Ryder Cup - A Bonus for Bloomingdale

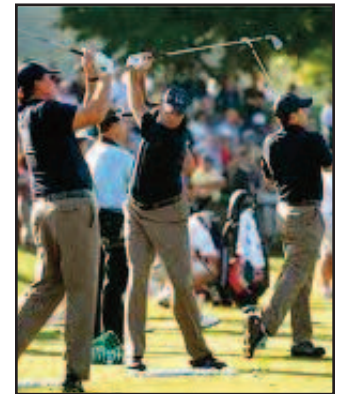
The crescendo of anticipation for The Ryder Cup has been steadily building as we draw closer to the world-renown event. From September 25-30, Medinah Country Club, at our eastern border, will be packed green to green with golfers, spectators, workers, press etc. If you aren't a golfer or fan of the sport, here's what all the excitement is about.

The **Ryder Cup** is a biennial golf competition between teams from Europe and the United States, with the venue of the contest alternating between courses in the United States and in Europe. Ryder Cup is also the name of the trophy, named after Samuel Ryder, the man who sponsored the first such match in 1927. The Ryder Cup, along with the President's Cup, is unique in the world of golf, because despite being high-profile events bringing in mil-

lions of dollars in TV and sponsorship revenue, the players receive no prize money and compete purely for the victory.

The anticipated attendance to this prestigious event is 40,000-45,000 people per day. With over 1,000 national and international members of the media expected, TV press coverage alone is expected to be over 30 hours, more than a Super Bowl. The Ryder Cup is expected to generate \$70-80 million in economic impact for DuPage County alone. Hotels, restaurants, the retail industry, the municipalities and tax payers will benefit from this windfall.

With the estimated daily attendance at 40,000 to 45,000 people per day, the Village of Bloomingdale anticipates a considerable influx of restaurant and shopping patrons the



week before and during the Ryder Cup. The Villages of Bloomingdale, Addison, Roselle, Itasca, Glendale Heights and Wood Dale have collectively pooled their resources to create a Ryder Cup Local Attractions & Dining Map to be distributed at area hotel and other key locations. From the Mayor's Desk

In the last few years, Bloomingdale has experienced a tornado, a flood, a blizzard and now what looked very much like the hurricanes we see in news footage. If you traveled anywhere through town following the July 1st storm that whipped through Bloomingdale, you could see downed wires, uprooted trees, blocked streets, branches everywhere and more. For a storm that lasted for probably only a half hour, the damage it left was wicked and widespread. Portions of Bloomingdale were without power for as long as four days.

Throughout it all, you could see neighbors helping neighbors. In many neighborhoods you could hear the distinctive sound of chain-saws as neighbors were cutting trees to clear streets or driveways. Dragging branches down to the curb became a group effort. Those with power checked on those without. Again, we were all in this together. I am proud to live in and be mayor of a town where, when the chips (or trees, in this case) are down, we pull together.

We also heard from many residents about Village employees going over and above to help during the weeks that followed. I want to publicly thank all those Village Employees who worked diligently to help Bloomingdale recover from the aftermath of the severe storm on July 1st. From those who responded in the immediate aftermath by fielding phone calls or by moving branches from the middle of the streets to those who were involved every day during the clean-up process — Thank you!

Also – we received news that the Illinois State Treasurer's Office disaster recovery program loans are available to individuals recovering from the July 1st storm. These loans are intended to allow home and business owners to secure below-market rates for up to the first five years of a loan. The maximum interest rate is 3 percent. 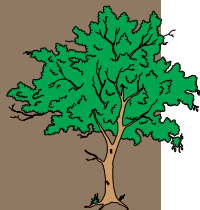

If your private property tree is infested with Emerald Ash Borer, owners can consider the following Response Options. For parkway trees, contact the Village of Bloomington Forestry Division at 630-671-5800.

1. Tree Removal/Replanting** - Consider whether ash trees on your property are worth protecting. Trees enhance a property's value, but it may be more cost effective to replace a small or struggling ash tree than to pay the cost of ongoing treatments. In addition, trees in poor or declining health are not likely to respond well to insecticide treatments.

Tree removal requires retaining an EAB-compliant vendor in your area who knows how to properly handle and destroy the ash wood in order to minimize the spread of EAB. 2. Treatment - Requires a long-term commitment. Once EAB arrives, it will remain a constant threat to ash trees for many years to come. It is likely that protective treatments will be needed for the rest of the tree's life. Optimal timing for most treatment methods is mid-April through June.

