



Yardwaste Pickup Begins April 1st


Yard waste pickups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th.

CodeRED Emergency Notification System Now in Use; Be sure Your Telephone Number is Registered

The Village has instituted the CodeRED Emergency Notification System - an ultra high-speed telephone communication service for emergency notifications.

CodeRED allows us to telephone either the whole Village, or targeted areas of the Village in case of an emergency situation that requires immediate action (such as a water boil water notice, gas leak, missing child, etc.) The system is capable of dialing 50,000 phone numbers per hour. The recorded message will be delivered to a live person or to an answering machine, making three attempts to connect to the home telephone first, and then to the

registered cell number.

CodeRED is replacing the former Reverse 911 system. Bloomingdale residents with published telephone numbers are already included in the existing CodeRED database. If you are a resident with a non-published or unlisted phone number, or if you would like to add your cell phone as a back-up notification, you may reg-

ister for CodeRED online at www.villageofbloomingdale.org.

Even if you registered your non-published or cell phone number with the Reverse 911 system, you need to re-register, as CodeRed is a new database.

'Oh, No! We Have a Sanitary Sewer Backup!' If That Happens to You, Here's What You Need to Know

With spring come thoughts of all of those projects that we have been pondering through the winter. It is also a time for plants and trees to begin growing. With that growth, tree roots once again have the possibility of invading sanitary sewer lines through a variety of access points.

If you experience a sewer back-up in your home please contact us at the number listed below prior to calling a contractor or sewer rodding company. We will check the Village sanitary sewer for blockages and advise you as to what or who is responsible for the problem. If the problem is in the Village sewer main we will remove/repair at no cost to you. If the problem is in the private sanitary sewer service we will advise you on the steps you need to take to correct the problem.



The following tips for hiring a contractor apply not only for that project you may be considering, but for that emergency sewer rodding or repair you may be faced with. We hope these general tips will assist you in obtaining a good contractor at a reasonable cost.

- Always get more than one estimate. Contractors vary in price for numerous reasons. You will see that in obtaining more than one estimate.
- Ask the contractor if they have worked in Bloomingdale before and if they are familiar with the codes and permit requirements. Ask for references.
- Ask if the contractor is licensed, bonded, insured, and if copies are available if requested
- Avoid signing a contract that backs you into a price and waives your right to change your mind. When asked to do so by a contractor, that quote is probably too high and you are being pushed because of the "EMERGENCY" nature of a sewer repair.
- Emergency or after hours cost proposals are typically always higher than regular hours. In most cases you can wait and schedule work to occur during regular hours. It may be an inconvenience to do so, but it should result in lowering the cost. Ask the contractors who are providing you an estimate if there is any cost savings for scheduling the work during regular hours.
- Your sewer back-up will not get any worse if you do not put any more water in it. Refrain from using your water until your sewer is repaired.



Bloomingdale Police Department Aims to Combat Handicap Parking Space Abuse

Are you tired of seeing someone park their vehicle in a handicap parking space, then jump out of the car and run into the store? People do it everyday and they usually don't get caught. Handicap parking abuse is everywhere, especially at your nearby grocery store, shopping mall, restaurant and even the post office. There are times when all of the designated handicap parking spaces are filled with people who are quite capable and do not need the special consideration. When able-bodied citizens use reserved handicap parking spaces, they are being thoughtless in their actions by hindering those individuals who truly need to be in close proximity to a building.

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White initiated

an important piece of legislation on January 1st, 2006, to help combat this problem. The legislation deals with the fraud and abuse of disability placards and license plates. The fine for parking in spaces reserved for persons with disabilities has been increased from \$100.00 to \$250.00. The penalty for those who illegally manufacture or alter handicap plates and placards was rigorously increased as well; the fine for a first time offender will be at least \$500.00 up to \$1,000.00. A second or subsequent offense would be a Class 4 Felony with a minimum fine of \$2,000.00 and a maximum fine of \$10,000!

The Bloomingdale Police Department commenced a program to enforce this legislation and reduce disability parking abuse. The Bloomingdale Police Department conducts random checks of handicap parking spaces, strictly enforcing any violations. The main purpose of this initiative is to educate the motoring public and to ensure that the dedicated parking spaces are being used appropriately. Note: If you have an official handicap placard and you are the person it is designated to, please place it on the rear view mirror when the vehicle is parked, but not when you are driving the vehicle.

