Tornado Season is Here

In the Spring, April showers can turn into heavy rains and tornados are a common occurrence in Illinois. Pre-planning is a critical activity to protect you and your family in the event of a tornado watch or warning. The following measures will help to sufficiently prepare for the tornado season.

Keep abreast of weather

forecasts via TV or a battery operated NOAA weather radio. Because tornados often accompany thunderstorms, pay close attention to changing weather conditions when there is a severe thunderstorm watch or warning.

Know the difference between a tornado watch (favorable conditions) vs. a tornado warning (a funnel cloud has been spotted within a 5 mile radius of the Village limits.

Know the observable conditions of likely



tornado activity such as dark greenish sky, dark low-lying/rotating clouds, large hail and the sound of a large roar similar to a freight train.

Know the sound and meaning of a tornado siren activation, which is a steady wail lasting 3 -5 minutes in duration sounded for those located outdoors to seek immediate shelter in a building or structure. Tornado sirens never sound an all clear after severe weather has expired. Do not confuse a neighboring town's later siren activation as an all clear.

Growth with Pride

If you are already indoors when a siren is activated, proceed to the basement or lowest level at your workplace. Homeowners who do not have a basement should proceed to the area of the home that has the most walls between you and the outside - away from windows, corners and doorways.

A Message from Mayor Franco

Hello Spring and the warmth of the sun that you bring!

I don't often use my Mayor's column to comment on the doings of our Illinois legislature, but some important discussions are underway that will significantly affect the funding of our village budget. In the Governor's recent Budget Address to the General Assembly, he proposed reducing the local share of funding that Bloomingdale currently receives by 50% in order to shore up the State's budget. Yes, that's correct, a 50% cut.



The local government funding share has been an important revenue stream for municipalities since the income tax was first instituted in Illinois in 1969. Local communities have counted on it for 45 years to help fund key public services like police, fire, water and sewer treatment, infrastructure repair and construction and snow removal. A sweep of these funds at the level proposed will result in a reduction to the Village's budget by \$1,100,000. I am very concerned about how this cut will affect our ability to provide essential services to our residents. Unfortunately, the net result of this proposal is to transfer the State's budget problems to our local government.

The current discussion in Springfield is a healthy part of any budget process. The budget process requires setting priorities and funding programs based on what is important to its citizens. The Village of Bloomingdale, in response to the effects of the 2008 recession, has acted in a fiscally responsible manner by reducing personnel, cutting services and controlling spending to balance our budget. We have taken proactive steps to encourage economic development in our community, with our Lake Street and Old Town re-imaging plans and the positive redevelopment plans at Stratford Mall. Unfortunately, the Governor's proposed cuts are so significant that it will force us to consider even further lay-offs in many departments that provide essential services and the delay and cancellation of infrastructure projects.

During the campaign, Governor Rauner spoke about working in partnership with local governments to better serve the residents of our State. Our Village Board stands ready to work with Springfield to find solutions that will help our local communities prosper and grow. As a former legislator, I sympathize with the enormity of the budget problem in Springfield. I applaud the Governor for having the courage to tackle our spending issues and look for common ground. However, solving the State's budget problems on the back of our community is not the answer for the long-term prosperity of our State. The budget discussions are just beginning and I will keep you posted as to the ongoing dialogue.

Our commitment to invest in our community will continue and you will begin to see positive developments on Lake Street and the Army Trail/Stratford corridor in the coming months. We will continue to take the necessary steps for the Village of Bloomingdale to grow and prosper! Happy Spring!

Summer 2015 Road Construction

Pavement Reconstruction

Pavement reconstruction will include the removal and replacement of all concrete curb and gutter, driveway aprons, and 2.5" of the existing asphalt pavement. As part of the work, the Village will be installing a depressed curb at each driveway. This means the "bump" at the curb of each driveway will be eliminated, and a smooth transition from the street to each driveway will be constructed. The following areas will receive pavement reconstruction: Winston Lane, Cunningham Drive and Cunningham Lane.

This work will begin mid-May and will take approximately 2 1/2 months to complete. During construction, these roads will be closed to through traffic. If you live in the construction zone you will be permitted to proceed past the barricades to reach your residence.

Pavement Overlay

Overlay maintenance consists of pavement patching, curb and gutter repairs to correct drainage deficiencies, sidewalk repair, storm sewer repairs and a new asphalt road surface. The following areas will receive pavement overlay:

Torrington Drive Wickham Avenue Parkway Avenue Wedgefield Lane Needham Drive Warwick Drive Radcliff Court and the short cul-de-sacs adjacent to these streets.

Wendover Drive Ashfield Court Wentworth Lane **Greenfield Drive** Essex Court Wellington Drive



This work will begin mid-May and will take approximately 2 1/2 months to complete. Local signage consisting of "Road Construction Ahead" signs will be posted prior to construction.

