

Be Alert for Stranger Danger

As many people take advantage of the last warm weather days enjoying the great outdoors, the Bloomingdale Police Department cautions students and parents that some unscrupulous individuals seek the warm temperatures, as well. It is good opportunity for them to monitor the school and playground areas where today's youth gather. Both children and young adults are strongly encouraged to avoid contact with unfamiliar individuals who may ask for directions, attempt to provide gifts/money, or engage in any conversation. "Stranger Danger" talks apply to everyone, no matter the age or physical size of a person.

The Bloomingdale Police Department also stresses that if an encounter with a suspicious person and/or vehicle occurs, the police should be contacted as soon as possible, once safety has been established. Bloomingdale Police Department Offers Anonymous Crime Tip Line

The Anonymous Tip Line 630-529-7274 provides citizens an opportunity to report information about a crime or an incident of which they have knowledge. With the anonymous Tip Line, we hope to encourage the community to assist the police department by overcoming two key elements affecting the community: fear and apathy.



This tip line is part of an ongoing effort to develop innovative ways to reduce crime and violence in and around Bloomingdale. The tip line is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Anyone who has information concerning a homicide, gangs, guns, drug activity, or any other type of information that would aid police personnel are encouraged to call.

Often a seemingly unimportant or minor piece of information can solve a crime by providing the missing link.

How Does the Tip Line Work?

When a citizen calls 630-529-7274, he or she will hear a taped recorded message. Explain the activity in as much detail as possible. You do not have to provide your name, address, or telephone number. All information remains confidential.

Some tips on leaving a message:

Speak clearly. Take your time leaving your message; Be as specific as possible in providing the following information:

Location of building or house, name of nearest intersection; Description of person(s) involved, such as height, sex, age, weight, clothing, hair color, eye color, skin color, and any distinguishing marks, names if known. Description of vehicles involved, make, model, color, and license plate.

If you would like to speak with someone directly, you may either leave your contact information on the tape, or call 630-529-9868 (Bloomingdale Police Department, non-emergency).

What You Need to Know About the HINI Virus/Swine Flu

With all of the conflicting information out there regarding the H1N1 Virus (Swine Flu), the DuPage County Health Department advises the community to avoid rumors and to get the facts @ <u>www.protectdupage.org</u> or <u>www.flu.gov</u> or by calling the H1N1 Hotline at (630) 221-7600.

The DuPage County Health Department further encourages everyone to practice the following Good Health Habits to reduce the spread of the flu.

- Know the signs and symptoms of the flu: 100 degrees Fahrenheit or greater, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, and feeling very tired. Contact your physician with medical questions or concerns.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Do not share eating utensils, drinking containers, telephones, keyboards without cleaning or sanitizing first.
- Stay home from work, school, public gathering and errands when you are sick for at least 24 hours after there is no longer a fever (without use of a fever-reducing medication).
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue (or your upper sleeve) when you cough or sneeze, and throw the tissue away.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaner is also effective.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or ' mouth.
- Get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids and eat nutritious food.

Get vaccinated for the seasonal flu and the 2009 H1N1 flu when vaccines are available.

50/50 Concrete Sidewalk/Curb Replacement Program Suspended

The current economy has necessitated that the Village of Bloomingdale suspend the resident 50/50 Concrete Sidewalk/Curb Replacement Cost Sharing Grant Program. This program reimbursed residents for a share of costs associated with the repair or replacement of public curb and sidewalk, when conditions did not meet the criteria for repair or replacement by the Village. Reinstating the 50/50 Concrete Sidewalk/Curb Replacement Cost Sharing Grant Program will depend on improved economic conditions.

The Public Works Streets Division will continue the systematic inspection and repair program of curbs and sidewalks to minimize hazards.

Village's 2009-10 Road Salting Policies

While the costs are down from last year, the price of salt is still higher than historical pricing so the Village of Bloomingdale will once again have to use its salt supply conservatively to ensure we will have enough to last the winter season.

Residents should anticipate our response to snow and ice occurrences will be similar to that of last winter season.

2010 Tree Planting Planting Program

The Village Board has again allocated funds for this very successful program which was started in 1982. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be planted next Spring and are available for street parkways and residential front yards.

The following are the guidelines of the program:

- □ Since the budget is limited, the program will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be submitted by December 1, 2009. No payment is required at this time. Bills will be sent about February 1, 2010.
- □ Trees will be 2 1/2 inch caliper, unless stated otherwise. Trees will be quality nursery stock but not specimen plants.
- □ The Village reserves the right to disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing.
- Removal of dead trees, stumps and/or large roots is not included and must be performed by participants before March 15th.
- □ Each residential parcel will be limited to two trees per year.
- Participants will be given the opportunity to mark the desired location for the tree; however, the Village retains the right to change the location, if necessary.
- □ We anticipate the cost of 2 1/2" caliper trees to be between \$250 and \$350 each, with the Village paying half of the amount.
- Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Participants are responsible for all watering which will be described in instructions furnished by the Village.







Residents are requested to inspect mailboxes and posts to ensure sturdiness and compliance with the postal service installation requirements, and correct any problem identified. If you have questions as to whether or not your mailbox is in compliance with Village requirements, you may contact the Village Services Department – Street Maintenance Division at 671-5800.

