Online Residential Survey Results

The Village's online Residential Survey was opened on September 25 and closed on November 1. The purpose of the survey was to collect input from residents regarding the views and values they place on various services/events provided by the Village.

Of the 504 residents completed who com- pleted the survey:

- 94% are somewhat to very satisfied with the services provided by the Village.
- 99% feel safe in their home; (92% very often to always).
- The majority receive news & information about the Village through the Village Almanac (89%), E-News (70%), Website (62%) and Front Sign (54%).
- The majority (78%) would like the Village to continue producing

the Village Almanac, of which 59% would like it to be distributed electronically.

- The majority use Social Media (55%), but are not interested in receiving Village information through it.

10% or more of the Survey Respondents identified the following items as the **Top Concerns Facing the Village:**

1. Fiscal Sustainability (Budget) - 59%
2. Attracting New Business with Economic Incentives and Flexible Design Standards - 56%
3. Promoting & Retaining Current Businesses - 41%
4. Public Safety/Crime Prevention - 35%
5. Public Infrastructure (Streets, Sidewalks, Sewers, etc.) - 25%

6. Condition of Housing/Neighborhoods - 18%

The most frequent response was for no changes to be made to resources devoted to services provided or community events hosted by the Village, except that **more resources should be devoted to:**

- Attracting New Business (74%)
- Promoting & Retaining Existing Business (64%)
- Neighborhood Patrol (47%)
- The return of a "scaled-back" Family Fest with a local focus and a fireworks display (47%)

From the Desk of Mayor Franco

I am happy to say we had roughly 50 people in attendance from various areas in town. The response was very favorable and we have received several volunteers interested in serving on the Indian Lakes Ad Hoc Advisory Committee. We are planning to schedule a meeting for this committee early in 2014 to begin evaluating several concept plans for this high quality open space which has already become a popular walking and biking destination.

Be Snow Safe Wintertime Words to the Wise



With the seasonal snowfall just around the corner, the Village Services Department, Public Works Division is ready to combat snow and ice on the 151 miles of Village streets, making them safer for motorists. Village crews are promptly mobilized when a storm begins, day or night.



The How and Why Of Snowplowing Operations

After a 1-inch to 2-inch accumulation of snow, crews begin the snowplow operations according to pre-determined snow routes. There are four (4) routes with eight (8) vehicles.

There are also two (2) smaller vehicles which handle cul-de-sacs and dead ends. These routes have been carefully designed to allow for the optimum use of the available snowplowing equipment and personnel.

All Village-owned streets will eventually be plowed, but main streets are cleared before side streets, which are cleared before cul-de-sacs and dead ends.

The rate at which the streets are cleared depends on many factors including total accumulation, type of snow (wet or powder-like), temperature and volume of traffic on streets during plow operations.

What Are the Village's Parking Regulations When It Snows?

The Village's winter parking ban takes effect after snowfalls of 2 inches or more. The ban applies to all vehicles on any Village-owned street and is in effect for a period of 24 hours or until the streets have been cleared of snow. Residents can assist Village crews in the snow removal efforts by parking vehicles in driveways or other off-street parking areas.

What if a Snowplow Damages My Parkway?

The Public Works Division understands that there could be some damage to parkways due to snow plowing operations. It is Village policy to repair parkways in April, May, and early June, weather permitting, as this is the best time for the germination of grass seed. Please call the Public Works Division at 630-671-5800 to inform us about damage to your parkway so we can put your location on the list.

Why Does My Driveway Get Plowed In?

The snowplows are designed to direct the snow to the curb side of the plow blade. "Side delivery plows" are the fastest and most efficient means available to remove snowfall from the streets. As a result, snow is discharged along the length of the curb, the parkways and the private driveway areas. The Village has thousands of private driveways abutting Village streets, the cleaning of which is the responsibility of the property owner.