Asphalt Surface Treatment – Scrub or Fog Seal

A Scrub Seal is a light application of asphalt rejuvenator placed directly on the pavement and worked into the surface with a drag broom, with the intent of sealing the pavement and enriching the weathered and oxidized asphalt. A Fog Seal is similar to the Scrub Seal however it does not include application with a drag broom and is utilized on newer pavements. These surface treatments will extend the life of the pavement by slowing the deterioration of the asphalt surface. These areas will also receive pavement patching, curb and gutter repairs to correct drainage deficiencies, sidewalk repair and crack filling. The following streets will receive asphalt surface treatment:

Arbor Lane Durham Lane Carlton Drive Oxford Place Oxford Lane Villa Way

Bedford Lane Douglas Drive Evergreen Lane Langton Lane

Crestwood Lane **Freemont Court** Langton Drive

This work will begin mid-May and will take approximately 2 1/2 months to complete. Local signage consisting of "Road Construction Ahead" signs will be posted prior to construction. Branch Pickup Begins April 20



Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will once again perform branch collection under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. Branch collection will begin on Monday, April 20. The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

Branch Collection Guidelines:

• Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, April 20.

• Branches should not be

placed at the curb/pavement edge any earlier than one week prior to the scheduled collection date.

- Woody branches ½ inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).
- Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

The following items are unacceptable:

- Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- Woody branches under ½ inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under 1/2 inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- Large stumps, roots and root balls.*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.*

The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Republic Services (our refuse hauler) pick-up. Yard waste pick-ups commence April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning yard waste pick-ups should be directed to Republic Services at 847-981-0091.

*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds. Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but require a special pick-up. Contact Republic Services for more information.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches ½ inch to 6 inches in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.

Your cooperation is greatly appreciated and will ensure a successful program.





Yard Waste Collection Begins April 1

Yard Waste pick-ups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th. Small twigs, leaves and other yard waste may be placed in bags or cans (not to exceed 34 gallons or 50 lbs) and affixed with stickers for Republic.

Scott's Law: Please Protect Those Who Protect Us

Scott's Law, also called the "Move Over" Law, mandates that when approaching any police or other emergency vehicle that is stopped with its lights flashing along the roadway, drivers should do the following:

- 1. Reduce speed.
- 2. Change lanes if possible Yield the right-of-way by changing lanes away from an authorized emergency vehicle.
- 3. Proceed with caution Proceed with due regard to safety and traffic conditions.

An authorized emergency vehicle under Scott's Law includes ANY vehicle authorized by law to be equipped with oscillating, rotating, or flashing lights while the owner or operator of the vehicle is engaged in his or her official duties.

Scott's Law was named after Lieutenant Scott Gillen of the Chicago Fire Department who was struck and killed by an intoxicated driver while he assisted at a crash on the Dan Ryan Expressway.

A person in violation of Scott's Law commits an offense punishable by a fine of not more than \$10,000.00. A Scott's Law charge may be upgraded to an "aggravated" (felony) charge if the person committing the offense was under the influence of alcohol, drugs, or intoxicating compounds. If this is the case, a person's driving privileges will be:

- Suspended for 90 days to one year if the violation results in damage to the property of another person;
- Suspended for 180 days to 2 years if the violation results in injury to another person;
- Suspended for 2 years if the violation results in the death of another person.

Help Prevent Polluted Runoff Water

Polluted runoff water occurs when rain and melting snow carry pollutants from streets, parking lots, yards and construction sites, and wash them into our storm drains. Some of these pollutants are motor oil, anti-freeze, commercial fertilizers, and pesticides.

Bloomingdale residents, you can help!

Your everyday activities can have a large impact on the water quality in and around the Village of Bloomingdale. By taking simple steps around your home or business, you can help to reduce the amount of polluted water, which enters our storm drains and makes its way untreated, to our local waterways.



Storm Drains

Help keep storm drains clean. Only rain and snow melt water should ever go down a storm drain. Keep debris from homes, lawns, pets, and vehicles out of all storm drains. Remember, anything that enters a storm drain is untreated when it eventually finds its way into a lake, river, or stream.

Pets

When walking your pet remember to Scoop the Poop and dispose of it properly. Bag it and place it in the garbage, or flush it. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into a waterway.

Yard & Garden

• **Pesticides and Fertilizers:** Use fertilizers and chemicals sparingly. When their use is necessary, follow the directions set forth on the label. Do not apply if rain is forecast to prevent the chemical from being washed into the storm drain.

• Lawn Care: Don't over water your lawn and allow runoff water to flow down the street into the storm drain. It can carry fertilizer and lawn clippings with it.

Vehicles

• **Car Washing:** Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a lawn or other unpaved surface to allow the water to be filtered and to minimize the amount of dirty soapy water that flows through the storm drain system and enters a waterway, untreated.

• Motor Oil and Other Automotive Fluids: Check your car, truck, boat, and other machinery for leaks and spills. Make any needed repairs as soon as possible. Use an absorbent material to dry up leaks and spills. Do not let the spilled fluid enter a nearby storm drain! Dispose of any used absorbent in the proper manner. Recycle all automotive fluids at participating recycle centers. Do not pour them down the storm drain or place them in the garbage!

