## A Message from Mayor Franco

I would like to use the majority of my message in this issue of the Almanac to discuss the development being proposed by the Indian Lakes ownership group. Like many of you, I was disappointed to hear that the golf course would be closed as it has been an integral part of the Village over the last 50 years. While the Indian Lakes ownership has released plans pertaining to the redevelopment of the golf course, it has not submitted any formal plans to the Board nor has it made a submittal to the Village's Planning Commission.



Despite this formality, our residents should understand that the Village's goal is to ensure that any subsequent redevelopment of the property is consistent and uniform with the surrounding residential properties and maintains the open space nature of the property. While my desire is to keep the golf course open in some form or fashion, I recognize that the future use of the golf course property will be a decision that the Village Board of Trustees will make following input from the community.

Although the future use of the golf course remains uncertain at this time, I want to assure Village residents and make clear to the Indian Lakes ownership that the Village will not be making any redevelopment decisions without significant input from Village residents. As part of any redevelopment process of the golf course, the Village will seek to balance the often competing interests of the golf course owner, the surrounding residents, and the Village.

During this process, the Village will be guided by its obligation to preserve the zoning integrity of the surrounding residential properties along the golf course and its commitment to preserve the open space nature of the property contemplated under the Village's Comprehensive Plan. As the Village moves forward in its discussions with the golf course owner, I encourage the community to reach out to the Village to share your ideas and concerns regarding the future of the Indian Lakes Golf Course. On the lighter side, no matter what the weather, it is Spring and things are going to start popping in Bloomington. We will also have Fireworks!! again this July, although we must find a new venue because we have been informed that last year's near perfect location is no longer available to the Village.

Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will once again perform branch collection under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. Branch collection will begin on Monday, April 17. The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

### Branch Collection Guidelines:

- Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, April 17.
- Branches should not be placed at the curb/pavement edge any

earlier than one week prior to the scheduled collection date.

- Woody branches ½ inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).
- Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

### The following items are unacceptable:

- Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- Woody branches under ½ inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under ½ inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- Large stumps, roots and root balls.\*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.\*

The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for Republic Services (our refuse hauler) pick-up. Yard waste pick-ups commence April 1st and continue through November 30th.

Questions concerning yard waste pick-ups should be directed to Republic Services at 847-981-0091.

\*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds. Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but require a special pick-up. Contact Republic Services for more information.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches ½ inch to 6 inches in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.



# Summer 2017 Road Construction

## Pavement Overlay

Overlay maintenance consists of pavement patching, curb and gutter repairs to correct drainage deficiencies, sidewalk repair, storm sewer repairs and a new asphalt road surface. The following areas will receive pavement overlay:

Ironwood Dr.  
Freeport Dr.  
Kingston Ln.  
Lockwood Dr.  
Aprina Ct.  
Schick Rd. (Ridge Ave. to Fairfield Way)  
Springbrook Villas Courts (which includes Neville Ct., Melbourne Ct., Karswell Ct., Farrington Ct., Darby Ct., Crandon Ct., Atherton Ct., Billings Ct., Epton Ct., Lawford Ct., Penwick Ct. & Raleigh Ct.),  
Springfield Dr. (Army Trail Rd. to Lake St.)  
Butterfield Dr. (Army Trail Rd. to Springfield Dr.)



This work will begin mid-May and will take approximately two and a half (2½) months to complete. Local signage consisting of "Road Construction Ahead" signs will be posted prior to construction.

## Asphalt Surface Treatment – Scrub or Fog Seal

A Scrub Seal is a light application of asphalt rejuvenator placed directly on the pavement and worked into the surface with a drag broom, with the intent of sealing the pavement and enriching the weathered and oxidized asphalt. A Fog Seal is similar to the Scrub Seal however it does not include application with a drag broom and is utilized on newer pavements. These surface treatments will extend the life of the pavement by slowing the deterioration of the asphalt surface. These areas will also receive pavement patching, curb and gutter repairs to correct drainage deficiencies, sidewalk repair and pavement crack filling. The following streets will receive asphalt surface treatment:

# Keep the Kids Safe: Some Reminders About School Zones and School Buses

Remember the Rules of the Road, especially when it comes to school buses, designated school zones and residential areas. When traveling in a **school zone**, drivers must obey the posted **20 m.p.h. speed limit** during school hours while children are attending, even if you do not see them.

Here is the law when a school bus is stopped, with its red lights flashing and the “Stop” arm extended:

On **one-way streets**, all vehicles must stop

On **two-lane roads**, drivers traveling in both directions must stop

On **four-lane roads**, where traffic moves in two directions, drivers traveling in the same direction as the school bus must stop


If convicted of illegally passing a stopped school bus in Illinois, you will lose your driving privileges for three months and be fined \$150. Two convictions within five years: your license is suspended for a year and you’re fined \$500.

