The Village of Bloomingdale was recently commended by the Save Abandoned Babies Foundation for being one of the first 100 Illinois towns to be in compliance with a law passed last August requiring that all Illinois hospitals, fire stations, police stations and sheriffs offices that are "Safe Havens," post a sign on the exterior of the building in a conspicuous location.

This law gives parents in crisis a safe, legal, confidential and anonymous option to safely abandon their baby during its first days of life. This is when infants are most at risk of being killed or abandoned illegally. The Safe Haven signs show where a parent who cannot care for a newborn infant (up to seven days old) can legally hand their unharmed baby to a staff member and walk away, no questions asked.

We have had our sign posted in front of the Bloomingdale Police Department since fall of 2007 and would like to make the community aware of this. Protecting children is a shared community responsibility and we are happy to offer this option in the interest of providing a "safe haven" for these newborn babies.

So far this summer I have had an opportunity to take part in two very special events. On Monday, June 30, I was honored to carry the Olympic Torch on the final leg of the run around Circle Park in the opening ceremonies for the Bloomingdale Park District's 2008 Olympic Games. Once I declared the "games open," the Jesse White Tumblers, with Jesse White himself in attendance, took to the

field to give an amazing performance. The official opening was just the beginning of a month and a half of events for all ages and abilities. On Saturday, July 19, I was able to take part in a parade at Marklund Philip Center for Children on Prairie Avenue as part of the opening ceremonies for their annual Children's Home Summer Games. 

#### Street Sweeping Scheduled for Fall; Leaf Pickup Available Thru Allied Waste


The Village provides street sweeping services through a private contractor periodically throughout the year. Several sweeps are scheduled to take place in the fall. Street sweeping maintains the Village's attractive appearance, while reducing the potential for flooding caused by debris at curb lines.

The Village does not provide leaf collection services, and residents are reminded that raking and/or blowing leaves into the street is a violation of Village Ordinance #2000-10, which prohibits the dumping or placing of any waste upon any Village street or other public property.

Residents are encouraged to participate in Allied Waste Industries' yard waste/leaf collection program. Leaves and yard waste placed in yard waste bags or cans (with handles) will be picked up by Allied Waste on regular trash days through November 30th. Weight limit of each bag or can is 50 pounds. A yard waste sticker (\$2.25 each) must be affixed to each bag or can. Stickers can be purchased at:


## Weather Emergency Alert Sirens Signal Severe Weather in the Area

During severe weather residents will sometimes hear a warning siren. Information for activation of this warning system comes from the National Weather Service, State or Federal Agencies, local Public Officials and /or first hand observation. Most often, it comes from the National Weather Service's current information regarding storm conditions.

The Weather Emergency Alert system is activated when any of the following conditions are present:

- ☐ The Village of Bloomingdale is in the path of an approaching tornado.
- Conditions of an approaching storm exist for the development of a tornado.
- A tornado sighting within the Village of Bloomingdale or nearby communities is confirmed.
- ☐ It has been confirmed that "damaging force" winds will be impacting the Village of Bloomingdale
- ☐ The National Weather Service has issued a Severe Storm/ High Wind Warning indicating damaging force winds.

There is no differentiation in the sound of the warning siren for a tornado or damaging winds. The siren is a steady tone which rings for three minutes and warns us of any of these weather concerns. No matter which weather reason causes the activation of the warning siren, residents are encouraged to proceed to an interior room on the lowest



The four weather sirens in Bloomingdale are located: off Glen Ellyn Road and Carriage Way by the Village's Eastside pump station; in Old Town near the rear of the old Village Hall; at Stratford Park; and at Gary and Lawrence. The weather sirens are tested the first Tuesday of each month at 10:00am.

We also have lightning detectors located at the Bloomingdale Golf Club and in all parks, except the newly opened Erie Park which will be addressed in the near future. These detectors are made to alert people within the vicinity of these properties of the danger of lightning.

The "warning" signal is a solid tone approximately fifteen to twenty seconds in length. This tone indicates an actual lightning strike to ground has occurred within a ten-mile radius. You should seek appropriate shelter when you hear this signal.