Manpower and equipment limitations prohibit the Village from responding to routine requests to remove snow from private driveways. Therefore, we strongly recommend residents delay clearing the driveway until the snowplows have cleaned the majority of your street. Village ordinance PROHIBITS the discharge of snow onto the Village streets. This illegally placed snow may freeze or become compacted, creating a safety hazard for all motorists.

Who Do I Call About Snow Removal Operations?

The schedule for Republic's Garbage and Recycling Pick-up Services will be delayed by one day during the weeks of the Christmas and New Year's Day holidays.

ComEd Offers Financial Assistance

ComEd wants to remind customers that there is bill payment help for veterans and deployed active military personnel who are having difficulty paying their electric bills. ComEd's CHAMP (ComEd Helps Activated/Veteran Military Personnel) program provides bill-payment assistance to deployed members of the military and veterans who reside within ComEd's northern Illinois service territory and demonstrate a need. Additionally, ComEd announced it is expanding CHAMP eligibility requirements to include all veterans.

CHAMP offers a package of benefits, including bill payment assistance of up to \$1,000 while funds are available, deferred payment plans, extended payment due dates, cancellation of late charges, deposit reduction/or refund and budget payment plans.

According to ComEd the utility is providing \$50 million in financial assistance over a five-year period, starting in 2012, to assist eligible low-income residents including seniors, veterans, and activated members of the armed services who are ComEd customers.

Recycle Old and Broken Holiday Lights

Thank you to the Village of Carol Stream for sharing this information with us. Com2 Recycling Solutions LLC, in partnership with the Carol Stream Village, Park District and Public Library will be coordinating a holiday light recycling program effort that began on Monday, November 18th continuing through Monday, February 3rd. Holiday lights acceptable for recycling include traditional bulb lights (screw in), mini-Italian lights, rope lights, LED lights and frayed and non-working extension cords. The copper wire within holiday light strands and extension cords has considerable value on the reclaimed metals market and 100% of the proceeds from the sale of reclaimed copper will be donated to the Village of Carol Stream's Christmas Sharing program that provides food, clothing and toys to under-resourced families during the holiday season.



When inventorying your holiday lights this month, set aside those broken light standards and cords and conveniently deposit them in recycling collection barrels located in the lobbies of any one of the following four drop off locations:

- Carol Stream Municipal Center - 500 N. Gary Avenue
- Simkus Recreation Center - 849 W. Lies Road
- Fountain View Recreation Ctr. - 910 N. Gary Avenue
- Carol Stream Public Library - 616 Hiawatha Drive



When Temperatures Fall Below Zero

- If you have pipes that are vulnerable to freezing, allow a small trickle of water to run overnight to keep pipes from freezing. The cost of the extra water is low compared to the cost to repair a broken pipe.
- Open cabinet doors to expose pipes to warmer room temperatures to help keep them from freezing.

If your pipes freeze:

- Shut off the water immediately. Don't attempt to thaw frozen pipes unless the water is shut off. Freezing can often cause unseen cracks in pipe joints.
- Apply heat to the frozen pipe by warming the air around it, or by applying heat directly to a pipe. You can use a hair dryer, space heater, or hot water. Be sure not to leave space heaters unattended and avoid the use of kerosene heaters or open flames.
- Once the pipes have thawed, turn the water back on slowly and check for cracks and leaks.

When you are away:

- Have a friend, relative or neighbor regularly check your property to insure the heat is working and the pipes have not frozen.
- Also, a freeze alarm can be purchased for less than \$100 and will call a user-selected phone number if the inside temperature drops below 45 degrees.

Please note:

- The Village of Bloomingdale reminds owners of lawn irrigation systems to please isolate and winterize their systems as the cold weather approaches. This will avoid accidental damage and high water usage during the winter months.

Care Packages for Our Troops

Since the start of the Iraqi War, VFW Post 7539 has been receiving donations from the community to prepare packages for our servicemen and women who are fighting for our freedom overseas.

Our past heroes want to ensure that those present heroes overseas feel the love and support from back home. We realize firsthand what receiving a package can do for their morale.