Many effective products are best administered by professionals. Contact a local arborist or tree-care professional for diagnosis and treatment. Check to be sure that the professional is licensed in Illinois as a commercial pesticide applicator for Category E: Turf and Ornamentals. TO DO NOTHING IS NOT AN ADVISABLE OPTION. If your tree is dying, the branches will become weak and will eventually fall in severe storms or just naturally over time. There is a safety and financial liability onus on you as a tree owner that could become expensive should disaster strike. All ash tree owners have a responsibility to their neighbors and community to remove or treat their infested ash trees to minimize the spread of EAB.

****Once a tree is dead/dying and a hazard to people/property, the Village Forestry Division will mail a Notice of Violation, which requires that the tree be removed within ten days of receipt of the letter. Failure to comply will cause the Village to remove the tree and invoice the homeowner for all related expenses.**

50/50 Tree Program - Residents may be eligible to participate in the Village's 50/50 Tree Program, which allocates funds for trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. This successful program was initiated in 1982. Details will be published in the October Almanac and on the Village web site (www.villageofbloomington.org). The trees will be planted next Spring 2013 and are available for residential front yards or sites visible from the street.

Give Your Tree a Long, Cool Drink

There's an old adage that a 90-foot oak tree with a 90-foot spread will lose more than 90 gallons of water daily when the temperatures are about 90 degrees. Whether the story is 100 percent true or not, the point is that trees do lose lots of water when the temperature climbs. They just don't wilt as obviously as other plants.

Don't forget to give your trees and shrubs a drink of water during these extraordinarily dry and hot weather conditions. While Village Forestry crews are watering parkway trees, your help with this Village watering effort is also greatly appreciated - especially those parkway trees planted last Fall and this Spring as replacements for ash tree removals. Regular watering of the new trees during these 'drought-like' conditions will reduce stress; aiding in the trees' long term mortality.

Apply water at the tree or shrub's drip-line, not at the trunk. Few water-absorbing roots are located at the trunk or under the canopy of trees and shrubs. The hair roots, which take in the water, are located at the plant's drip-line, or outermost branches, and beyond. That layer is also the part of the soil that dries out the fastest during hot, dry conditions.

The Village Forester suggests a deep root soaking at least twice a week until regular rain returns. Over-watering in these hot, dry conditions is not a concern.

WATER CONSERVATION AND CONTROL VILLAGE ORDINANCE NO. 90-30

From May through September of each year the use of the public water supply for sprinkling with automatic sprinkling devices is PROHIBITED except for:

Single Family residential with odd numbered addresses on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday between 5 a.m. and 9 a.m. or 5 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Single Family residential with even numbered addresses on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday between 5:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. or 5:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.

Commercial, Industrial, Manufacturing, Office Buildings and Multi-Family Residential Buildings on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday between 5:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. or 5:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.

The use of automatic sprinkling devices is prohibited on all Fridays.

Violators are subject to a fine of \$25.00 to \$50.00 for each violation of the order. For more information, contact the Utilities Division at 630-671-5830.



Information You Need to Know About Refuse & Recycling Cart Storage

Refuse and recycling carts may be placed out at the curb after 6:00 p.m. the day before the scheduled pickup. A mechanical arm on the truck performs the collection of the refuse and carts so it is important to place carts approximately one foot behind the curb (or one foot off the pavement, if there are no curbs) with the wheels facing away from the street (toward your house). Place the cart so that vehicles parked on the street don't obstruct it.

Carts must be removed from the curb following pick-up on the day of collection. Please note that refuse, recycling and yard waste are all collected by different trucks running different routes, with different pick-up times.

On non-collection days, carts must be stored out of view from the street. Village Code prohibits containers to be stored in the front yard, including that area between the building and front yard, or stored in the corner-side or side yard of any property, including that area between the building and that yard unless screened from view from the street. Carts may be stored within a garage or shed, or in a back yard. Carts may also be stored on the side of a house, provided they are sufficiently screened by shrubbery or a fence.

Back to School Safety

Another new school year is just around the corner, which makes it an excellent time to review school safety with your children. “Common sense” rules can help promote safety at school and at play. Here are a few simple safety tips that can benefit children of all ages.

