## From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

In last April's Almanac I spoke about the kind of winter we had just come through, mentioning the effort put in by our employees to deal with the problems the winter weather provided. This year, I must once again take the time to extend my gratitude for a job well done.

As severe as the winter of '08 was, the winter of '09 was worse. We had more snow/ice incidents, a greater total number of inches of snow, along with a busy season of winter water emergencies and local flooding. So "thank you" to the men and women of Bloomingdale's snow & ice control crew and the rest of the team, as well as to the utility division employees handling winter water emergencies.

Of course, the winter precipitation is not the only kind of storm Bloomingdale and its citizens have been weathering. The economy continues to affect many aspects of our lives. I am pleased to tell you


that the Village itself is in very good financial shape. In addition to conservative budgeting over the last five years, the Village is also seeing some businesses expand and others relocate here. Both of these will produce jobs for residents and revenue for Bloomingdale.

We are seeing additions to existing businesses, such as a 27,000 sq ft addition for production capacity to NOW Foods on Glen Ellyn Road, and an addition of 21,000 sq ft to Pitman, Inc, a graphic supply company located in the former Mary Kay building.

We look forward to the arrival of InSite Development in the former Tower Records on Army Trail Road, CVS Pharmacy in the old Sears Hardware building and Children of American Day Care on Bloomingdale Road, just north of the Village Hall. Scottish Rite, a Masonic organization, will also call Bloomingdale home when it builds a 56,000 sq ft headquarters near Medinah Road and Lake Street.

As I said, the economy continues to affect many aspects of our lives. More families than ever have found themselves in need of help. The Bloomingdale Township Food Pantry has been feeling the crunch for some time. Saturday, May 9th, marks the annual food drive sponsored by the National Association of Letter Carriers. Please do what you can by leaving donations of non-perishable foods, paper products and/or toiletries by your mailbox on Saturday, May 9. The mail carriers thank you and your generosity will mean so much to those who are in need.





## Village's Spring Branch Collection Program Begins April 20


Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will once again perform branch collection under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. Branch collection will begin on Monday, April 20. The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection..

#### **Branch Collection Guidelines:**

- Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, April 20.
- Woody branches ½ inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).
- Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

#### The following items are unacceptable:

- · Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- Woody branches under 1/2 inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under ½ inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- · Large stumps, roots and root balls.\*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.\*


The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Allied Waste (our refuse hauler) pick-up. Yard waste pick-ups commence April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning Allied Waste pick-ups should be directed to 847-429-7370.

\*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds.

The Bloomingdale Senior Citizen Advisory Council is an organization established by the Bloomingdale Police Department to address the needs and con-




Over fifty agencies will be in attendance at the Senior Day Fair. Here are some of the agencies / services involved:





NEW SUPPORTIVE LIVING FACILITY: Alden Gardens of Bloomingdale is a Supportive Living Facility (SLF) currently under construction at 285 E. Army Trail Road. The SLF will provide an affordable housing alternative to seniors requiring some assistance with the activities of daily living. When complete, the SLF will offer three meals a day in the central dining room, housekeeping, medication reminders and assistance with bathing, dressing and laundry. Seniors who are eligible may use Medicaid to help pay for assisted living services.

The SLF will offer apartment-style housing with 60 one-bedroom units, 24 deluxe studio units and 2 two-bedroom units. All units will feature a small refrigerator and microwave. The two-bedroom units will offer two bathrooms. The facility is expected to open early in 2010. For more information, contact Jo Petruncio at 630-307-7273.

#### Help Prevent Localized Flooding -Adopt A Storm Inlet

#### Flooding occurs in two ways:

- When large storms drop more precipitation than the storm drainage system can drain away, as experienced during the September 2008 storms; and
- When storm inlets, culvert inlets, and/or storm sewers are blocked.


While we cannot control the amount of precipitation which could lead to local flooding, we all can work together to minimize flooding caused by blocked storm inlet grates, clogged private driveway culverts, and storm sewers. The Village asks property owners to 'adopt an inlet' to keep the inlet grates clean of leaves, branches, and debris such as plastic bags, newspapers, plastic bottles and milkings; and in the winter time, snow




Storm inlet cleared of debris

and ice. In areas with roadside ditches, such as the Indian Lakes Subdivision, the ditches should also be kept clean of debris, lawn clippings and leaves which could clog inlet grates and private roadway culverts.

