From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

In this Almanac you'll read about two Bloomingdale businesses that have survived the test of time and are celebrating significant anniversaries this year. Bloomingdale Pharmacy marks 30 years at its original location, 156 S. Bloomingdale Road and Spavone's Ristorante celebrates 25 years at 266 W. Lake Street. It's wonderful to see businesses survive and thrive in our community. We are happy to celebrate their milestones.

I'm also pleased to congratulate Dan Wennerholm, Village Administrator, on reaching his 30th anniversary with the Village on April 30th.

Dan started as Village Engineer in 1979, at the same time that the Village was experiencing a surge in growth and population. He was promoted to Director of Public Works and Engineering in October, 1982, then to Director of Community Services in May, 1985. In October 1989, Dan was appointed as Village Administrator.

Over the past 30 years, Dan has been a part of the construction and development of Stratford Square Mall, special assessment projects, residential annexations, growth of the Village's commercial and business park development, the construction of the new Public Works and Police facilities, and the purchase and development of the Bloomingdale Golf Club.

Dan observed his 30th anniversary the same way he did his first day of work – with cake! To the left is our celebration April 30, 2009 and to the right is April 30, 1979. That's Dan on the left side of the photo, standing next to Joe Stella, Building Commissioner at the time, and Mayor Vi Morrisroe on the far right: A champagne breakfast was held that day in honor of the ground-breaking for Stratford Square. 

RX Box Provides Safe Disposal of Medication

The Village of Bloomingdale in cooperation with DuPage County and the DuPage County Health Department, has installed a drop box for expired or unused medications at the Bloomingdale Police Department, 201 S. Bloomingdale Road. The RxBox is free of charge. This method of properly disposing of unused medications will help reduce the threat to our environment and increase the safety of children and others in the house. Residents can mark or cross out their personal information and leave the medication in the containers. All types of household medications are accepted, but no sharps (needles), medical waste or chemical waste can be accepted in the RxBOX.

Accepted:

- Prescription & over the counter medication
- Medicated ointments and shampoos
- Liquids containing medications
- Prescription & over the counter inhalers
- Glass thermometers containing mercury



Roadway Repair and Reconstruction Now Underway; Fairlane Court Scheduled for Complete Replacement

After the long, hard winter, spring and summer are finally upon us, and the Village of Bloomingdale is taking advantage of the long-awaited break in the weather to begin reconstructing and repairing streets throughout the Village. Following is a list of what's on the list for the 2009 road improvement season:

Pavement Reconstruction

Road Reconstruction will be done on Fairlane Court (Milford to end) this includes removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement including

curbs and gutters, and road base. The new roadway will be the same width as the existing road; no widening is planned. All work is funded 100% by the Village.

This work began in mid-May and will take approximately 2 ½ months to complete. During construction, these roads will be closed to through traffic. If you live in the construction zone you will be permitted to proceed past the barricades to reach your residence.



As part of the work, the Village will be installing a depressed curb at each driveway. This means the "bump" at the curb of each driveway is being eliminated, and a smooth transition from the street to each driveway will be constructed. The Village will also be reconstructing the driveway aprons, that is, the concrete driveway between the sidewalk and the curb, as part of the project.

Pavement Overlay

Overlay maintenance consists of pavement patching, curb and gutter repairs to correct drainage deficiencies, storm sewer repairs and a new asphalt road surface. The following streets will receive pavement overlay:

Edgewater Court Byron Avenue

D 1 A (D)

Langton Court Park Avenue (Bloomingdale Road to Walter)

Sterling Court Walter Court
Oxford Court Madsen Drive
Strathmore Court Canterbury Court

Circle Avenue (Broker to Walter) Schick Road (Lorraine Circle to Gary)

Motorists are advised to use alternate routes around the construction zone to avoid delays. Local detour signage consisting of "Road Construction Ahead" signs will be posted prior to construction.

Bloomingdale Road Reconstruction Underway; Work to be Completed in November

Construction on Bloomingdale Road began mid-May. The project is being coordinated by the DuPage County Highway Department. The project limits are Greenway Drive to Lake Street.

Actual pavement widening is confined to the areas between Greenway Drive and Raven
Lane and between
Fairfield Way and Schick Road.
The remaining areas will be resurfaced as part of the project. There will be lane closures during the construction period.
Traffic will be restricted to one lane in each direction with left turn lanes where possible between Greenway Drive and Schick Road.