The names of servicemen and women are received from people within the community like yourself. Each service person receives at least one package per month in hopes that it will put a smile on their face.

Some of the items we send are: peanut butter, jelly, crackers, tuna, canned fruit, canned pasta, beef jerky/Slim Jims, nuts, Pringles, granola bars, Altoids, Lifesavers, Tic Tacs, Crystal Lite, Gatorade, eye drops, saline, nasal spray, antibiotic ointment, vitamins, BenGay, Q-tips, cotton balls and handwritten notes or cards during the holiday season. Non-food items appreciated are: CDs and DVDs, pencils, blank birthday cards, tissues, batteries, bug spray, fly swatters, thank you cards, and sunscreen in the summer.

As members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, we know all too well what it's like to be away from home during the holiday season. Post 7539 has not missed a month forwarding packages since the Iraqi war began, and we will continue until the war ends and all of our heroes are back home safe and sound. The number of packages this Post has shipped to our service people since the beginning of the Iraqi War is now at 8,100 plus.

The Village's water source comes from Lake Michigan through the City of Chicago and the DuPage Water Commission (DWC). The City of Chicago adopted a multi-year water rate increase plan for the purchase of Lake Michigan water which was assessed to the DWC and subsequently passed-through to the Village. The Village can not absorb these rate increases and as a result, a water rate increase of 70¢ per thousand gallons of water used will go into effect on January 1, 2014 and begin to be reflected on Village utility bills issued in February 2014. The average residential bill is projected to increase \$8.40, or approximately 6%. Details of the new water and sewer rates are available on the back of your water bill.

What can you do to take control of your costs for water and sewer and minimize these rising costs? Conserving can make good financial sense because you reduce your water bill, as well as have a positive effect on the environment. The following are some specific conservation suggestions.

Fix leaks – Probably the single greatest water waster is a leaky toilet. A simple worn-out flapper valve could waste a gallon of water every ten minutes. This is almost 150 gallons of water wasted each day. A leaking toilet gone unattended for a month could cost you an additional \$52.

Install water flow restrictors – While a long, hot shower might feel good in the winter months it's an easy way to use an extra 500 gallons of water a month. Install water flow restrictors on your shower heads and possibly reduce your water bill by \$11.

Lawn watering – A deep, green lawn really looks great but all that watering might be costing you an extra \$22 each water bill. When you step on your grass, if it springs back up, it's healthy and might not need as much water. Cut back on the unnecessary watering and reduce your water bill.

Enjoy Your Christmas Tree . . . Then Recycle It at the Curb

Republic Services, Inc., the Village's refuse hauler, will pick up live Christmas trees on regularly scheduled refuse pick-up days, for four weeks following the Christmas holiday. Place your Christmas tree at the parkway and follow these simple guidelines:

- Please do not put trees in plastic bags
- Be sure all decorations (and the stand) are removed
- Dispose of natural wreaths with the regular household trash
- Position Christmas trees with the cut end toward the curb for easy loading

New Illinois Laws Effective January 1, 2014



Illinois transportation and law enforcement officials recently joined forces to launch the "Ice and Snow - Take it Slow" winter campaign. The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), Illinois Tollway and the Illinois State Police (ISP) are partnering to roll out the state's frontline winter road crews and ensure that snow plows and other emergency equipment are ready for the upcoming snow and ice season.

The traffic safety advocates also took the opportunity to remind motorists of two safety laws Governor Pat Quinn signed into law earlier this year. Aimed at reducing the number of distracted driving crashes, both laws are set to take effect January 1, 2014.

The first law prohibits the use of all hand-held mobile phones while driving anywhere in Illinois. It does make exceptions for hands-free devices, including those with headsets that can initiate a call using a single button or a voice command. The second law increases penalties when any use of an electronic device while driving is the cause of an accident.

Seniors Wanted

The Bloomingdale Township Senior Center encourages involvement in the activities and events that focus on senior needs and interests. 

