On Saturday, September 9, 2017, the Village of Bloomingdale will celebrate the 44th Annual Septemberfest. The day-



long event is the popular, traditional end of summer event, held in Bloomingdale's Old Town Park, near the corner of Bloomingdale Road and Lake Street (Rt. 20).

Beginning at 11:00 a.m. the Septemberfest parade steps off from DuJardin School on Euclid Avenue heading north to Schick Road, then proceeding west to conclude in Old Town. As always, the festival features a variety of food and drink vendors, crafters, local business

booths, live entertainment and much more!

At 12:15, following the opening ceremonies, the Septemberfest/Joe Draghi Scholarship recipients will be announced. This scholarship fund has given thousands of dollars to young adults in our community. Thanks to all who have given thus far, as the scholarships are funded entirely through personal and local business donations. 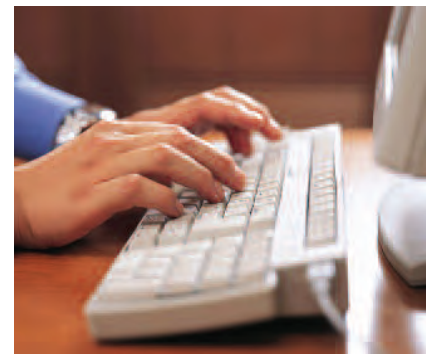

A Message from Mayor Franco

I want to share news on some recent changes in personnel structure which we believe will enhance our services, as well as fill you in about further exciting improvements planned for the future of our Lake Street Corridor.

Personnel

The loss of long tenured personnel is difficult and the Village has had a number of such employees retire this past year including Village Services Director and Village Engineer Michael Marchi. The Village, for a number of years, has operated with a single department that included Public Works, Engineering, and Building and Zoning under the Village Services umbrella. Michael served with distinction in this position and we will miss his expertise and leadership. As we look ahead, this position is being phased out and our structure will change slightly to give each division more autonomy and flexibility in delivering the same exceptional services our residents expect and deserve.

The Village conducted a national search for the newly created Public Works Director position and found that the most qualified candidate was already a member of the Bloomingdale team. The Village in June promoted Assistant Public Works Director Jim Monkemeyer to the position of Public Works Director. The Village did not have far to find its next Village Engineer and appointed Assistant Village Engineer Robert Prohaska to the position. As for the Building Division, the Village has been fortunate to have Michael Gricus, who has done a superb job and has been elevated to Department Head. I express my many thanks to our staff during this transition period as we are making these changes without adding any new personnel.

I am also happy to announce that Police Chief Frank Giammarese will become the Village's first Director of Public Safety. The newly created civilian position will allow the Chief to remain in a leadership role with the Police Department and continue to be responsible for the oversight of most Police Department functions. The position will monitor the planning, staffing, directing, coordinating and controlling of all department functions and activities, ensuring their efficiency. Again, I thank our entire police force for their support as it allows us to retain the Chief's leadership at a cost savings to the Village.

Lake Street

As new businesses move back to spaces along Lake Street in response to our redevelopment efforts, the Village is ready to begin Phase II in the revitalization of the Lake Street corridor. The Village has hired Christopher B. Burke Engineering, Ltd (CBBE) of Rosemont to assist with the engineering design for the Lake Street Streetscape and Lighting Enhancements Project, as well as design and permit coordination with the Illinois Department of Transportation.

The envisioned streetscape enhancements include: gateway elements with Bloomingdale identity, median landscape and hardscape elements, public parkway landscaping, irrigation system, electrical system for holiday lighting, adding new "pedestrian side" street lighting and replacing the existing high intensity discharge (HID) street lighting fixtures with more energy efficient fixtures. The desired goal is to enhance this gateway to our community and add to our efforts in supporting the retention and addition of new businesses on Lake Street and in Old Town.

Hope to see many of you at the annual Sunrise Shuffle 5K at the Johnston Rec Center at 8:30 a.m. on September 9 and the rest of you in Old Town later that day for Septemberfest!