Village utility relocations are a part of this project to be completed concurrently with the roadway improvements, consisting of a few fire hydrant relocations and connection of the water main between Aprina Court and Sutherland Court. Electric cables have already been relocated, but telephone, natural gas and CATV utilities are planned to be relocated during the spring

Relative to side street and driveway road closures, there may be some temporary closures of driveways for properties that have multiple access ways to a site. Side roads may be blocked for short durations during certain construction activities, but should have assistance for motorists from flaggers. No parking of equipment, materials, or work vehicles will be permitted on side roads or in the Village Hall parking lots. Existing street lighting will be maintained at all times where it presently exists. Per Village ordinance, there should be no work in residential districts between 7:00 PM to 7:00 AM daily, nor work on Sundays or holidays.

The projected completion date is November 7, 2009.



Remember to Watch the Clock! Curfew Hours Strictly Enforced

Reminder: The Village of Bloomingdale enforces a Village-wide curfew ordinance that affects all people under the age of 17. It is illegal for a person <u>under the age of 17 to be at any public place without adult supervision between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Sunday night through Friday morning or 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m. Saturday and Sunday.</u>

In addition, the driver's license of any person affected by this curfew law is not valid during the above curfew hours. Any teenager under the age of seventeen found to be driving during curfew hours might be arrested for driving without a valid driver's license. The only exceptions to this law include minors driving directly home from work after the curfew hours and minors who are accompanied by an adult.



Summer Curbside Branch Collection Set for Week of July 20-24

Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will once again perform branch collection under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. Branch collection will begin on Monday, July 20. The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

Branch Collection Guidelines:

- Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, July 20th.
- Woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be
 picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).
- Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly
 fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care
 as to not cause injuries to the workers.

The following items are unacceptable:


- Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- Woody branches under 1/2 inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under 1/2 inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- Large stumps, roots and root balls.*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.*

The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Allied Waste (our refuse hauler) pick-up. Yard waste pick-ups commence April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning Allied Waste pick-ups should be directed to (847) 429-7370.

*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds. Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but require a special pick-up. Contact Allied Waste for more information.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at (630) 671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.

Your cooperation is greatly appreciated and will ensure a successful program.



Village's Annual Hydrant Flushing Begins June 8

The Village Services - Utilities Division will be performing the annual Hydrant Flushing Program beginning June 8, 2009 through June 22, 2009. The Program will be performed during the daytime hours of 8:00 am - 3:00 pm. Please DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY during the flushing hours, as rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

One question that is always asked is - "Why does the Village flush hydrants?" Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance for a water system. It accomplishes the following:

- 1. Improves water quality: Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.
- 2. Improves water flow: By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore, allows a better flow of water.
- **3.** Hydrant maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- **4. Hydrant inspection:** Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

BLOOMINGDALE PHARMACY:

In 1970, Bloomingdale's population was 2,974. By 1980, it had jumped to 12,659. At the same time that the village was experiencing an influx of residents, businesses also began locating within our boundaries. Now, three decades later, one of these early establishments proudly celebrates its 30-year anniversary. When George Thies, Jr. and his partner Craig Kueltz opened Bloomingdale Pharmacy the day after Memorial Day in

1979, it was not only the first business to open in the Old Towne Center on Bloomingdale Road, it was the first drug store in town.

Both men came with experience in drug store ownership, but they were drawn to Bloomingdale because of the tremendous growth that was imminent. They promised to bring the kind of local store that could offer more than the chain operations, including a friendly neighborhood feel, free home delivery and a commitment to the community.

Thirty years later, owner George Thies III, (who started working for his dad and Kueltz one year out of college), notes that promise still holds. "We know almost every customer by name. Often when they call, we know who it is even before they tell us. We are filling prescriptions for the third generation of some families."

George continues the same quality of service and connection to the community, even after his dad fully retired from the pharmacy about five years ago. The younger Thies believes part of the reason Bloomingdale Pharmacy has been able to hold its own in the community is because the store has adjusted to meet the needs of a changing community.

"When we first opened we carried milk, bread, pop, cosmetics, developed film; we were almost a convenience store in addition to filling medical needs. There were no convenience stores in town. Kids used to ride their bikes and skateboards over to buy a pop and candy bar. The other day I filled prescription for a young dad who told me he used to ride his bike over here all the time when he was growing up."

Today, you can still buy a candy bar and can of pop, but you will find more medical products than convenience items. The store carries a large selection of medical and adaptive equipment for rental or purchase, an example of adapting to meet the needs of the customers. George and his staff are thrilled to be celebrating 30 years of health care in Bloomingdale. Stop in and wish them a Happy Anniversary!

TONY SPAVONE'S RESTAURANT:

Another longtime business also marked a milestone this year. Restaurateur Tony Spavone marks 25 years of singing and serving traditional Italian cuisine in Tony Spavone's Ristorante at 266 W. Lake Street. Tony honed his talents as a chef working in his father's Italian eatery in Chicago. He started singing professionally when he was 17, performing in bars and eateries along Lincoln Avenue in Chicago.



