From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

Well, the summer season may not be upon us yet, but the "construction" season certainly is. It seems everywhere you go there is roadwork. Army Trail Road has been no exception, but the end could be in sight. DuPage County Department of Transportation advises us that its Army Trail Road project is in the final stage and that the scheduled completion is June 30, weather permitting.

You might have also noticed some new delays on Bloomingdale Road in between Schick Road and Fairfield Way. The Village is having some of the utilities relocated underground prior to improvements that DuPage County is slating for Bloomingdale Road from Dunteman (near the Jewel Shopping Center) to Lake Street. Preliminary work for some road widening to allow for left turn lanes will begin this Fall. Most of the actual construction, as well as re-surfacing, will take place in Spring and Summer of 2009 (next year's "construction" season).

While we're on the subject of improvements, the Village recently retained Lohmann Golf Design/Golf Creations to take the initial steps toward the conversion of the property the Village purchased from Indian Lakes Resort to a passive open space. Lohmann has worked on several projects at the Bloomingdale Golf Club and is well qualified to 'decommission' the existing golf course features on the parcel.

Work will begin on or about June 16, 2008, weather permitting. This 'initial phase' will allow the Village to address the immediate concerns of the growing season now upon us, while providing some "breathing room" for the preparation of the formal master plan, to assure the best possible outcome for this important open space asset.

Speaking of Village assets, I'd like to acknowledge the careers of two of our longtime police officers. Deputy Chief Tom Schrieber, a 30+year veteran and Sergeant Rich Blair, 29+ years on the force, who retired in early May. I thank them both for their many years of outstanding service to the residents of the Village of Bloomingdale. You can read their stories on p. 14.

Inside this issue, you will also read about many citizens who have been providing voluntary service to Bloomingdale in a variety of ways. This community is blessed with residents and business people with big hearts and generous spirits.

And lastly, if it's June, then Family Fest is almost here! Read about what's in store for fest-goers on pp. 17 and 18. Have a great summer.



Volunteers Plant for the Future

Bloomingdale has a great volunteer spirit! We had about 30 people come out to help plant tree seedlings in April, including a number of Cub Scouts from Bloomingdale and Roselle, as well as a few employees from Half Price Books who returned for the second year. Two hundred seedlings, this year Red Buckeye, Bald Cypress, Columnar English Oak and Red Maple trees, were transplanted into containers. Forester Jim Johnson and his assistant Tim Grant coordinated the annual event.

These tree seedlings will be nurtured for two to three years at the Grow Center located at the Public Works facility. The young trees will then be transplanted to the Village Nursery, located on Cardinal Drive at Wellhouse #3, where they will remain for another two to three years, or until they reach maturity. Once they mature, the trees are utilized throughout Village parks, parkways and landscape projects. This year's Arbor Day planting at Erickson School was an Autumn Flame Maple tree which was one of the seedlings planted about three years ago (see photos on page 5).

Canada Geese --Protected by Law

The Canada goose, a migrating bird, has found a home in DuPage County. The ongoing development has done little to discourage these large birds from the area. They have become well-known visitors on the lawns and retention ponds of industrial complexes, residential subdivisions and golf courses throughout the county. At this time of year, conflicts with humans arise when great flocks of birds are grounded on a golf course or park area and leave large quantities of droppings. The geese can also be particularly aggressive this time of year if they feel their nest or their young are threatened.

All native birds, including the Canada geese, are protected by the Federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act. It is illegal for any person to possess birds, dead or alive, nesting material, eggs, feathers and bones of a bird without the proper permits from the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and the State of Illinois. It is also illegal to harm or kill a protected bird species, and it is illegal to remove or destroy nesting material from a nest once an egg is

laid. Federal fines can range up to \$15,000.00 and up to 6 months in jail. Any such activity, like any other crime, should be reported to local authorities.