Wintertime Gardening Tips

- Water plants, especially evergreens, before the ground freezes.
- Prune trees and shrubs in winter when the branches are without leaves. Remove waterspouts, dead, or crossing branches.
- Apply winter mulch to perennials and roses after a hard frost when ground begins to freeze.
- Protect trunks of young, thin-barked trees, such as ash, maples, and lindens, from winter sun scald by wrapping trunks with a commercial tree wrap.
- Place a cylinder of hardware cloth, chicken wire, or fencing around plants to provide a good defense against rabbits, mice, and deer.
- Spray evergreens, especially broadleaves (rhododendrons) with anti-transpirant to prevent winter burn.
- Protect multi-stemmed evergreens, such as arborvitae, junipers, and yews, from winter storm damage by tying trunks together with old nylons or cotton twine.
- Evaluate last year's garden and decide what changes need to be made. Draw garden plans on paper.
- By February, order seeds and garden plants for spring planting.



Carbon Monoxide: The Odorless, Colorless, Invisible ‘Silent Killer’

Although the popularity of carbon monoxide (CO) alarms has been growing in recent years, it cannot be assumed that everyone is familiar with the hazards of carbon monoxide poisoning in the home.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and the Bloomingtondale Fire Protection District would like to share the following information about carbon monoxide.

Often called the silent killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel are potential sources of carbon monoxide. Vehicles or generators running in an attached garage can also produce dangerous levels of carbon monoxide.



Facts & Figures

- The dangers of CO exposure depend on a number of variables, including the victim's health and activity level. Infants, pregnant women, and people with physical conditions that limit their body's ability to use oxygen (i.e. emphysema, asthma, heart disease) can be more severely affected by lower concentrations of CO than healthy adults would be.
- A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time.
- Each year, U.S. fire departments respond to an estimated 61,100 non-fire CO incidents in which carbon monoxide was found, or an average of seven such calls per hour. The number of incidents increases by nearly 10 percent every year. This increase is most likely due to the increased use of CO detectors, which alert people to the presence of CO.

Safety Tips

- CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the home when one sounds, they all sound.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- Choose a CO alarm that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.




Now's the time! Winter Maintenance Tips for Your Home



Help to protect your home and family during the upcoming cold winter months by performing these simple home maintenance tasks

- **Clean out gutters and downspouts.** Failure to maintain gutters and downspouts from leaves and debris can lead to ice dams forming at the roof edge.
- **Disconnect all garden hoses** from exterior hose bibs to prevent water line freeze-up into the house.
- **Check all exterior electrical fixtures for bird nests.** Failure to remove nests from electrical fixtures may cause a fire.
- **Run all gas-powered lawn equipment until the fuel tank is empty,** or remove fuel from tank. By doing this you are removing flammable liquid storage from your garage. Also make sure you are not storing dirty, oily rags in a pile - they can ignite spontaneously.
- **Check all chimneys and flues** (i.e. fireplace, water heater, and furnace) to insure that gases are properly vented. As part of a minimum annual fireplace cleaning, or annual furnace and water heater service cleaning/inspection, have the qualified technician check the flue piping to insure there are no blockages (bird or insect nests) and that the flue pipe or chimney is clean of any creosote build-up. Any filters should be replaced to insure proper appliance operation..
- **Check electrical holiday decorations for tight connections.** If possible use 3-prong plugs and cord sets, and unplug decorations when not in use. To reduce the chances of overheating and fire, electric cords and extension cords should never be bundled together or placed under rugs or carpet. Broken light bulbs need to be replaced.
- **Check all smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors** for proper operation. Utilize the test buttons on the detectors to check that they operate. Replace batteries annually and clean dust from detectors. Detectors are to be installed per manufacturer's specifications and Village Code. Danger can come from more than just your furnace (see illustration above).



Be Warm and Safe This Winter

There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fire-place. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

- Keep anything that can burn at least three-feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms monthly.