Walking to and from school:

- Choose a safe route for walking to and from school. Avoid walking by vacant lots, fields, or other areas where there aren't many people around.
- Use the buddy system. It is safer to walk in a group than by yourself.
- Cross the street at corners or crosswalks; remember to stop and look in all directions.
- Never talk to strangers or accept gifts or rides from people you don't know. **If a stranger approaches you, RUN- YELL- TELL an adult or call 9-1-1.**
- Let your parents know if you need to stay late at school or if you plan to go to a friend's house instead of going straight home.
- If you see something that you think isn't right, tell a teacher or your parents right away.

On the bus:

- While waiting for a school bus, be sure that you are in a safe place away from the road.
- When you exit the bus, be very careful if you have to cross the street in traffic. Always cross the street in front of the bus, and look both ways for cars before you cross the street.

At School:

- Stay away from strangers who hang around the playgrounds or bus stops. A stranger is anyone that you do not know very well. Do not accept anything from a stranger and tell an adult immediately if a stranger is bothering you or other children.

If you see something that makes you uneasy or you think isn't right—a stranger hanging around school, a bully bothering other youths, vandalism or graffiti—tell a teacher or your parents right away.

We want to remind everyone to be careful when traveling through school areas during school hours. Kids are not only active before and after school, but also during recess and physical education classes. Students acting as crossing guards are responsible for the safety of others in school zones and residential areas. The school zone speed limit is twenty (20) miles per hour. Another reminder: cell phone use is not allowed in school zones. Please keep this in mind when traveling near school and take extra precaution for the sake of the children. Have a safe school year!!!



Safely Dispose of Unused Medications

Residents are able to dispose of expired or unused medications by dropping them off in a permanent drop box at the Bloomingdale Police Department, 201 S. Bloomingdale Road. Look for the large white metal drop box labeled **RxBOX**, which is located outside at the edge of the parking lot, just east of the main entrance to the police department. There is no charge to drop off medications.

Improperly disposing of prescription or over-the-counter drugs, such as dumping them down a drain or flushing them down a toilet, may contribute to environmental concerns about our water supplies or waterways. The RxBOX program also helps to reduce safety concerns that may occur with accidental ingestion of medication by children in a household and is one way to help address the growing issue of prescription drug abuse.

Medications are best out of the bottles and in a zipper top plastic bag. Remove or black out your personal information on the bottle and then recycle them with your household recyclables. For spill-free disposal, place liquid medication bottles in a zipper top plastic bag. **As a reminder, we do not accept needles, syringes or sharps.**

The medications will be removed from the secured drop box and transported to the Illinois EPA for safe incineration. 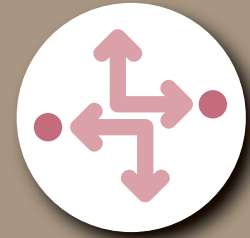

Save Energy Save Money!

Here are some energy saving tips to help you stay comfortable, conserve energy and manage electricity bills during the summer.

- Keep thermostats at a constant, comfortable level - 78 degrees - when at home. Lowering the thermostat setting below the desired temperature will not cool the home faster.
- To save even more energy, use a ceiling fan along with raising your air conditioner temperature.
- To reduce heat and moisture during the warmest part of the day, run appliances such as ovens, washing machines, dryers and dishwashers in the early morning or evening hours when it's generally cooler outside. Also, barbecue outside, instead of using the oven.
- Keep shades, blinds and curtains closed. Simply drawing blinds and curtains, which act as a layer of insulation, can reduce heat gain to your home.
- Keep doors to the outside, garage or attic firmly closed to keep cool air in and hot air out.
- Place window air conditioners on the north or shaded side of the house to avoid overworking the unit in the hot daytime sun.
- When leaving home for more than four hours, raise the thermostat five to 10 degrees in the summer. Do the same at night before going to bed.

Planning to Have a Garage Sale?

Here are some important things to remember if you are planning a garage sale:



There is no cost or permit necessary to hold a garage or yard sale; however, the person conducting the sale must notify the police department of the sale prior to the start of the sale.

No more than three rummage or garage sales may be held on the same premises in any calendar year. Each may not be more than three consecutive days and can only take place between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

There are also requirements relative to garage sale signs, including size and placement restrictions.