Summer Water Conservation

From May through September of each year the use of the public water supply for sprinkling of lawns with automatic sprinkling devices is prohibited except for:

- Single family residential with odd numbered addresses on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday between 5 a.m. and 9 a.m. or 5 p.m. and 9 p.m.
- Single family residential with even numbered addresses on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday between 5 a.m. and 9 a.m. or 5 p.m. and 9 p.m.
- Commercial, industrial, manufacturing, office buildings and multi-family residential buildings on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday between 5 a.m. and 9 a.m. or 5 p.m. and 9 p.m.

The use of automatic sprinkling devices is prohibited on all Fridays. Violators are subject to a fine of \$25 to \$50 for each violation of the order.

Handheld sprinkling is not regulated.

Have a New Tree? Please Water It When Temperatures are High and Rainfall is Low

The Forestry Division is requesting help from residents to keep newly and recently planted trees watered when the temperature climbs and there isn't enough rain. Trees lose lots of water when the temperature climbs.

Proper watering is the single most important aspect of maintenance of transplanted trees. The goal is to provide at least 1 to 2 inches of water every two weeks, more often in very hot weather.

Here are two easy ways to accomplish watering:

1. Set a garden hose at the base of the tree, and let it trickle for 15 minutes.
2. Perforate a 5-gallon plastic bucket with several holes, place it near the trunk of the tree and fill it with water. Allow the water to seep out, then repeat.

After the tree has been established for two years the root structure is better able to withstand a wider range of water conditions.



Fight the Bite

According to the DuPage County Health Department, mosquitos in Illinois have tested positive for West Nile Virus, although no human cases have been reported in the county at the time of this writing in mid-July.

To help prevent mosquitos from breeding around your home and to protect yourself from bites, follow the "4 Ds of Defense:"

- **Drain:** Drain standing water from items around your home, yard or business.
- **Defend:** Use an insect repellent containing DEET when outdoors and reapply according to directions.
- **Dress:** Wear long pants, long sleeves and closed toe shoes when outside to cover the skin.
- **Dusk and Dawn:** Wear repellent outdoors during these prime times for mosquito activity.

The DuPage County Health Department monitors WNV activity by collecting and testing mosquitos in traps located throughout the county.

In the summer months, trucks canvas Bloomingdale neighborhoods to spray for mosquitos. Residents who live in Bloomingdale Township are served by Clarke Mosquito Control. Residents can contact Clarke's Mosquito Hotline at 800-942-2555 to be put on the list to be notified when spraying will be occurring in their neighborhood. Bloomingdale residents may also REPORT areas of stagnant water in roadside ditches, flooded yards and similar locations that may produce mosquitos to the Clarke Mosquito Hotline.



Help Prevent Local Flooding

Please do not rake, pile or blow debris, grass clippings, leaves or tree branches into the street or into, over or near a storm sewer drain. They can cover storm water inlets, preventing water from flowing into the storm sewer system creating a greater chance for localized flooding.

When leaves are raked or deposited into the street, they can also cover storm water inlets. Not only does this create a greater chance for localized flooding, the deposits which eventually decay are also unsightly. The Village's street sweeping program is designed to only collect those leaves that fall naturally onto the street, **NOT** leaves that are raked or deposited into the street by the property owner or landscape maintenance contractors.



Please collect and deposit leaves in brown kraft paper yard waste bags. Each yard waste bag must have a yard waste sticker affixed, or it will not be collected by Republic Services. Yard waste stickers are sold at the Village Hall, and local retailers such as Caputos, Jewel and Ace Hardware. Tagged yard waste bags may be placed at the curb after 6 p.m. on the night before your collection day. It's Time for the Citizen Police Academy

Make It a Safe Start to the New School Year

It's hard to believe that school will be beginning before the end of this month! This is an excellent time to review school safety with your children. Here are a few "common sense" safety tips that can benefit children of all ages.