Household Hazardous Waste

Never dump any kind of household hazardous waste into a storm drain! These are items such as paint, varnish, cleaners, acids, etc. These items need to be taken to an approved hazardous waste recycling center.

Report Spills & Other Water Pollution

• Report all spills that are potentially life threatening or hazardous in nature by calling 911.

• Report any non-hazardous spills or illegal dumping to the Village of Bloomingdale Utilities Division at 630-671-5830.



Water Conservation

Did you know that one of the single greatest causes of water waste is a leaky toilet? It could be as simple as a worn-out flapper valve that can waste up to one gallon of water every ten minutes. That could add up to 150 gallons of water waste per day and close to 9,000 gallons of water per billing cycle. Fixing your leaky toilet could potentially cut your bill by \$111.00 per billing cycle.



Hydrant Flushing Begins June 1

Cross Connection Control Device



Don't forget your annual inspection for your cross-connection control device for your irrigation system will be due in the month of May. Reminder letters will be sent out 1st week of May. Failure to have the device tested will result in the disconnection of water service and will not be restored until compliance with the Village Code is verified and a \$250 reconnection fee is paid. The inspection and certification must be performed by a licensed plumber. For further protection, consider hiring a plumber trained in cross-connection control to check your home.

Bloomingdale residents should also install a hose bib (sill cock) vacuum breaker on every single hose bib (sill cock) to isolate garden hose applications thus protecting the potable water supply, which is the most common offender of contamination. The device can be purchased at any local hardware store for less than \$7.00.

Simple ways to keep our water safe: Do not use a hose to unplug a drain. Do not leave a hose submersed in water while using a bucket or filling a pool. Do not leave fertilizer applicators attached to a hose while not in use.

The Program will be performed during the daytime hours of 8:00 am - 3:00 pm. Please DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY during the flushing hours, as rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance which improves both water quality and water flow. The hydrant flushing by area is as follows:

He began his fire service career in Bloomingdale as a dispatcher in October of 1981 but left to begin his life as a firefighter with the Itasca Fire District in 1983. In 1985, he returned to Bloomingdale where he served as a Firefighter/Paramedic.

Scott was promoted to Lieutenant in 1994, Battalion Chief in 2008 and Deputy Chief in 2014. He was a charter member of the firefighter union--Local 3272, was a long-time member of the MABAS Division 12 Hazardous Materials Response Team -- where he served as our coordinator, and taught technical rescue at the Arlington Heights Fire Academy where he was able to share his passion and love of the fire service. Scott served on the Foreign Fire Insurance Board and he worked countless hours designing many of the apparatus in our fleet today. He served as the Building and Grounds Coordinator and most recently was the project manager for our Station 23 remodel. He was a charter member of our Training & Safety Committee, and coordinated our vehicle maintenance program, as well as countless other teams, committees, and programs.

Whenever there was an issue, Deputy Chief Koehn was always there to help. And most of all, he left things better than the way he found them. It was not uncommon to see Chief Koehn commanding a fire in the morning and fixing the garbage disposal that afternoon. He was one of those guys who spent his career giving the same dedication and sense of duty on the last day of his career as he did on the first day of his career.

Koehn Headquarters Fire Station: Named in Honor of Former Chief and Family

The Koehn family name has been synonymous with the Bloomingdale Fire District since 1953 when a young man by the name of Lawrence Koehn became a Bloomingdale firefighter. Harve, as he was known among friends, served the District until 1985 and retired as the Fire Chief.

Prior to 911 or dispatch centers, the Koehn family's



home telephone served as access to the Fire Department; Harve would then run to the firehouse and alert the other firefighters by blowing the whistle. Chief Koehn gave his wife Carol two sons, Robert and Scott, and a daughter, Cathy; Robert Koehn currently serves as the Assistant Fire Chief of the Boone County Fire District #2, and Scott, who retired in February with over 30 years of service to the Bloomingdale Fire District. The stories about Harve Koehn are legendary...he was a tough man, but a fair man and he loved the Bloomingdale Fire District and his family—and I know he would be proud of them today--He always left things a little better.

Deputy Chief Koehn's wife, Julie was the fire district's Administrative Assistant and served the district for over 33 years. Any Chief will tell you that they are only as good as their Administrative Assistant, and we had one of the best. Julie enjoyed a relatively quiet and uncomplicated life, which revolved around her family, friends and the fire department. She gave so much to others, but asked for so very little in return. With her sensitive and caring qualities, Julie was the ideal person to work with. She became like a mother to us, and would help develop us, guide us and watch out for us. She became like a sister to us, someone we could talk to, have fun with, and share our life with. And she became like a daughter to us, someone who we watched out for and protected. Although Julie isn't with us today, there is no doubt that she is smiling down on us, proud of her family and what they've become-- and proud of all of us. Julie's work ethic and love for the Bloomingdale Fire District were second to none and she too, always left things a little better.

Deputy Chief Scott Koehn was a great firefighter and leader and he lived and breathed the Bloomingdale Fire District. Over 30 years of selfless service is quite an accomplishment and he made the most of every day. He gave more than he took, he did more than what was asked, and took less credit than he deserved.