The system will continue to monitor the lightning and after fifteen minutes of no lightning activity in that ten-mile area the "All Clear" signal will sound. The "All Clear" signal is an alternating high / low tone, also fifteen to twenty seconds in length. The sound made by the lightning detectors is not meant to carry far as they are for the designated areas.




### Welcome Angelo Tenerilli!

#### Yielding Safely to Emergency Vehicles: Here's What You Need to Know

The Bloomingdale Police ask for motorists' cooperation in making day to day commuting a safer experience. Questions recently raised by drivers include the proper response to approaching emergency vehicles and proceeding though an accident area where emergency vehicles are on call.

The Bloomingdale Police Department offers the following information and tips:

- Be aware of other vehicular and pedestrian traffic; always drive defensively.
- Check mirrors and be aware of flashing or fully engaged "opticom" emergency traffic control system at intersections (white flashing light on arm of traffic light control extending across lane of traffic)
- When approached by an emergency vehicle using sirens and flashing lights, yield and immediately drive to the right, waiting for emergency vehicle to pass. If stopped at an intersection with two-way traffic, remain stopped until emergency vehicle passes.
- When approaching a stationary emergency vehicle with lights flashing, proceed with caution, yield and change to a lane away from the emergency vehicle.
- When approaching or entering a highway construction area, slow down, yield to any authorized vehicle or pedestrian working within the area. Proceed with caution and change to a lane away from the workers.


# 25th Annual National Night Out Set for August 5th at Park District

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

# Compact Florescent Light (CFL) Bulbs: Why Use Them?

Lighting accounts for close to 20 percent of the average home's electric bill. CFLs use up to 75 percent less energy than incandescent light bulbs, and last up to 10 times longer. If every home in America replaced just one incandescent light bulb with a CFL it would reduce greenhouse gas emissions (that contribute to global climate change) equal to that of 800,000 cars.



#### When NOT to Use CFLs:

- ☐ In Vibrating Fixtures (i.e. ceiling fans, garage door opener), as vibration can cause the CFL to fail.
- ☐ In Recessed Lights, as some fluorescent ballasts are unreliable in ambient temperatures much over 120°F (50°C). This can sometimes be a problem in enclosed or recessed ceiling fixtures if heat in the fixture builds up.
- ☐ With a Dimmer Switch, unless you buy a CLF specifically made to work with dimmers. Using a regular CFL with a dimming switch can shorten bulb life.
- ☐ In Fixtures Turned On/Off Frequently, as CFL bulbs work best if they are left on for over fifteen minutes each time they are turned on. Frequently switching them on and off will shorten the life of the bulb.

#### Disposal of Burnt-Out CFL Bulbs:

- ☐ Illinois permits burnt-out and/or broken CFL bulbs to be placed in the regular garbage. The CFL bulb should be placed in two plastic bags before being set in the trash. CFLs should not be disposed of in an incinerator.
- ☐ Residents may stop by the Village Hall, 201 S. Bloomingdale Road or the Bloomingdale Public Library, 101 Fairfield Way, to pick up a complimentary CFL bulb one per family while supplies last.

If you missed the summer branch collection, don't despair. There is one more free branch collection for residents this year. Our fall branch collection will begin on Monday, October 20. Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will once again perform branch collection under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. The program is only

available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches ½ inch to 6 inches in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.



## **BE KIND TO YOUR TREES & SHRUBS:**

Watering Tips from the University of Illinois Extension Office & The Morton Arboretum

Trees and shrubs require just as much care as vegetable and flower gardens, according to the University of Illinois Extension Office. Watering is a common practice associated with all plants.

Contrary to popular belief, most roots are not located beneath the tree or shrub and few roots are found deep in the soil. Most tree or shrub roots that absorb water, called feeder roots, are within the top 15 inches of soil. If the soil is heavily compacted clay, roots may be even closer to the surface. These roots are generally congregated at the dripline, or outer branches, of the plant. Since the tree's branches act like an umbrella, it only makes sense that roots are past the dripline. Mature plants may have feeder roots extending 6 to 50 feet past the dripline.