Walking to and from school:

- Choose a safe route for walking to and from school. Avoid walking by vacant lots, fields, or other areas where there aren't many people around.
- Use the buddy system; it is safer to walk in a group than by yourself.
- If you bike or skate to school, wear a protective helmet and don't forget to lock your bike.
- Cross the street at corners or crosswalks; Stop and look in all directions.
- **Never** talk to strangers or accept gifts or rides from people you don't know. If a stranger approaches you, **RUN- YELL- TELL** an adult or call **9-1-1**.
- Let your parents know if you need to stay late at school or if you plan to go to a friend's house instead of going straight home.

At school:

- If you see something that makes you uneasy or you think isn't right—a stranger hanging around school, a bully bothering other youths, vandalism or graffiti—tell a teacher or your parents right away.
- Learn to settle arguments with words, not fists. Walk away from an argument instead of fighting. Never bring weapons of any kind to school and tell a teacher immediately if someone else has a weapon.

The Bloomingdale Police Department is again offering the Citizen Police Academy Program for its community members. The Citizen Police Academy has been a natural step from the Neighborhood Watch Program to enhance the lines of communication with individuals who live and/or work in Bloomingdale, by providing an insight into police work procedures.

The eleven-week session will consist of a series of instruction and discussion to provide an overview of various areas of law enforcement. The classes will be held on Wednesday evenings in September, October, and November, each for a three hour interval. Topics addressed by police officers include: Department Organization, Testing Process, Building Tour, Adult and Juvenile Criminal Law and Procedures, Constitutional Law, Traffic Stops and Radar Enforcement, Accidents/Crash Reports, D.U.I. Procedures, Use of Force/Liability, Defensive Tactics, Firearms Safety, K-9 Unit, Crime Scene Processing, and Interviewing/Interrogation overview.