Although the Canada geese may create a nuisance at times, it would be best to be patient and seek proper methods to discourage them from certain areas. Many deterrent products or techniques will only last a short period of time, such as plastic or

live swans, fake alligators in a pond, or brightly colored streamers and balloons. For a long-term solution, landscaping the area with native plants is recommended for open spaces and the perimeter of ponds as well.


Trees and bushes in yards and tall grass plantings around ponds add natural beauty and provide hiding spaces for predators, making the open spaces less attractive to these federally protected migrating birds.




in the tree planting on the school site.



Summer Curbside Branch Collection Set for Week of July 21-25

The one-week summer branch collection will be conducted by Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. under the direction of the Village Forestry Division beginning on Monday, July 21st. The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

Branch Collection Guidelines:

- Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, July 21st.
- Woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).
- Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- Thomy tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

The following items are unacceptable:

- Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- Woody branches under 1/2 inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under 1/2 inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- Large stumps, roots and root balls.*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.*

The above items are considered vard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Allied Waste (our refuse hauler) pick-up. Yard waste pick-ups commence April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning Allied Waste pick-ups should be directed to (847) 429-7370.

*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds. Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but require a special pick-up. Contact Allied Waste for more information.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at (630) 671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.

Your cooperation is greatly appreciated and will ensure a successful program.

Village's Annual Hydrant Flushing Begins June 9

The Village Services - Utilities Division will be performing the annual Hydrant Flushing Program beginning June 9, 2008 through June 23, 2008. The Program will be performed during the daytime hours of 8:00 am - 3:00 pm. Please DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY during the flushing hours, as rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period. One question that is always asked is - "Why does the Village flush hydrants?" Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance for a water system. It accomplishes the following:

- 1. Improves water quality: Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.
- 2. Improves water flow: By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and there-fore, allows a better flow of water.
- 3. Hydrant maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- 4. Hydrant inspection: Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

Fight the Bite!

As temperatures climb and the public spends more time outdoors, the health department reminds residents that mosquitoes will not only be an annoying part of the landscape, but possibly a disease-carrying one, as well. Spring is the time to start thinking about protection and prevention of mosquitoborne disease.



West Nile virus is transmitted

through the bite of a mosquito that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird; human illness occurs when an infected mosquito bites a person. Most people infected with WNV have no symptoms of illness and never become ill. But some may become ill three days to 15 days following a bite. Symptoms can include fever, headache and body aches. People over the age of 50 and those with chronic diseases such as heart disease or cancer may be more at-risk for meningitis or encephalitis, two life-threatening diseases. But, people of any age can contract West Nile illness.

The health department urges everyone to "Fight the Bite" and make sure they are properly protected:

- Apply mosquito repellent containing 20-35 percent DEET primarily to clothing. Concentrations of 10 percent or less are indicated for children. Use sparingly on exposed skin.
- Limit time outdoors when mosquito activity is heaviest (dusk through dawn)
- Keep skin covered if outdoors between dusk and dawn. Wear long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks.
- Be sure screens in homes are intact and tight fitting to prevent entry of insects.
- Keep gutters around home cleared of debris and in good repair.
- Eliminate any containers that may hold water from around the outside of the home. Water that is allowed to stagnate for three or four days becomes a breeding ground for mosquitoes.
- Report areas of standing water to Clarke Mosquito Control at its "Mosquito Hotline," at 1-800-942-2555.

Adequate mosquito control is important. Bloomingdale Township, by contract with Clarke Mosquito, is the agency responsible for mosquito abatement services throughout the Township, which includes the Village of Bloomingdale. Clarke's mosquito abatement services include chemical larviciding and spraying.

Larviciding is performed at locations where mosquito larvae are present. Larviciding eliminates mosquito larvae, reducing the number of future adult biting mosquitoes.