Feeder roots aren't large. Most are finer than a strand of hair. They are easily severed when digging or can dry out during droughts. Yet, they are easily replaced during the winter.

Watering should occur when less than an inch of rain has fallen in a two-week period and temperatures have passed 85° F. For practical purposes, plan on providing an inch or two of water every two weeks. In order to saturate the soil, apply the amount in a single application. Several light applications totaling an inch or two over a two-week period tends to force roots to the surface in search of water.

Here are additional watering tips from The Morton Arboretum:

- Let the top few inches of soil dry out between waterings to avoid saturation and to allow roots and soil organisms to breathe.
- Use soaker hoses and drip irrigation -- effective watering tools because they discharge even streams of slow, trickling water directly to the root zone beneath trees and shrubs. When combined with a 3 or 4-inch layer of organic mulch, plants can use nearly all of the water that's provided with little evaporation loss.
- Another effective means of watering a small tree is letting a hose run slowly at its base until the ground is moist. For large trees, let the hose run at various points around the tree's drip line the imaginary line on the ground that encircles a tree's extended branches.
- Water shrubs at the plant base and under the spread of branches until soil is moistened to a depth of 6 to 8 inches.
- When using a sprinkler system, place a container (an inch-thick can, such as a tuna
  fish or cat food can, works well) nearby to measure when you have distributed 1
  inch of water to the soil.
- Plants vary in their ability to tolerate water stress. Prioritize watering, caring for newly transplanted trees and shrubs first, then those that have been in the ground from 2 to 5 years and have under-developed root systems. Next, water "specimen" trees or important trees, then all other plants.
- Water strategically. Plants absorb more water in the early morning, before the warming sun can cause evaporation.
- Avoid using fertilizer during drought conditions. Fertilizer salts can cause root injury when soil moisture is limited.



## Fight the Bite!

Dr. Damon T. Arnold, state public health director, announced the first birds testing positive for West Nile virus this year were found in crows collected in late June in Rockford, Winnebago County. Mosquito batches testing positive for West Nile virus have since been reported in Adams, DuPage, Cook, Jackson, St. Clair and Tazewell counties.

"These positive results remind us that we need to protect ourselves against mosquitoes, especially with all the recent flooding," said Dr. Arnold. "As the waters from the flooding recede and pools of water are left behind, we'll start seeing more and more mosquitoes that carry West Nile virus. I urge everyone to get rid of any stagnant water around their homes to reduce the number of mosquitoes, and to make sure you wear insect repellent to protect yourself."

Last year 46 of the state's 102 counties were found to have a West Nile positive bird, mosquito, horse or human case. A total of 101 human cases of West Nile disease, including four deaths, were reported last year in Illinois.

Surveillance for West Nile virus in Illinois began on May 1 and includes laboratory tests on mosquitoes, dead crows, blue jays, robins and other perching birds as well as the testing of sick horses and humans with West Nile-like disease symptoms. Residents who observe a sick or dying crow, blue jay, robin or other perching bird, should contact the DuPage County Health Department at 630-682-7979 or the Bloomingdale Public Works at 630-671-5800.

West Nile virus is transmitted through the bite of a mosquito that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird. Most people with the virus have no clinical symptoms of illness, but some may become ill three to 15 days after the bite of an infected mosquito. The first human case in Illinois is not usually reported until July or later.

Only about two people in 10 who are bitten by an infected mosquito will experience any illness. Illness from West Nile is usually mild and includes fever, headache and body aches, but serious illness, such as encephalitis and meningitis, and death are possible.



The best way to prevent West Nile disease or any other mosquito-borne illness is to reduce the number of mosquitoes around your home and to take personal precautions to avoid mosquito bites. Precautions include:

- Avoid being outdoors when mosquitoes are most active, especially between dusk and dawn. Use prevention methods whenever mosquitoes are present.
- □ When outdoors, wear shoes and socks, long pants and a long-sleeved shirt, and apply insect repellent that includes DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR 3535 according to label instructions. Consult a physician before using repellents on infants.
- ☐ Make sure doors and windows have tight-fitting screens.