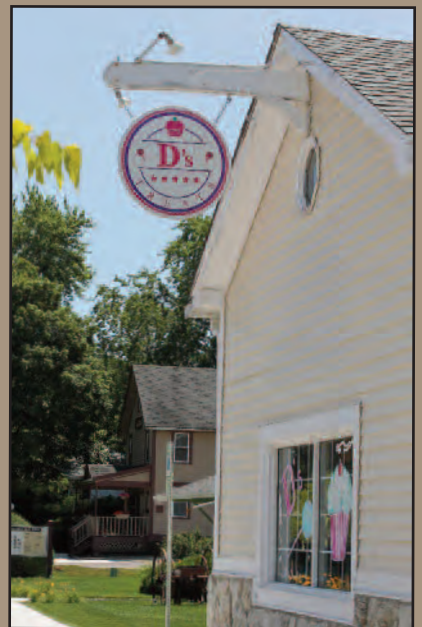

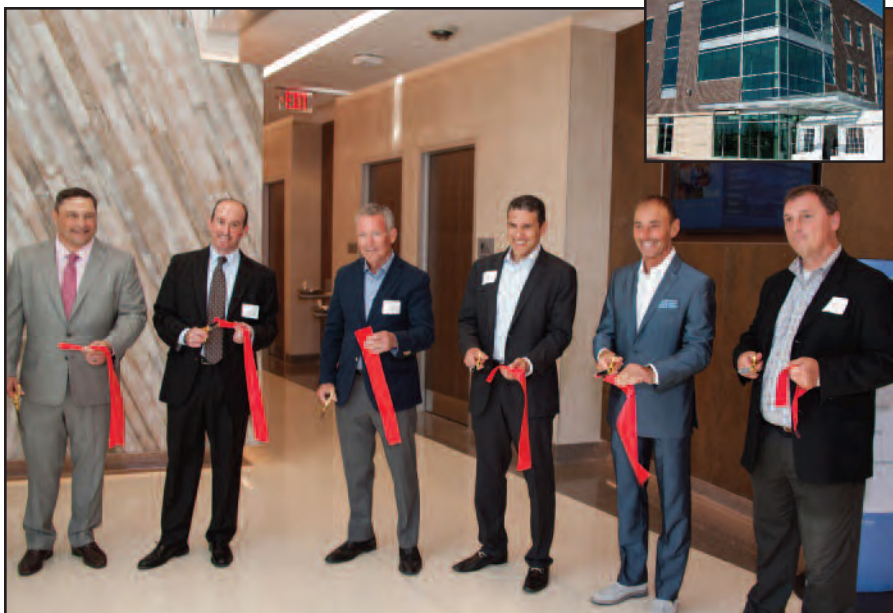

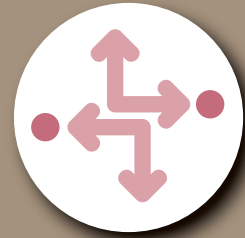

50 Men Who Cook and Divas Who Dish: A Taste of Bloomington on September 16

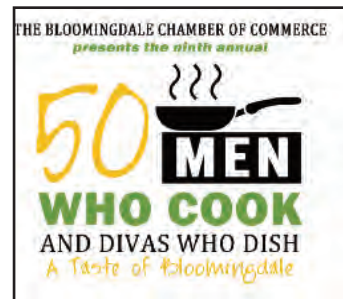

Garden Tips from Morton Arboretum August & September



Monitor rainfall and keep plants well-watered during times of heat or drought, especially newly-planted trees and shrubs.

Continue to remove faded flowers on roses, annuals, and perennials. Pinch back leggy growth.

Don't fertilize trees and shrubs now. New growth will not have time to harden off before winter.

Mid-August through mid-September is an ideal time to establish a new lawn or to seed in bare spots. For advice on establishing lawns, contact your county cooperative extension service. In DuPage County, the number is 630-955-1123.

Late summer or early autumn is the best time to divide perennials that bloom in the spring and summer.

Plant peonies from the end of the month through October.

Continue regular weeding and monitoring for insect and disease problems.

Start cuttings of herbs to grow on a sunny window sill during the winter.

Order spring flowering bulbs to plant this fall.

Treat lawn for grubs and Japanese beetle larvae in mid-August through September.

Water Rate & Fee Increase Effective September 1, 2017

The Village's water source comes from Lake Michigan through the City of Chicago and the DuPage Water Commission (DWC). The City of Chicago has increased the water rate for the purchase of Lake Michigan water which it assesses to the DWC. The DWC subsequently passed-through this rate increase to the Village. The Village cannot absorb the rate increase without potential impacts to the financial stability of the water system and as a result, a water rate increase of 9 cents per thousand gallons of water used will go into effect on September 1, 2017 and begin to be reflected on Village utility bills issued in October 2017. The average residential bill is projected to increase \$1.08, or approximately 1%.

What can you do to take control of your costs for water and sewer and minimize these rising costs? Conserving can make good financial sense because you reduce your water bill, as well as have a positive effect on the environment. The following are some specific conservation suggestions.

Fix leaks – Probably the single greatest water waster is a leaky toilet. A simple worn-out flapper valve could waste a gallon of water every ten minutes. This is almost 150 gallons of water wasted each day! Fixing a leaky toilet could reduce your water bill by approximately \$110 per bill.

Install water flow restrictors – While a long, hot shower might feel good in the winter months, it's an easy way to use an extra 500 gallons of water a month. Install water flow restrictors on your shower heads and possibly reduce your water bill by approximately \$75 a year.

Lawn watering – A deep, green lawn really looks great, but all that watering might be costing you an extra money each water bill. When you step on your grass, if it springs back up, it's healthy and might not need as much water. Cut back on the unnecessary watering and reduce your water bill.

‘Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out!’

In a fire, seconds count. The Bloomingtondale Fire Protection District and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) remind you that seconds can mean the difference between residents of our community escaping safely from a fire or having their lives end in tragedy.



Fire Prevention Week is October 8 – 14 and this year's theme: "Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out!" is so important. It reinforces why everyone needs to have an escape plan.

- Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.
- Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.
- Close doors behind you as you leave – this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building.