Spraying for adult mosquitoes reduces the local adult biting mosquito population. The product used by Clarke is environmentally safe for use in residential areas. This product is used in very low doses and therefore is considered not harmful to most adults, children and household pets. If there is any concern of allergy or of chemical sensitivity, residents can request to be placed on a call list for advance notice of pesticide use. Residents may report these and any other concerns directly to Clarke Mosquito Control at its "Mosquito Hotline," 1-800-942-2555.

Dead birds will be tested for West Nile Virus. Residents may contact the DuPage County Health Department directly at 630-682-7979, Extension 7046, or contact Bloomingdale Public Works at 630-671-5800.

To Prevent Mosquito Production and Prevent Mosquito Bites:

□ Remove and properly dispose of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles or any waterholding containers.

□ Fill in or drain any low places (puddles, ruts, etc.) in your yard.

□ Keep drains, ditches and culverts free of weeds and trash so water will drain properly.

□ Keep roof gutters free of leaves and other debris.

Cover trash containers to keep out rainwater.

C Repair leaky pipes and outside faucets.

□ Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week and store indoors when not in use.

□ Unused swimming pools should be drained and kept dry during the mosquito season.

G Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water.

Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least once each week.

□ Keep grass cut and shrubbery well trimmed around the house.

□ Make sure ornamental ponds have fish that will eat mosquito larvae.

🛛 Repair window screens.

□ When outdoors in the evening or when mosquitoes are biting, use personal protection measures to prevent mosquito bites (proper use of insect repellent and appropriate clothing).

Police Officers Tom Schrieber, Rich Blair Retire After Combined 60 Years of Service

Two longtime members of the Bloomingdale Police Department retired during the month of May. Tom Schrieber has been with the Village over 30 years. The only restaurant was Golden Bear on Lake Street (most recently Enzo's).

He became part of the 1978 Crime Prevention Unit helping to educate residents to help prevent home burglaries. Even back then we were proactive in crime prevention. In 1979, Tom joined Chuck Mader to become one-half of the two person detective division.



As early as 1980, Tom was being recognized both here, and in neighboring communities, for his skills as an investigator. Tom always had a way of getting suspects to confess. He wasn't demanding or hard-nosed; he would just talk to them, "treat them well," and before long, suspects were telling him everything he needed to know.

His titles changed over the years, but Tom remained with the detective division. He laughed remembering some of the stories (which we aren't printing). He acknowledges he has had a great career here; he's met some wonderful people and made some great friends.

Tom will be working in these early retirement years, but he's looking at a field other than police work. He also hopes to spend more time fishing & boating where the only suspicious stories he hopes to come across are the exaggerations of fellow fishermen.



Rich Blair started here on November 2, 1978 – a year after the Village offices moved to Bloomingdale Road and growth was beginning in earnest.



Remember — Watch the Clock! **Curfew Hours Strictly Enforced**

Reminder: The Village of Bloomingdale enforces a Village wide-curfew ordinance that affects all people under the age of seventeen. It is illegal for a person under the age of seventeen to be at any public place without adult supervision between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Sunday night through Friday morning or 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m. Saturday and Sunday.

In addition, the driver's license of any person affected by this curfew law is not valid during the above curfew hours. Any teenager under the age of seventeen found to be driving during curfew hours might be arrested for driving without a valid driver's license. The only exceptions to this law include minors driving directly home from work after the curfew hours and minors who are accompanied by an adult.

As a reminder, it is unlawful for any person to make, continue, or cause to be made or continued, any loud, unnecessary, or unusual noise or any noise which either annoys, disturbs, injures, or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace, or safety of others within the limits of the Village.

The use of radios, phonograph, or any similar machine/device shall not disturb the peace, quiet, and comfort of the neighboring inhabitants at any time with

louder volume than is necessary for convenient hearing for the person or persons who are in the room, vehicle, or chamber in which the machine



or device is operated. Such a machine or device used during the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. may be in violation of this ordinance.

Construction or repairing of buildings (including the demolition, erection or alteration) may operate between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., except in case of urgent necessity in the interest of public health and safety, and then only with a permit from the Director of Building and Zoning.