The Bloomington Police Department aggressively enforces traffic laws near school and school crossing areas, so drivers should be aware of school zone ordinances.

## Remember to Lock Your Vehicle!

The Bloomington Police Department reminds residents to always lock your car doors - hide your valuables- and take keys with you.

Even when running into a business, dropping off a child at a day care center, etc., it only takes a thief a few seconds to take personal items from your vehicle. Once in their possession, they will immediately use your identity and credit cards to purchase items before the credit cards are turned off. Often by the time the card is reported stolen, thousands of dollars will already be charged on the card. The illegally purchased items are then usually pawned for cash by the offender.

## Hydrant Flushing Begins June 5

The Village Services - Utilities Division will perform the annual Hydrant Flushing Program beginning June 5, 2017 through June 22, 2017. **The Program will be performed during the daytime hours of 8:00 am - 3:00 pm. Please DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY** during the flushing hours, as rust staining of clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance which improves both water quality and water flow. The hydrant flushing by area is as follows:

As a resident, he served in the Neighborhood Watch Program for 18 years, as well as a Steering Committee member for 17 years.

He has been an American Legion Member for 50 years, as well as a Bloomingdale Lion for 45 years. A very active member to date, Marv received a Melvin Jones Fellow Award, the highest honor a Lion can receive from the Lion's Clubs International Foundation, three times.

Marv was the founding Coordinator of the Bloomingdale Police Department Volunteer Program, and has given over 17,000 hours himself to assist the Police Department. His extensive contributions to this program led to an Illinois TRIAD Senior Citizen Volunteer Award in September 2000.



## Electronic Recycling Program

## Water System Protection

Community public water supplies are required by State regulations to maintain active cross-connection control programs to protect the safety of water consumers. Increased health and safety protection for water consumers necessitated by recent backflow incidents across the country and within Illinois have increased enforcement of cross-connection regulations.

### CROSS-CONNECTION CONTROL DEVICE

- **Compliance is required for commercial and residential connections** - Don't forget your annual inspection for your cross-connection control device for your irrigation system will be due in the month of May. Reminder letters will be distributed the 1st week of May. Failure to have the device tested and certified will result in the disconnection of water service and will not be restored until compliance with IEPA requirements and the Village Code is verified and a \$250 reconnection fee is paid. The inspection and certification must be performed by a licensed plumber; for further protection consider hiring a plumber trained in cross-connection control to check your home.
- **Compliance is suggested** - residents are also encouraged to install a hose bib (sill cock) vacuum breaker on every single hose bib (sill cock) to isolate garden hose applications thus protecting the potable water supply, which is the most common offender of contamination. The device can be purchased at any local hardware store for less than \$7.00.



## Keep the Kids Safe: Take Precautions When Enjoying Outdoor Activities

As the warm weather approaches, the Bloomingtondale Fire Protection District and the National Center for Injury Prevention and Control would like to remind residents to take precautions when enjoying outdoor activities. Each year, nearly 20 children ages 14 and under die in bicycle-related incidents, and more than 236,000 are injured. Head injury is the leading cause of death in bicycle crashes. A collision with a motor vehicle causes nearly 90 percent of bicycle-related deaths. Nearly two hundred children ages 14 and under die from pedestrian injuries. Nearly 27,500 children receive emergency room treatment for pedestrian injuries.

Many head injuries can be prevented with safe play rules. Here are some basic safety tips to keep children safe:

- Children under 10 should ride on sidewalks or safe areas only like a bike path. Teens may ride in the street, riding with traffic, after they learn the rules of the road.
- Require children (and adults) to wear a helmet every time you ride a bike, scooter, skateboard, in-line skate, ice skate, snow board or ski.
- Make sure children ride bikes in safe areas and never at night.
- Teach children to always come to a complete stop before entering a driveway, path or sidewalk. Look left, right, and left again for other bikes, cars, or pedestrians.
- Encourage children to use the proper hand signals when turning to let drivers know your intent.
- Children should walk, not ride a bike across the street, and cross only with a grown-up.
- Children under 10 should never cross a street alone. Grown-ups and older children should be role models and set a positive example by practicing safe street-crossing rules.
- Teach children how to cross the street. Stop at the curb or edge of the road and look left then right, then left again for moving cars. Wait until the street is clear; keep looking left and right until you have safely crossed the street.
- Never allow children to play in a driveway or parking lot.






## Kite Fly & Touch-A-Truck
