The risk of fireworks injury was nearly three times as high for children ages 10-14 as for the general population.
- Sparklers, fountains, and novelties alone accounted for 26% of the emergency room fireworks injuries in 2005.

Gas & Charcoal Grill Safety

Each year, gas-fueled and charcoal grills are involved in thousands of home structure fires and home outdoor fires, according to the NFPA. The two leading causes for charcoal grill home structure fires are combustible materials, including the home itself, that are too close to



the grill, and unattended cooking. Selecting a safe location outside the home for grilling is important. Almost half of all home structure charcoal grill fires and one-third of the gas grill fires began on an exterior balcony or unenclosed porch.

Gas and charcoal grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces, such as tents, they pose both a fire hazard and the risk of exposing occupants to toxic gases and potential asphyxiation.

- Position the grill well away from siding, deck railings, and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas and foot traffic.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area: declare a three-foot "kid free zone" around the grill.