West Nile Virus Update

It may seem like there are a lot fewer mosquitoes this year compared to last year. And there are less, but according to officials, there is an increase in the Culex mosquito, which is the one that transmits the West Nile Virus to people. In DuPage County, more of the sample mosquito pools are testing positive this year, with 24 of 290 samples testing positive for the virus. Last year for the same time period, there were no positives out of 250 samples.

It is the floodwater mosquitoes which swarm and bite aggressively, according to Paul Geery of the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District. He notes the Culex are sneaky, gentle biters which like to roam solo.

It is the hot, humid weather that attracts these mosquitoes. They like to lay their eggs on warm water surfaces, such as you would find in typical yards, like bird-baths, kiddie pools, flower pot saucers and rain gutters. The heat also speeds up the mosquitoes' development cycle, so that now the Culex develop into adulthood in five to ten days, rather than the typical 10-14 days.

There could be a greater risk for humans to contract West Nile because the Culex have arrived so early this year. The prolonged drought also works in the insect's favor as rain normally leads to lower temperatures which force the Culex to flee, as well as kill the larvae growing in standing water.

Experts warn people to take the usual precautions: use mosquito repellent, wear loose-fitting clothing and eliminate standing water around their homes.

Grilling Season is Here: Grill the Brats and Burgers, Not Your Home!

The Bloomington Fire Protection District and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) encourage you to use safe grilling practices, as August, one of the peak months for grill fires, approaches. Gas grills constitute a higher risk, being involved in an annual average of 6,900 home fires, while charcoal or other solid-fueled grills are involved in an annual average of 1,100 home fires.



Safety Tips

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.

Charcoal Grills

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

Propane Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off the gas tank and grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

Facts & Figures About Grilling Fires

- U.S. fire departments respond to an average of 8,200 home fires involving grills, hibachis or barbecues per year, including an average of 3,400 structure fires and 4,800 outside fires. These 8,200 fires cause an annual average of 15 civilian deaths, 120 civilian injuries and \$75 million in direct property damage.
- More than one-quarter (29%) of the home structure fires involving grills started on a courtyard, terrace or patio, 28% started on an exterior balcony or open porch, and 6% started in the kitchen.
- Flammable or combustible gas or liquid was the item first ignited in half of home outdoor grill fires. In 50% of the home outdoor fires in which grills were involved, 55% of the outside gas grills, and 36% of gas grill structure fires, the fire started when a flammable or combustible gas or liquid caught fire.

State Treasurer Encourages Use of Low-Interest Loan Program for West Suburban Storm Victims



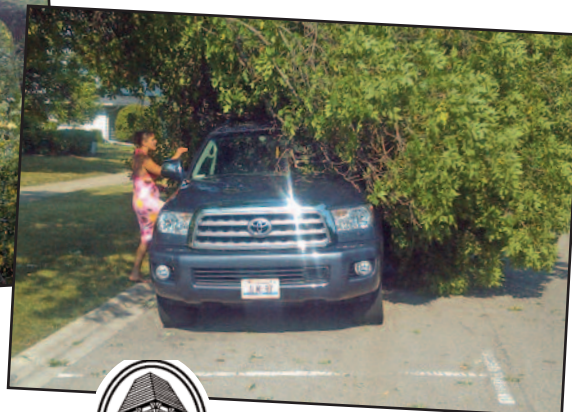
As DuPage County area residents continue to clean-up after the July 1st weekend storms, Illinois State Treasurer Dan Rutherford is encouraging residents, business owners, and local financial institutions to look into low-interest disaster recovery loans that are made possible with funding from the treasurer's office.

"I offer my sympathies to victims of this nasty storm and I want to remind them of help that is available through my office. People whose homes, businesses, vehicles, and other property that have been damaged, may need assistance after an extended power outage or damage from high winds," said Rutherford. "I want every victim of this storm to know what help is available."



These "Disaster Recovery" loans allow home, business and farm owners to secure below-market rates for up to the first five years of a loan. The maximum interest rate is 3 percent. Loans are available to qualified borrowers who need help covering immediate costs that will eventually be covered by insurance (bridge loans), and to help cover costs if there is no insurance. Loans can be repaid over a period of up to five years. The interest is low because the treasurer's office "buys down" the interest rate by depositing money at a discounted rate into an eligible financial institution.

Local financial institutions are expected to partner with the treasurer's office to make these low-interest loans available.