Illinois Law Enforcement Torch Run Supporting Special Olympics

Illinois Special Olympics has a mission to provide year-round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type games for children and adults with intellectual disabilities. Special Olympics, a not-for profit organization, provides continuing opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in a sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families, other Special Olympics athletes and the community. The program helps empower people with intellectual disabilities to realize their full potential by enhancing their physical fitness and motor skills while building self-confidence and social skills. Special Olympics athletes carry these benefits with them into their daily lives at home, in the classroom, on the job and in the community.

The Illinois Law Enforcement Torch Run is the single largest year-round fundraising event benefiting Special Olympics Illinois. In 2007, the Torch Run raised more than \$2 million. This intrastate relay has two goals: to raise money and increase public awareness for the athletes of Special Olympics. Each year, more than 3,000 officers in Illinois run more than 1,500 miles carrying the Flame of Hope through the streets of their hometowns and deliver it in June to the State Summer Games in Normal, Illinois.

The Bloomingdale Police Department has been an active participant to support the work of Special Olympics Illinois. The department currently has items on sale, the proceeds of which will go toward the Law Enforcement Torch Run fundraising efforts.. 

BLOOMINGDALE CHURCH CELEBRATING 30 YEARS AND BUILDING AGAIN TO THE COMMUNITY

The Bloomingdale Church, 264 Glen Ellyn celebrates its 30year anniversary this year and has been a visible congregation in town from the beginning. Beginning in April 1978, and supported by both the Lombard Bible Church and the Blanchard Road Alliance Church in Wheaton, Bloomingdale Alliance Church initially met in Marquardt School until an initial structure was completed in 1979 on its five-acre Glen Ellyn Road property. Dr. David Riemenschneider, the original pastor, and his wife Marina are still an active part of the pastoral staff today.

Other pastoral staff include Bill Calvin, associate pastor; Mark

Taube, music director; Dan Bailey, children's director; Burt Hollaway, junior high director; Daniel Riemenschneider, high school director; and Joe Zanayed, young adult director. The church, which teaches the practical application of the Bible to people's lives today, is comprised of people with a variety of many church backgrounds.

The church is currently undergoing additional construction as the congregation builds a large two-story brick addition to connect with the main church facility. The 9,600 square-feet addition includes additional classrooms for the church's children and adult programs, as well as a new kitchen area, elevator, library area, additional restrooms and more parking for the site. This

"Phase Four" project is the fourth building addition to the church's main building


The original sanctuary was constructed in 1985, the gymnasium in 1990, a sanctuary enlargement and classrooms in 1995, and finally Phase Four to be completed early this summer. In each construction phase, the congregation provided considerable volunteer labor to keep costs manageable. This latest addition is estimated to cost \$1,500,000 and is being financed by a \$800,000 loan from Harris Bank in combination with the donations of \$700,000 whic

CLASS A -- 'NEVER, EVER GOLFER' CLINIC

This class will be geared to those who never touched a golf club and would like to be introduced to the game. 

Bagworms: Here's What You Need to Know

Twenty species of bagworms exist, affecting a wide range of host plants. Bagworms feed on the foliage of many evergreens, deciduous trees and shrubs, including arborvitae, juniper, false cypress, spruce, fir and pine in our area.

Bagworms are more easily identified in the spring (from a distance they can be mistaken for cones), and when practical, can be removed and destroyed. Simply pick the bagworms off the plant and squash them. Be sure to cut the attachment silk band so that the branch will not be girdled in the future.

Severe infestations may require treatment. Spray applications of a bacterial insecticide such as Bt (Bacillus thuringiensis) are effective in controlling bagworms. Applications need to be administered in Junc, when the spray-timing indicator plants Northern Catalpa (Catalpa speciosa) and Japanese Tree Lilac (Syringa reticulata) are in full bloom. Applications are repeat-

ed at three to ten day intervals, dependent on weather. At least two applications are recommended.

Symptoms

Bagworms are often compared to caterpillar larvae, as the worm hides inside a self-constructed bag likened to a cocoon (hence the name bagworm). Bagworms create these cases out of silk and bits of twigs or leaves, interwoven to disguise and strengthen the case. When the larva is small, it feeds on the upper side of



the leaf, resulting in a brown spot on the leaf. The larva moves to the lower surface as it grows and eats all of the leaf except for the larger veins. The change from pupa to adult requires seven to ten days, depending on weather. Adult females never leave the bag they constructed as a larva, but adult males emerge as moths. The male moth flies to the female, mates, and dies in a few days. The female produces 500 to 1,000 eggs that overwinter inside her bag. The eggs hatch and larvae emerge in late May to early June.