Also, if ornamental rocks or planters are used for landscape beautification, residents need to ensure that they are a minimum of three feet in back of the curb or pavement on non-curb streets. If deemed necessary for safe snow removal operations, these obstacles will be removed by the Village.

Rx Disposal Made Easy

The Bloomingdale Police Department & DuPage County Health Department have joined forces in an Expired / Unused Medication Disposal Program. Expired or unused medications are a risk to families, the community and the environment. Disposing of prescription and over-the-counter drugs down a drain can contaminate public water supplies and waterways. Removing expired and unused drugs from our homes reduces accidental ingestion by children and reduces teen prescription drug abuse.

Bloomingdale Township residents may dispose of their medications 24 hours/7 days per week at no charge into the Rx drop box located behind the Bloomingdale Village Hall, 201 S. Bloomingdale Road. Look for a large white metal drop box labeled RxBOX located to the side of the Police Department //

Items Accepted: Prescription Medications; Over-the-Counter Medications; Medicated Ointments; Medicated Shampoos; Liquids Containing Medications; Prescription Inhalers; Overthe-Counter Inhalers; Glass Thermometers containing mercury.

Items Not Accepted: Sharps or needles; Radioactive medicines; Any other medical waste; Household chemical waste - these items need to be disposed of using other methods. For sharps or needle disposal, please check with your physician or local hospital.

Bloomingdale Resident FYI

When Bloomingdale experiences power outages due to weather conditions or overloaded electronic issues, the traffic control devices / traffic signals might alfunction. The Bloomingdale Police Department reminds drivers to pay attention at traffic intersections to make sure that the traffic signals are working properly.

If a traffic signal is not working at all or has conflicting signals (example: flashing red

& green lights), drivers are to treat the intersection as a four-way stop, even without stop signs posted, reducing the opportunity for traffic crashes.

From time to time there are solicitors in our neighborhoods. The Village has solicitation regulations which include local registration procedures. 
Halloween Treats Are in the Bag!

Keep Your Trick or Treaters Safe & Happy This Halloween

□ NO candy should be eaten until it has been inspected by an adult.

Discard any unwrapped items.

Check all food wrappers for signs of tampering.

□ Keep costumes simple. Costumes should be made of light, brightly colored or reflective material, so that your trick-or-treater can be easily seen at night. Costumes should not restrict either vision or movement.

□ At least one person in the group should carry a flashlight while trick or treating.

□ Trick or treat in groups whenever possible, accompanied by one or more adults.

□ Instruct your children not to enter any home, and don't invite anyone else's child into your home.

□ For safety's sake, trick or treat only at homes in your own neighborhood.

□ Remind children to cross only at corners, and to look both ways before crossing the street. Children should use sidewalks whenever possible, obey traffic lights, and walk -never run -- across streets.





2009 Fall Branch Collection Program Begins October 19

Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will once again perform branch collection under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. Branch collection will begin on Monday, October 19. The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

BRANCH COLLECTION GUIDELINES:

- D Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, October 19.
- □ Woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed.)
- □ Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- □ All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- □ Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

THE FOLLOWING ITEMS ARE UNACCEPTABLE:

- D Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- □ Woody branches under 1/2 inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under 1/2 inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- □ Large stumps, roots and root balls.*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.*



The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Allied Waste (our refuse hauler) pick-up. Yard waste pick-ups commence April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning Allied Waste pick-ups should be directed to 847-429-7370.

*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and <u>do not</u> require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds. Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but <u>require a special pick-up</u>. Contact Allied Waste for more information.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches 1/2 inch to 6 inches in diameter. Contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.



Finding the victim not breathing, she began CPR and was joined by three other Good Samaritans who also worked on him until paramedics arrived. The story has a sad ending as the young man, an Iraq veteran and father of 15-month old triplets, ultimately passed away. Anthony Perez, a Meijer employee, was walking out of the store and saw the incident. He ran over and took off his own shirt to try to beat out the flames, while sending others to call 911 and get a blanket. He then had the victim roll over and over to smother the flames. The victim did suffer third degree burns, but the paramedics told Perez that his actions probably saved the motorcyclist's life. Meijer is planning to recognize the heroic efforts of Perez and he has also been recommended for a CHARACTER COUNTS Pillar award.

We are proud to have such brave and caring individuals working in our community. Their quick thinking and immediate action makes both of them "hometown heroes."








Bloomingdale Lions Elect First Female President



Louis University, planning to major in organizational studies or organizational leadership. She knows whatever path her future takes it will include her passion for working with the population with special needs.






911 Remembrance

Is Your Child Safe When Traveling in a Vehicle?

While the misuse rate for child restraint seats has declined, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) still indicates approximately <u>80% of child seats are incorrectly installed</u>.

We can improve our child's safety when riding in a vehicle by placing them in the proper testraint for their age and/or size. Here are some general guidelines to follow:

The Bloomingdale Police Department has Certified Child Safety Seat Technicians and offers free child seat checks to Bloomingdale residents. These are done <u>by appointment only</u>. Also, Illinois law requires you to secure any child riding in your vehicle under the age of eight in an appropriate Child Seat Restraint. 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


National Night Out Against Crime