Tony brought the family recipes to his own establishment and word spread quickly about the unique dining experience where the owner served up his voice, along with the authentic Italian fare and fine wine. Spavone's has been a family affair from the beginning. His retired father helped out in the early days at the restaurant and Tony would both cook and sing. Even today, his wife Lynette, and teen-aged daughters Collette and Ganette, lend a hand in the eatery from time to time.

Tony still performs in shows outside of the restaurant, although he tries to limit himself to summer concerts these days, one of which is usually Bloomingdale's Family Fest. He doesn't like to be away from the restaurant too much. "People still expect to see me here," he explains. And he still likes to cook; Tony is very much hands on.

Another bonus attraction at Spavone's is the clientele. You never know what celebrity will show up for dinner. All you need to do is take a look around the lobby which is filled with photos of Tony with singers and stars and other well known faces who came to eat, enjoy his company, and maybe sing a song or two. Even Yoko Ono has been a guest at Spavone's.

The restaurant and its well-known owner have also been featured on TV shows such as *Two on Two, 190 North* and *Wild Chicago*. Stop in for dinner and see what all the excitement has been about for the last 25 years!

Fight the Bite!

As temperatures climb and the public spends more time outdoors, the health department reminds residents that mosquitoes will not only be an annoying part of the landscape, but possibly a disease-carrying one, as well. It's time to start thinking about protection and prevention of mosquito-borne disease.



West Nile virus is transmit-

ted through the bite of a mosquito that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird; human illness occurs when an infected mosquito bites a person. Most people infected with WNV have no symptoms of illness and never become ill. But some may become ill three days to 15 days following a bite. Symptoms can include fever, headache and body aches. People over the age of 50 and those with chronic diseases such as heart disease or cancer may be more at-risk for meningitis or encephalitis, two life-threatening diseases. But, people of any age can contract West Nile illness.

The health department urges everyone to "Fight the Bite" and make sure they are properly protected:

- Apply mosquito repellent containing 20-35 percent DEET primarily to clothing.
 Concentrations of 10% or less are indicated for children. Use sparingly on exposed skip.
- Limit time outdoors when mosquito activity is heaviest (dusk through dawn).
- Keep skin covered if outdoors between dusk and dawn. Wear long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks.
- Be sure screens in homes are intact and tight fitting to prevent entry of insects.
- Keep gutters around home cleared of debris and in good repair.
- Eliminate any containers that may hold water from around the outside of the home.
 Water that is allowed to stagnate for three or four days becomes a breeding ground for mosquitoes.
- Report areas of standing water to Clarke Mosquito Control at its "Mosquito Hotline," at 1-800-942-2555.

Mosquito abatement services are provided through a contract between Bloomingdale Township and Clarke Environmental Mosquito Management, Inc. of Roselle. This Bloomingdale Township initiative covers the entire township including the Village of Bloomingdale. Information is available at:

Clarke Environmental Mosquito Management, Inc. begins spraying and other treatments typically in the spring and continues throughout the year until late fall, weather depending. 

Cooking Safely at the Grill

The Bloomingdale Fire Protection District and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) reminds grilling enthusiasts and basic backyard cooks alike to remember grilling safety as the outdoor cooking season heats up. In 2003-2006, U.S. fire departments responded to an average of 7,900 home fires involving grills, hibachis, or barbecues per year, causing 120 reported injuries and \$80 million in direct property damage.

"Nothing dampens an outdoor barbeque like a fire or burn," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of communications for NFPA. "With simple steps, mishaps can be easily avoided and dinner saved."

One-third of the non-confined home structure fires involving grills started on an exterior balcony or unenclosed porch, 18% started on a courtyard, terrace, or patio, and 11% started on an exterior wall surface. Of these fires that involved gas grills, the leading contributing factor was a leak or break in hoses or other equipment, and the leading contributing factor of fires involving charcoal or other solid-fueled grills was something that could burn being too close to the grill.

In 2007, 18,600 patients went to emergency rooms because of injuries involving grills.



NFPA offers the following grilling safety tips:

- Gas and charcoal BBQ grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces, such as tents, they pose both a fire hazard and the risk of exposing occupants to carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Place the grill well away from siding, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas, and foot traffic.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area: have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around the grill.
- Use long-handled grilling tools to give the chef plenty of clearance from heat and flames.
- Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in trays below grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.