Maybe It's Babies

From early spring to late fall is the birthing season for wild mammals. New mothers are often out during the day to search for food while their babies sleep.

We've all heard it said that a nocturnal animal out during the day must be sick, possibly with rabies.

NOT NECESSARILY TRUE!

If you see a skunk, raccoon or opossum out during the day, watch it for a while. If it seems healthy, and shows no signs of injury, just keep your distance and enjoy. It's probably a mom, taking advantage of her babies' naptime to get some food for herself and her young. She can't leave them during the nighttime hours when they're awake. They wouldn't be safe. So she waits until they settle in for sleep in the daytime, and she slips out.

Give a wild animal the benefit of the doubt. A call to the authorities just because the animal is out during the day might result in that animal being euthanized. If it's a mom, that will also result in the deaths of her young from starvation, exposure, or attack by predators.

If you see a night animal during the day, and notice that it's injured, call Willowbrook Wildlife Center at 630-942-6200 for advice.

If any animal, either wild or domestic, is acting strangely, is lethargic, partially paralyzed, having trouble walking, or is obviously aggressive, then a call to the authorities is a good idea.

BE CAREFUL. Never approach a wild animal; make sure that your garbage is secure

BE SMART. Have your cats and dogs inoculated against rabies; don't feed them outdoors.

BE AWARE. Day traveling raccoons and skunks are most likely not rabid.

BE COMPASSIONATE. It's tough enough for wild animal mothers to raise their babies.

Spring Clean for Safety — Inside & Out!

With warmer weather and longer days approaching, people in Bloomingdale are emerging from their winter cocoons to focus on long-neglected projects like spring-cleaning, home repairs, and yard work. Many are also lacing up their shoes for their first outdoor walk or jog of the season. These activities can be extremely beneficial, but they also involve a variety of health and safety hazards that can be avoided with the proper precautions. To help ensure everyone in our community stays safe this season, the members of the Bloomingdale Fire Protection District offer some safety tips and suggest you copy and post them where they can be seen by your family members and co-workers.

Cleaning for Safety

Nature is undergoing a fresh start and so are homeowners who are ready to clean up the debris that has been accumulating in basements, storage sheds, and garages over the winter.

- Household and pool chemicals, paints, and poisons should be properly marked and stored under lock and key, away from children's reach. Dispose of any that are leaking, expired, or that look bad. (Ed. Note: see page 7 for Household Hazardous Waste Event)
- When cleaning up hazardous chemicals wear rubber gloves and follow the safety directions on the packaging.
- Never mix chemicals in the same container if you don't know how to dispose of them; seek outside advice. Never put them into the trash or pour down the drain.
- Make sure gasoline and cleaning fluids are well marked and stored in a cool, dry place away from the house and out of the reach of children and pets. Use only approved containers for gasoline storage.
- Never use gasoline to clean skin, clothes, auto parts, or floors.

- Cléan up work areas. Put dangerous tools, adhesives, matches, or other work items away from children's reach.
- Check your barbecue grill for leaks and cracks, and be sure to store any propane tanks away from your house and garage.

Remove all fire hazards, including stacks of rags, newspapers, and magazines. Pay special attention to the spaces around your furnace, hot water tank, fireplace, space heaters, and dryer, as well as under the stairs.

Outdoor Safety

Ready for some outdoor exercise and adventure? Here are a few pointers.

- Winter's inactive muscles can take only so much strain. Don't overdo it — build up slowly so you don't have strains that can put you out of commission for some time.
- It may look appealing, but don't wander on frozen rivers and lakes in the spring. The ice is beginning to thaw, and you never know just how thin the ice really is.
- Spring's extra rain and thawing snow can cause normally safe rivers, streams, and creeks to turn treacherous. Even standing on banks can be risky as they can be undercut by rushing water and give in under your weight.
- Springtime is also severe weather time. If the skies look threatening, check to see if a storm watch or warning has been issued before you initiate out-door activities.

If you're already outside and thunderstorms threaten, go immediately into a building or enclosed vehicle. For tornadoes, go to the nearest safe structure, or the basement or interior first-floor room of your home. If there's no time to follow these precautions, take cover in a ditch or depression in the ground.