  Repair or replace screens that have tears or other openings.

  Try to keep doors and windows shut, especially at night.
- ☐ Eliminate all sources of standing water that can support mosquito breeding, including water in bird baths, ponds, flowerpots, wading pools, old tires and any other receptacles.


Public health officials believe that a hot summer could increase mosquito activity and the risk of disease from West Nile virus. Contact Clarke Mosquito Hotline at 800-942-2555 to report areas of stagnant water in roadside ditches, flooded yards and similar locations that may produce mosquitoes.





## Coping with Heat Emergencies


The body works most effectively within a very narrow range of temperatures. High temperatures cause the body to react by increasing its metabolic rate. It also causes the body to lose fluids through perspiration and the dilation of blood vessels in an attempt to cool the body. Infants and young children, the elderly, amateur athletes, and outdoor workers are more susceptible to these emergencies. Medical emergencies associated with heat exposure include: heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke.

- Heat Cramps: A person may experience cramps, especially in the large muscles, after strenuous exercise. Move the person to a cool place and remove excess clothing. Do NOT massage cramped muscles. You may give electrolyte-containing solutions such as: Gatorade, All Sport, etc., if it is available.
- Heat Exhaustion: The person will be sweating, have moist clammy skin, might be nauseous, and possibly vomiting. They might have a slightly elevated temperature, with a headache and mental confusion. For treatment, move the person to a cool place and cool them by removing as much clothing as possible and applying cool moist cloths. You may give something to drink if the person is alert and not nauseous. Stop cooling the person if goose bumps or shivers develop. If the person's medical condition doesn't improve, call for medical assistance.
- Heat Stroke: This is the most serious of the heat-related emergencies. The person will have an elevated temperature (greater than 105 degrees), hot dry skin, and appear confused. This is a true emergency. Call for medical assistance immediately. While waiting, move the person to a cool place and begin rapid cooling.

Remove as much clothing as possible and apply cold compresses to the chest, groin, armpits, neck, temples, and behind knees.

Sponge or mist with cool water and fan, or cover the body with a wet sheet and fan. Do not give this person anything to drink.

Do not give them aspirin or other medication to lower their temperature. Do not give either the heat exhaustion or heat stroke person any stimulant, including alcohol or cigarettes.



Heat Emergency Sites are available for seniors throughout DuPage County. They include the DuPage County Administrative Offices (M-F 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m.), libraries, city halls, township offices, senior centers, park districts, malls, and P.A.D.S. (Daysite 630-682-3846). Check your local telephone directories for numbers. Please call ahead for availability. For cooling sites and heat-related information in DuPage County call the Heat Hotline 1-800-942-9412, TDD/TTY (630) 407-6502, hours 8:00 - 4:30. If there is an emergency, please call 911.



#### ResearchYour Roots @ the Library

Are you curious about your roots? Genealogists will tell you that the best place to start is by talking to your relatives. But you may find that there are some gaps in your family tree. The Library has



the resources you need to work on your family history.

Census records are a very valuable resource in conducting family research. We subscribe to an online resource, *Ancestry.com*, that provides digitized images of the U.S. Federal Census from 1790 - 1930, the American Genealogical Biographical Index, Passenger and Immigration Lists, and many other genealogical databases at the click of a mouse.

World Vital Records is a collection of genealogy databases that can be searched simultaneously. There are more than 3,000 databases containing more than half a billion online names and records. You may find hidden treasure where you least expect it.

Heritage Quest, another genealogy resource we offer, allows you to search contents of books and articles to find information on people and places described in family and local histories. This database is also available to you from home through our web page, www.mybpl.org.

If you are interested in networking with other genealogy buffs, plan on attending our Genealogy Club that meets on the fourth Thursday of the month - except in November and December - from 6:30 until 8:45p.m. Participants share search strategies and explore library resources with expert guidance from Leslie Drewitz from our Local History Department.