Charcoal Grills

1. Use only charcoal starter fluid to start a fire.



3. Store the charcoal starter fluid out of reach of children, and away from heat sources.

Gas Grills

- Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. A light soap and water solution applied to the hose will quickly reveal escaping propane by releasing bubbles. If you determine your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame:
 - Turn off the gas tank and grill.
 - If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again.
 - If the leak does not stop, call the fire department.
- If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not attempt to move the grill.
- Only use equipment bearing the label of a recognized testing laboratory. Follow the manufacturers' instructions on how to set up the grill and maintain it.
- Never store propane gas tanks in buildings or garages. If you store a gas grill inside during the winter, disconnect the tank and leave it outside.

If you have a grill fire, immediately move a safe distance from the fire and call 911.

For flare-ups:

- Be prepared to keep the fire under control. If it is possible, raise the grid that the food is on, spread the coals out evenly, or adjust the controls to lower the temperature.
- 2. Normal flare-ups can be handled with a cup of water.

Sources of Drinking Water

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426 - 4791.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and groundwater wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

<u>Microbial contaminants</u>, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

<u>Inorganic contaminants</u>, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

<u>Pesticides</u> and <u>herbicides</u>, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

<u>Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals,</u> which are by - products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally - occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno - compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV / AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA / CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800 - 426 - 4791).

A Source Water Assessment summary is included below for your convenience.

Source Water Location

The City of Chicago utilizes Lake Michigan as its source water via two water treatment plants. The Jardine Water Purification Plant serves the northern areas of the City and suburbs, while the South Water Purification Plant serves the southern areas of the City and suburbs. Lake Michigan is the only Great Lake that is entirely contained within the United States. It borders Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin, and is the second largest Great Lake by volume with 1,180 cubic miles of water and third largest by area.

Susceptibility to Contamination

The Illinois EPA considers all surface water sources of community water supplies to be susceptible to potential pollution problems. The very nature of surface water allows contaminants to migrate into the intake with no protection, only dilution. This is the reason for mandatory treatment for all surface water supplies in Illinois.

Chicago's offshore intakes are located at a distance that shoreline impacts are not usually considered a factor on water quality. At certain times of the year, however, the potential for contamination exists due to wet weather flows and river reversals. In addition, the placement of the crib structures may serve to attract waterfowl, gulls and terns that frequent the Great Lakes area, thereby concentrating fecal deposits at the intake and thus compromising the source water quality. Conversely, the shore intakes are highly susceptible to storm water runoff, marinas, and shoreline point sources due to the influx of groundwater to the lake. Throughout history there have been extraordinary steps taken to assure a safe source of drinking water in the Chicagoland area from the building of the offshore cribs and the introduction of interceptor sewers to the lock - and - dam system of Chicago's waterways and the city's Lakefront Zoning Ordinance.

Citizens should be aware that everyday activities in an urban setting might have a negative impact on their source water. Efforts should be made to improve awareness of storm water drains and their direct link to the lake within the identified local source water area. A proven best management practice (BMP) for this purpose has been the identification and stenciling of storm water drains within a watershed. Stenciling along with an educational component is necessary to keep the lake a safe and reliable source of drinking water.

2008 Water Quality

Definition of Terms

The following tables contain scientific terms and measures, some of which may require explanation.

<u>Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)</u>: The level of contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLG's allow for a margin of safety.

<u>Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)</u>: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

<u>Highest Level Detected</u>: This column represents an average of sample result data collected during the CCR calendar year. In some cases, it may represent a single sample if only one sample was collected.

Range of Detections: This column represents a range of individual sample results, from lowest to highest that were collected during the CCR calendar year.

<u>Date of Sample:</u> If a date appears in this column, the Illinois EPA requires monitoring for this contaminant less than once a year because the concentrations do not frequently change. If no date appears in the column, monitoring of this contaminant was conducted during the CCR calendar year.

<u>Action Level (AL):</u> The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

<u>Treatment Technique (TT):</u> A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water. <u>n/d</u> - Not detectable at testing limits <u>n/a</u> - not applicable

<u>Turbidity</u>

softener

Turbidity is a measure of the cloudiness of water. We monitor it because it is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of filtration and disinfectants.

Unregulated Contaminants

A maximum contaminant level (MCL) for this contaminant has not been established by either state or federal regulations, nor has mandatory health effects language. The purpose of monitoring this contaminant is to assist USEPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water, and whether future regulation is warranted.

<u>Fluoride</u>

Fluoride is added to the water supply to help promote strong teeth. The Illinois Department of Public Health recommends an optimal fluoride range of 0.9 mg/l to 1.2 mg/l.

<u>Sodium</u>

There is no state/federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials concerned about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If you are on a sodium-restricted diet, you should consult a physician about this level of sodium in the water.