The 114 miles of Village storm sewers include 900 public manholes and 2,800 public storm inlets for storm water run off. To maintain the system, the Village contracts for street sweeping services on curbed streets. Village personnel also clear inlets. Preventative maintenance programs, both contractual and in-house, are also in place to maintain the storm drainage system. However, inlet clogging can reoccur once, or even a couple times during a storm since debris and leaves are carried with the storm runoff to the inlet. Keeping the inlet grate or driveway culvert pipe clear of debris before, during, and after the storm will help drain the storm water.

The Storm Water Collection System is completely separate from the Sanitary Sewer Collection System. While they have similarities in the way they transport the flows received, the destinations are distinctive. The <u>Sanitary Sewer Collection System</u> discharges its flow to the Water Reclamation Facility located at Glen Ellyn Road near Edgewater Drive. Here the flow is treated prior to discharge to the East Branch of the DuPage River. However, the <u>Storm Water Collection System</u> discharges its flow <u>without any treatment</u> directly to one of three tributary receiving streams – the East Branch DuPage River, the West Branch DuPage River, or Springbrook Tributary to Salt Creek.

It is important to understand that anything dumped into any of the storm water inlets is eventually discharged into natural waterways and endangers the environment. Village Ordinance 92-31 strictly prohibits anything other than storm run-off to be discharged, dumped, placed or deposited into the storm water system. This includes garbage, debris, landscape waste, leaves, or flammable or toxic substances in liquid, gas or solid forms such as motor oil, gasoline, paint, paint cleaners and cleaning solvents. Fines in the amount of \$50.00 to \$500.00 can be levied per occurrence. Violators may be responsible for clean-up costs, which are typically thousands of dollars.

If you see anyone dumping anything into the inlets near your property, please call the Bloomingdale Police Department non-emergency at 630-529-9868, or the Village Services Utilities Division at 630-671-5830. Contact the Utilities Division if you would like more information.

Please use caution for your personal safety when clearing the storm inlets and/or private culvert pipes.



#### Is Your Address Posted?

Remember, every second counts in an emergency situation. In order for emergency personnel to locate your house, your address must be displayed either on your mailbox and/or house.

Large reflective numbers are easier to read when it is dark. They only take minutes to install and could save precious minutes should you have an emergency.

#### Lake Park Grad Stephen Bach Breaks Track Record at Perdue



#### Some Sound Advice: Change Your Clock, Change Your Battery

Daylight Savings Time, which started March 8, is a great time to change the battery on a home smoke alarm. An estimated 890 lives could be saved each year if all homes had working



smoke alarms. The
Bloomingdale Fire
Protection District and the
National Fire Protection
Association (NFPA) would
like to remind you that
smoke alarms that are
properly installed and
maintained play a vital role
in reducing fire deaths and

injuries, and have contributed to an almost 50% decrease in fire deaths since the late 1970s.

#### Facts & figures

- A 2004 telephone survey found that 96% of U.S. households had at least one smoke alarm, yet in 2000-2004, no smoke alarms were present or none operated in almost half (46%) of the reported home fires.
- 65% of reported home fire deaths in 2000-2004 resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

#### Installation and maintenance tips


Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, including the basement, making sure that there is an alarm out-

side every separate sleeping area. New homes are required to have a smoke alarm in every sleeping room and all smoke alarms must be interconnected.

 Hard-wired smoke alarms operate on your household electrical current.
 They can be interconnected so that



every alarm sounds regardless of the fire's location. This is an advantage in early warning, because it gives occupants extra time to escape if they are in one part of the home and a fire breaks out in another part. Alarms that are hard-wired should have battery backups in case of a power outage, and should be installed by a qualified electrician.



- If you, or someone in your home is deaf or hard of hearing, consider installing an alarm that combines flashing lights, vibration and/or sound.
- Mount smoke alarms high on walls or ceilings (remember, smoke rises). Ceiling mounted alarms should be installed at least four inches away from the nearest wall; wallmounted alarms should be installed four to 12 inches away from the ceiling.
- If you have ceilings that are pitched, install the alarm near the ceiling's highest point.
- Don't install smoke alarms near windows, doors, or ducts where drafts might interfere with their operation.
- Never paint smoke alarms. Paint, stickers, or other decorations could keep the alarms from working.

### Food for Fines April 1-30