Open Burning & Landscape Waste

With the arrival of spring, the Bloomingdale Fire Protection District would like to take this opportunity to remind residents about the regulations involving open burning and the disposal of landscape waste.

Landscape waste means all accumulations of grass or shrubbery cuttings, leaves, tree limbs, and other materials accumulated as the result of the care of lawns, shrubbery, vines and trees.

Open Burning means the combustion of any matter in the open or in an open dump. Refuse means waste of all kinds. (definitions from Ordinance OWR-001-90, the DuPage County Waste Management Ordinance).

What is allowed:

- Open burning shall be allowed for recreational purposes. This is defined as an outdoor fire utilized to cook food for human consumption.
- · Fires in approved containers shall be permitted, provided that they are not less than 15 feet from any structure. Approved containers are defined as containers designed for this purpose. Examples are the Weber outdoor fireplace or other similar listed devices.
- Any open burning shall be constantly attended until the fire is extinguished. Fire extinguishing equipment such as dirt, sand, garden hose, etc. shall be available for immediate use.

• Within the village's boundaries, all open burning shall be confined to approved containers designed for the designated purpose.

What is not allowed:


- It is unlawful for any person to cause or allow any open and uncontrolled burning of landscape wastes in the Village of Bloomingdale.
- It is unlawful for any person to cause or allow the burning of any refuse including landscape waste in any chamber not specifically designed for the purpose and approved by the Illinois EPA.
- It is unlawful for any person to cause or allow the open dumping or disposal of any waste, including landscape waste, at any site in Bloomingdale, except at a site approved by the Illinois EPA.
- It is unlawful for any person to abandon, dump, or deposit any waste, including landscape waste, upon the public highways or other public property, except at a site approved by the Illinois EPA.

The Bloomingdale Fire Protection District #1, and village and county officials shall have the final approval for open burning, and in certain cases may determine that the fire needs to be extinguished for health and safety reasons.



NEW DVD CIRCULATION POLICY

On Wednesday, March 12, 2008, the Library Board approved changes to the DVD circulation policy, which will go into effect beginning Thursday, May 1, 2008. This policy change is in response to repeated patron requests for changes in our DVD policies.

Effective May 1, 2008, all DVD rentals at the Bloomingdale Public Library will be free!

The Details:

Park District Museum Hosting National Quilt Show July 12-August 23



The Quilt National Show 2007 "B" Collection and "Women Packing Irons" – Quilt Arts from the Chicago School of Fusing exhibits run from July 12 – August 23 at the Bloomingdale Park District Museum at 108 S. Bloomingdale Road. A complimentary reception takes place 2-4 pm on Sunday, July 20.

In Gallery I, the Faculty of the Chicago School of Fusing returns with new, exciting art work featuring work by Frieda Anderson, Ann Fahl, Anne Lullie, Emily Parson, Judy Coates Perez, and Laura Wasilowski. Each artist creates original designs from abstract to pictorial using the fine art of fusing as their construction techniques. In addition to creating beautiful art quilts and teaching at the Chicago School of Fusing, the faculty participates in challenging sporting events as members of The Iron Maidens Sports Team and Press On Chicago Fuse! Hand dyed fabrics, patterns and books about fusing will be available.

In Gallery II, there will be twenty-five quilts in the Quilt National 2007 "B" Collection exhibit produced and circulated by the Dairy Barn Southeastern Ohio Cultural Arts Center, located in Athens, Ohio. Included in the touring show are quilts from Kathy Weaver from Highland Park and Barbara Schneider from Woodstock. The innovative art quilts that merge continuing traditions with new ones will delight you. The entire group of participants in the 2007 show represents quilt artists from 27 states and 9 foreign countries. Quilt National 2008 books may be purchased. This exhibit is produced and circulated by the Dairy Barn Southeastern Ohio Cultural Arts Center, Athens, Ohio.
